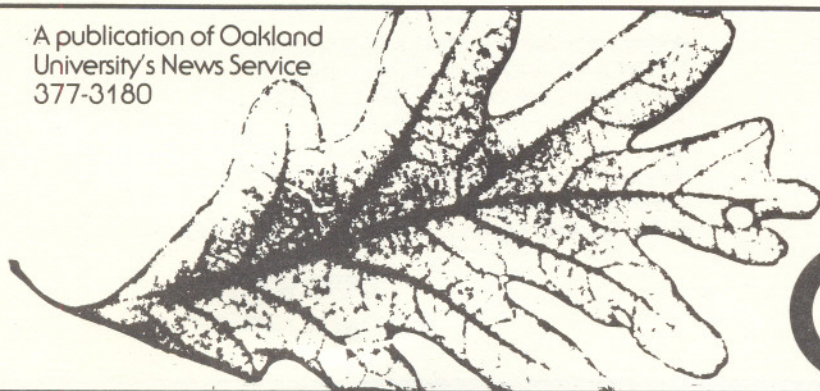




OU NEWS

Grant List

The OU Board of Trustees accepted \$551,697 in gifts and grants during the June meeting.

The sum includes \$357,958 in support of departments, staff, schools, and colleges.

Among the major grants were four from the National Institutes of Health:

- \$54,105 to Lewis N. Pino, director of research services, to be distributed as biomedical research support grants.
- \$68,349 under the direction of M. Kazem Mostafapour, Institute of Biological Sciences, for research entitled "Beta Crystallins and Their Role in Normal and Cataractous Lenses."
- \$85,216 under the direction of Kenneth Hightower, Institute of Biological Sciences, for work on "The Role of Cations in Cataract Development."
- \$33,696 to Frank J. Giblin, Institute of Biological Sciences, for research on the "Role of Sulfhydryl Groups in X-Ray and Other Cataracts."

The United States Army Tank-Automotive Command made a grant of \$49,878 under the direction of Nan K. Loh, engineering, for his work on vehicle systems.

Announced earlier but accepted at the June meeting was a \$30,600 grant to Donald Warren, sociology and anthropology, for a study of the Oakland County labor market. The funds came from the county.

Firms, corporations, and individuals contributed \$92,052 to the Meadow Brook Festival/Theatre Fund Drive. Some \$46,961 was contributed to the OU President's Club/OU Foundation.

Senate Meets

The Oakland University Senate will meet July 7 and July 8 at 2 p.m. in 204 O'Dowd Hall to take up consideration of a final version of the university's role and mission statement.

Champagne Appointed

OU President Joseph E. Champagne has been appointed to a one-year term on the Board of Directors of the Economic Club of Detroit.

He was one of eight new directors named at the annual meeting held May 10.

Other new members named with President Champagne were the honorable John Feikens, Chief U.S. District Judge; Gerald Greenwald, Chrysler Corporation; Erma Henderson, president, Detroit Common Council; Richard E. Marburger, Lawrence Institute of Technology; P. Gerald Mills, the J.L. Hudson

Company; Raymond W. Spinola, Deloitte Haskins & Sells; and Robert W. Stewart, Primark Corporation.

The Economic Club of Detroit was organized in 1934 to provide a forum in which members could gain a perspective on the domestic and international events of the day. Its membership now includes men and women in business, labor, education, and industry. It serves as an educational institution, as a convener of diverse groups with a common interest, and as a platform for debate and discussion.

New Lectureship

A resident lectureship, an accredited course in Judaica, has been endowed for the 1982-83 academic year by the Jewish Chautauqua Society at Oakland University. The lectureship will be held by Rabbi Harold Loss of Temple Israel, West Bloomfield, Michigan.

Rabbi Loss graduated from the University of Florida in Gainesville with a B.A. cum laude in Comparative Religion. He was ordained at Hebrew Union College-Jewish

Institute of Religion, receiving a Master of Hebrew Letters degree. Rabbi Loss serves on the faculty of the College of Jewish Studies and is a member of the Rabbinical Commission of Detroit and the National Commission on Gerontology of the Union of American Hebrew Congregations. The endowment at Oakland University is part of 118 lectureships granted this year nationwide. Rabbi Loss will teach the course on Tuesdays and Thursdays starting with the fall semester.

Tom Adams, master electrician who retired from OU in January after serving the university since 1962, died June 21 in Mt. Sinai Hospital in Detroit. Funeral arrangements were handled through the Barksdale Funeral Home in Detroit with services held June 26. Burial was in Findlay, Ohio.

Harvey Hohauser is leaving the Urban Affairs Center and OU to accept a position with Detroit Bank and Trust. Colleagues in the Urban Affairs Center invite the OU community to a farewell party for Hohauser. The party will be held between 3 and 5 p.m. on July 6 in the Gold Room of the Oakland Center.

Faculty Lecture, Publish

Janice Schimmelman and John Cameron, art and art history, have received a grant (\$10,000) from the Michigan History Division, Department of State to survey the architecture of Oakland County. These funds are provided to the state by the U.S. Heritage Conservation and Recreation, Department of the Interior. The present grant represents phase III of this continuing project. Cameron also received a grant-in-aid (\$3,000) from the American Council of Learned Societies for research this summer on twelfth century Early Gothic architectural sculpture in France.

Virinder K. Moudgil, biological sciences, presented a paper entitled "Tungstate Inhibition of the Nuclear Uptake of Heat Activated Rat Liver Glucocorticoid-Receptor Complex" at the 66th annual meeting of the Federation of American Societies for Experimental Biology, held in New Orleans (April 15-23, 1982). The co-authors of the paper are Oakland students Therese Quattrocchi and Shaun Healy. The studies were supported by a grant from the National Institutes of Health.

Rosalind Andreas, student and urban affairs, and Betty L. Reisman, Wayne State University, presented a paper "Adapting Student Services to the Older Returning Student" at the recent American Personnel and Guidance Association annual convention in Detroit.

Rosalind Andreas, student and urban affairs, has authored a chapter in the newly published *Student Leadership Programs in Higher Education* (Carbondale, Ill.: ACPA Press, Southern Illinois University, 1981). The title of the chapter in the work edited by Dennis C. Roberts is "Commuting Students."

John M. McKinley, physics, has had a paper entitled "On the Theory of Gamma-Ray Amplification Through Stimulated Annihilation Radiation" published in *Astrophysical Journal* (May 1, 1982). His co-authors were R. Ramaty and F.C. Jones of NASA/Goddard Space Flight Center. They also presented related papers entitled "Gamma-Ray Line Emission Through GRASAR Action" and "GRASAR Action and Gamma-Ray Burst" at the 1982 spring meeting of the American Physical Society in Washington, D.C.

Carl Westhoff, assistant director of graduate admissions, spoke on "Graduate Recruiting in the Corporate Sector" at the national conference of the American Association of Collegiate Registrars and Admissions Officers held recently in Kansas City, MO.

Donald E. Morse, rhetoric, organized and chaired a session on "C.S. Lewis: Language, Myth and Fantasy" at the third international conference on the Fantastic in the Arts, held recently at Florida Atlantic University. Respondent for the session was Brian Murphy, Department of English, who discussed the re-examination of C.S. Lewis's work as a parallel to our current reassessment of Freud. His essay, "Monkeys, Changelings and Asses: Audience, Fantasy and Belief," has been accepted for publication in *Scope of the Fantastic, II*, edited by William Coyle to be published by Greenwood Press in 1983.

Wilma Garcia and Sally Pierce of rhetoric recently did an "in service" day at Meadow Brook Hall entitled "Writing Across the Curriculum" for secondary teachers of writing from Pontiac Northern High School.

Roderic E. Righter, SHES, delivered a speech to the National Association of Elementary School Principals annual meeting in Atlanta, Georgia. The speech was entitled "The Reasonable Principal: A Winner in Legal Confrontation." Further, excerpts of the speech were featured in the publication *Education, U.S.A.*, with the entire presentation being taped for use by the National Association.

At the same meeting he conducted an Administrative Skills Workshop for some 500 principals on "Ministerial versus Discretionary" decision making. This makes the tenth consecutive year that he has been asked by the National Association to conduct workshops covering various aspects of the administrator's role and responsibility.

A new edition of J.S. Bach's *Sonata in E-flat* (BWV 1031) has recently appeared under James Dawson's name with Ethos Publications of New York. This controversial sonata does not appear in the new collected edition of the elder Bach's works, having possibly been written by his son, C.P.E. Bach. Dawson's corroborating research was done in collaboration with Lee Patrick of the University of Louisville and Ronald Caravan of Syracuse University. Dawson, music, has been invited by the Clarinet and Saxophone Society of Great Britain to present his paper "The Music of Charles Dakin: Atonal Music in Theory and Practice" at their forthcoming international convention to be held this July in London. While in London, he will appear on the BBC program *Kaleidoscope* to discuss his recently published book *Music for Saxophone by British Composers: An Annotated Bibliography*, Dorn Publications, Massachusetts.

Health Benefits

Margaret D. Taylor, staff benefits manager, announces that the university's current health care program provides for continuation of coverage for college students through the month in which he/she ceases to be a full-time student. If employees currently have enrolled dependents over 19 years of age who are graduating from college or are otherwise no longer attending college, please contact the Staff Benefits Office to review their status.

Coverage for dependents not enrolled full-time in college terminates at the end of the calendar year in which they turn 19 or when they cease being a full-time student.

Student Awards

Egbert W. Henry, biological sciences and coordinator of Preprofessional Health Sciences Advisory Committee, indicates that Leon Davis, a sophomore, majoring in biology, has been selected to attend a summer enrichment program for minority students interested in pursuing a medical career, sponsored by Howard University Medical School in Washington, D.C. In addition, David M. Bracciano, a junior majoring in biology, has received a scholarship to work at Yale University Medical School, in the department of pathology. Last summer Bracciano worked in the pathology department at The University of Chicago as a scholarship recipient.

As a matter of policy, use of charter or private aircraft is not permitted when traveling on official university business. Such travel would not be covered by insurance and therefore cannot be authorized.

New BGS Legislation

The Faculty Senate has passed the following new legislation regarding the B.G.S. degree.

"To obtain a Bachelor of General Studies degree, the student must successfully complete at least the last twenty-four hours as an admitted candidate to the program; and that candidacy be authorized by the university and the Faculty Council for General Studies when the student has approval for his/her plan-of-work and rationale for the Bachelor of General Studies degree from the Bachelor of General Studies Advising Committee."

Elaine Chapman-Moore, director of general studies, explains, "This would

require students to complete their plans-of-work and rationales in a timely fashion, and to be in the program under the guidance of a faculty adviser for a reasonable length of time. This allows for a more meaningful contact with the faculty adviser, provides for a timely proof of academic direction, and discourages the 'escapee' using B.G.S. simply as a quick exit tool. Students wishing to enter the B.G.S. program should be encouraged to do so in a timely fashion so as to avoid complications resulting from this legislation. Econ For Non-Majors

Each semester, starting this fall, the economics faculty will offer a new course, ECN 150 (Basic Economics) aimed specifically at non-majors. It may be used toward the social science distribution requirement for the College of Arts and Sciences and will allow you to take additional economics electives.

ECN 150 is for the student who is planning some other major, but who wants a good basic understanding of economics. It covers similar material to the other introductory economics courses (ECN 200-201 or ECN 210) but aims to give an overview rather than a detailed training in the methods of economics.

Following ECN 150, a student becomes

eligible to take any economics elective from the following list:

- ECN 309 Urban Economic Problems
- ECN 310 Economics of the Environment
- ECN 321 Money, Credit, and the Economy
- ECN 326 Economic Development
- ECN 328 American Economic Development
- ECN 338 Economics of Human Resources
- ECN 341 The Soviet Economy
- ECN 347 Problems in Health Economics

Following ECN 150, a student may also enroll in ECN 201, and in exceptional cases, you could be placed into ECN 301 in order to pursue a major or minor in economics.
