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\$991,924 IN GIFTS AND GRANTS RECEIVED BY UNIVERSITY

Gifts and grants totaling \$991,924 were accepted by the Board of Trustees last week. The sum includes three student aid grants totaling \$561,177 from the Department of Health, Education and Welfare. The grants are: \$128,000 for student employment funds to be used under the terms of the College Work Study Program; \$332,077 to be administered under terms of the National Defense Student Loan Program, and \$101,100 to be used for Educational Opportunity Grants for disadvantaged students.

Three grants from the National Science Foundation were received totaling \$96,050. They were: \$36,370 under the direction of George Feeman (mathematics) to support a summer institute in mathematics for college teachers; \$33,300 under the direction of David Evans (engineering) to support research of statistical tolerancing methods and applications; \$26,380 under the direction of J. D. Hovanesian (engineering) to support a short course in modern engineering application for college teachers.

Two grants totaling \$76,577 for biological sciences research were received from the National Institutes of Health. They were for \$47,236 under direction of Clifford Harding to study control of cell division in the ocular lens, and for \$26,341 under the direction of Arun Roy to study hormonal control of 2U globulin synthesis in rat liver.

TITLES CHANGED

The Board of Trustees last week authorized eight title changes in positions related to the former designation of chancellor. James R. Appleton was named vice president for student affairs; Frederick W. Obear, vice president for academic affairs; Robert W. Swanson, vice president for business affairs; John DeCarlo, vice president for public affairs; Elmer B. Cooper, assistant president for urban affairs; Herbert N. Stoutenberg, assistant president for administration; M. Patricia Houtz, assistant vice president for student affairs, and John W. Tapp, assistant to the vice president for student affairs.

NAMED ACTING DEAN

G. Philip Johnson (mathematics) was named acting dean of graduate study in a change of assignment approved last week by the Board of Trustees. Other changes approved by the board were those promoting Robert J. Christina and James Clatworthy from instructorships to assistant professorships in education.

C-T ELECTION SLATED

The Michigan Employment Relations Commission will conduct an election to determine whether the Clerical-Technical Association shall represent the permanent C-T employees, either on the bi-weekly or monthly payroll, as their exclusive representative for the purposes of collective bargaining. The election will be held in Room 126 of the Oakland Center on Tuesday, Nov. 24, 1970. All clerical-technical employees desiring to vote should be released by their departments. The election will be held between the hours of 8 and 11 a.m. and noon to 4 p.m.
