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OU Picks McGarry, Copenhaver

Fifty samples of all brochures which are typeset and offset printed in quantities of 1,000 or more will automatically be sent by the print shop to the public relations department for on-campus distribution.

Two OU administrators have received recognition.

John De Carlo, vice president for governmental relations and secretary to the board of trustees, was honored recently by the Michigan State Senate. A resolution, approved during the fall legislative session, cited De Carlo for his accomplishments during his twelve years at Oakland.

Barbara Murphy, university affirmative action officer, served on a NACUBO (National Association of College and University Business Officers) task force on higher education and the handicapped. A summary of the most recent project of that task force is included in the April 1981 issue of the NACUBO publication.

Two 15 minute parking spaces along the east and west bound roadways of North Foundation are being marked for members of the community who must make brief business stops in North Foundation or Wilson Halls. Parking in other areas of the drive remains prohibited.

Oakland University has filled the position of vice president for administrative affairs and chosen a dean for the College of Arts and Sciences, the university's largest academic unit.

Robert J. McGarry, 52, is the new vice president for administrative affairs. Brian P. Copenhaver, 38, has been named dean of the College of Arts and Sciences.

Both actions were approved by the OU Board of Trustees on June 17.

McGarry will be responsible for the fiscal operations of the university, and for physical plant, computer services, and employee relations.

McGarry has been controller for the university since 1960 and more recently has served as assistant vice president for business affairs and controller. He is an active member of the Central Association of College and University Business Officers. Prior to coming to Oakland, he worked at Touche Ross & Co. and at Chrysler Corporation. He earned his Bachelor of Arts degree from Michigan State University.

McGarry's appointment completes a series restructuring of the central administration under new president Joseph E. Champagne. Previously, Wilma H. Ray-Bledsoe was named vice president for student and urban affairs, Robert W. Swanson was named vice president for development and treasurer of the OU Board of Trustees, and Keith R. Kleckner was selected as interim provost. John H. De Carlo continues as vice president for governmental relations and secretary to the OU Board of Trustees.

Copenhaver has been associate dean of Western Washington University's College of Arts and Sciences since 1977 and a professor, liberal studies, since 1978. He was director of the university honors program from 1974-80.

At WWU Copenhaver had direct

responsibility for curriculum maintenance and development, long-range planning and faculty development, with additional budget and personnel experience.

The new dean earned an A.B. from Loyola College at Baltimore, the M.A. from Creighton University, and the Ph.D. in history from the University of Kansas.

Copenhaver has been a WWU faculty member since 1971. Previous full or part-time teaching experience was obtained at the University of Kansas, Drake University, Kansas City Art Institute, and Servite Junior College.

He is the author of numerous articles and the member of six professional societies. His grants and honors include a Fulbright Scholarship at the University of Lyon, the Andrew White Medal for History, a Fellow of the American Council Learned Societies, a Fellow of the Medieval Academy's Institute on the Basic Disciplines, and a National Endowment for the Humanities/Washington Commission for the Humanities grant.

Search Committee Named

President Joseph E. Champagne has named the provost's search committee as the university seeks a replacement for Frederick W. Obear.

Headed by Jacqueline Scherer, the committee includes Venkat N. Reddy, Charles Akers, William G. Hammerle, Ronald M. Horwitz, Joan Stinson, Ronald Kevern, Wilma H. Ray-Bledsoe, and student Zachary Shallow.

President Champagne emphasized the important nature of the position of provost. He said the activities of the search committee and a decision by the selection committee should be completed by December of this year.

Board Acts On Reemployment, Tenure

Assistant professors eligible for reemployment to second two-year probationary terms—Martins Linauts, biological sciences; Edward J. McCabe, sociology; Nathan H. Schwartz, political science: Robert B. Stewart, psychology; Augustine K. Fosu, economics; Osman D. Altan, engineering; William S. Cramer and Clara T. DiFelice, library; and Faithy J. Justin, nursing.

Sidaway, economics and management, was reemployed to a final two-year probationary term as a special instructor.

Daniel F. Ring, library, was reemployed as an assistant professor with tenure. Assistant professors reemployed and promoted to associate professor with tenure—Charles C. Cheng, mathematical sciences; Ranald D. Hansen, psychology; Vincent B. Khapoya, political science: Asish C. Nag, biological sciences; Sze-Kai J. Tsui, mathematical sciences; and William J. Department chairpersons reappointed to three-year terms effective Aug. 15 of this year were John B. Cameron, art and art history: Paul Tomboulian, chemistry: Donald C. Hildum, communication arts: John Barnard, history: Abraham R. Liboff, physics: and David W. Shantz, psychology.

New appointments include Karen L. Beckwith, instructor in political science; Melodie Monahan, assistant professor of English; and Scott A. Monroe, instructor in economics.

In changes of status, Laszlo J. Hetenyi becomes professor of performing arts and education and dean of the School of Performing Arts, and John E. Tower leaves his post as acting director of the Center for General and Career Studies to become associate dean of the School of Economics and Management. He retains his rank of associate professor of economics and management. Both changes take effect July 1.

Seven Get Prize Scholarships

Good grades and extracurricular activities have paid financial dividends for seven high school students.

They will receive between \$8,000 and \$10,000 each to attend Oakland University for the next four years as winners of the university's top scholarships. The awards recognize achievements and are made without regard to family income.

Summer Hours

Beginning July 6, 1981, and running through August 28, 1981, summer hours will be effected for university offices and departments where feasible: i.e., where such offices or departments need not provide services on Friday afternoons.

This summer schedule specifies a Friday work schedule of 7:30 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. The four-hour reduction in work time on Fridays will be offset by increasing work hours on Mondays through Thursdays by one hour each day, resulting in this schedule: 7:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., with a one-half hour lunch period. Lunch periods will normally be taken between 12:00 noon and 1:00 p.m.

The summer schedule cannot be implemented for employees who are members of the AFSCME, POAM or FOP unions due to the nature of the duties performed and services provided by these groups of employees.

The supervisors of other offices or units where summer hours are not feasible will review their coverage needs and arrangements with their respective vice presidents.

Two Units Offer Degree

A new major in engineering physics has been approved by the OU Board of Trustees.

The major leads to a Bachelor of Science degree awarded jointly by the School of Engineering and the College of Arts and Sciences. It is the first joint offering of a degree program by two separate academic units within the institution.

Administration of the new program is the responsibility of a six-member committee consisting of three members of the School of Engineering, those representatives to be appointed by the dean of the school, and three members of the Department of Physics appointed by the dean of the college on advice of the department chairperson.

The major is designed for students who are seeking a broad education in physics and mathematics along with basic preparation in engineering.

The University of Michigan in Ann Arbor and Michigan Technological University are the only other state institutions with comparable programs.
