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ON HUMANISTIC ETHICS: FOUR CONTROVERSIAL POINTS OF VIEW

Four controversial panelists will discuss the myriad aspects of humanism in a three-day "Conference on Humanistic Ethics" to be held here next week under the auspices of the Conferences Department of Continuing Education. The panelists are Joan Baez, politically active folk singer; Jeffrey Campbell, black Unitarian minister and ardent socialist; Albert Ellis, noted as an iconoclastic psychologist and advocate of radical sexual freedom; and Paul Goodman, author, educator, psychologist and former University of Chicago professor.

The conference will begin at 8 p.m. Friday and will run through noon Sunday. The format will be informal dialogue among the panelists and between the panelists and audience. There will be no formal lectures. The conference is sponsored by five national organizations that are committed to the philosophy of humanism. They are the American Ethical Union, the American Humanist Association, the Fellowship of Religious Humanists, the Society for Humanistic Judaism, and the Unitarian Universalist Association.

CONCERT LINEUP SET Hot off the floor of the Grandee Ballroom, Tim Buckley, The Frost and the Symphonic Metamorphosis will appear at Baldwin Pavilion Tuesday night in the Special Events Series. They are replacing The Moody Blues, an English rock group that canceled its North American tour. For those with a more classical taste in music, this week's Wednesday night concert will feature Mary Hopkin ("Those Were the Days, My Friend") and the First Edition ("Aquarius"). Both programs begin at 8:30 p.m.

ELECTRICITY GOING OFF The physical plant reports that there will be three momentary interruptions in electric service over the next two weeks during power tie-in work for the Oakland Center expansion. Barring difficulties, each power interruption will last just a few minutes. Portions of the entire campus will be affected in each case. The tie-in work is tentatively scheduled for this Tuesday or Wednesday, and approximately Monday, August 25, and Friday, August 29.
