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FAIR OFFERS BEWITCHING DISPLAY OF BELLS, BOOKS AND CANDLES

Looking for something different in the way of a holiday gift? You may find it at the third annual Art, Book and Gift Fair to be held in the Oakland Center main lounge from 9 a.m. to 9 p.m. Wednesday. Tables will hold displays of books appropriate for the season, in addition to art objects and imported gifts from all over the world. Paintings and sketches by OU students will be displayed on the walls.

Participating groups are the University Book Center, the Scholar Shop, Oakland Center food service, Ahmed's African Imports of Pontiac, and OU student organizations. Adding to the festiveness of the holiday decorations will be recorded and live music.

AUTHOR TO SPEAK

Kresge Library has scheduled a talk at 11 a.m. Wednesday by Anita Leslie King, author and daughter of Irish poet Sir Shane Leslie, in room 310 of the Library. She is the grandniece of Lady Randolph (Jennie) Churchill, and is in the United States in connection with the publication of her biography of that remarkable woman. Her book is based on personal recollections as well as family letters and documents, and refutes much that Randolph Martin has written in his currently popular *Jennie*. Writing under the name of Anita Leslie, Mrs. King has written *Love in a Nutshell*, *Train to Nowhere* and *The Fabulous Leonard Jerome*, the last a biography of her millionaire American great-grandfather.

NEW THEATRE PRODUCTION

Meadow Brook Theatre's third production of the season, George Bernard Shaw's *Pygmalion*, will begin on Dec. 11. Karin Fernald and Jeremy Rowe will play Eliza Doolittle and Henry Higgins, two of the famous main characters in this production which later became a hit in its musical version, *My Fair Lady*. The show runs from Dec. 11-21 and re-opens Dec. 30-Jan. 11, beginning at 8:15 p.m. each evening.

OU CONCERT BAND

The Music Department will present the premiere concert of the newly formed Concert Band on Monday, Dec. 8 at 8:00 p.m. The band is made up of about 40 musicians from the University and is under the direction of Mr. Russell Reed. The concert will be held in Dodge Hall auditorium. There is no admission charge.

C-T FORCES TO GATHER About 90 clerical-technical staffers attended an organizational meeting last week for briefings on the proposed formation of a bargaining association. Speakers described similar organizations at Oakland Community College, Wayne State and Michigan State Universities, and spokesmen discussed programs of the Michigan Association of Educational Secretaries and the American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees, the AFL organization with which OU's hourly employees are affiliated. Questionnaires seeking the opinions of the C-T personnel have been distributed and are to be returned to Betty Larner (Oakland Center) by Friday.

BIOLOGY CONFERENCE HELD The first in a series of annual conferences on Undergraduate Research was held Saturday, Dec. 8 at OU. Local high school students and faculty were invited to see a number of OU undergraduates present the results of their own original investigations in various fields of biology. Some of these studies have since been published in national scientific journals. The conference represents an effort to establish a dialogue between high school and college faculties and to familiarize high school students with the biology program at OU.

EKLUND TAKES PODIUM Dean Lowell Eklund (continuing education) will moderate a general session of the "Galaxy Conference" in Washington, D.C., this week. He was a member of the planning committee for the conference, which is the first joint meeting of the nation's 20 adult education associations and is expected to attract 4,000 participants. Eklund and Associate Dean Kenneth A. Meade will deliver a joint paper focusing on continuing education for the professions, a field in which OU's Division of Continuing Education claims a leading role.

CHINESE LECTURE A lecture on "Chinese Foreign Policy in the Afterglow of the Cultural Revolution" will be given on Monday, Dec. 8 from 1-2:30 p.m. in the Gold Room (B and C). The lecturer is Daniel Tretiak, a research associate for the Westinghouse Corporation, a political scientist and former editor of the Far Eastern Economic Review. The talk is sponsored by the political science department and the area studies faculty.

SPAIN TRIP FALTERS With the sign-up deadline less than a week away, a jetliner scheduled to take 167 members of the University community on a 12-day trip to Spain next spring was less than one-third full. Details of the offer: luxury hotel accommodations near Malaga, on the Mediterranean; breakfast and dinners included; first-class, non-stop flight on a 707 Pan American jet; \$283 for two-bedroom and \$291 for one-bedroom accommodations; deposit of \$100 required by Friday. Sign-up is in student activities in the Oakland Center.
