#### Pulitzer winner gives lectures

Gary Snyder, winner of the 1975 Pulitzer Prize for Poetry, will give two free public lectures here Nov. 7 and 8 as the second of seven speakers in the President's Club Lecture Series.

Snyder will talk on "Poetry in a Whole Culture" at 8 p.m. on Nov. 7 and on "The New Age and the Old Ways" at 1 p.m. on Nov. 8. Both programs are in Varner Recital Hall.

The lecturer is a 1951 graduate of Reed College where he received degrees in anthropology and literature. He later studied Japanese and Chinese civilization at the University of California at Berkeley.

Snyder won the Pulitzer Prize in 1975 for his work entitled <u>Turtle Island</u>. His latest book, <u>The Old Ways</u>, was published this year. The poet has worked at various jobs as seaman, forest lookout, logger, and laborer. He says the rhythms of his poems seem to follow the rhythm of the physical work he happens to be doing at the time.

Following Snyder will be Elvis Stahr, president of the National Audubon Society, who will speak on Dec. 1 on "The Environment, the Economy, and Our National Heritage." The lectures are supported by a grant from the President's Club, an organization of approximately 100 area citizens who support the university and its programs. In addition to the public talks, the speakers also meet with OU students, faculty, and staff.

## Professors give child abuse presentation

Mary Otto, education, and David G. Smith, formerly on the faculty of the School of Education and now teaching at the University of Tulsa, were selected to make a presentation to the National Council on Family Relations which met in San Diego on October 12-15.

The title of their address was "The Child Abuse Consultant: A Cognitive/Behavioral Consulting Model." In the presentation, Otto and Smith presented a six-step consultation model designed to interrupt the cycle of child abuse. Their plan stressed immediate intervention and provided for the restructuring of parenting style to increase the probability of permanent change.

More than 1,000 specialists on various phases of family life were expected to attend the meeting, which featured more than 200 programs, seminars, research reports and speeches. The theme of the annual meeting was "Values, Morals, Ethics, and the American Family."

Riley was honored as part of the Oct. 21-22 homecoming festivities at Northern Colorado. The award was based on professional and community service. Her magazine article details how a handicapped youth was helped through the OU Lowry Early Childhood Center.

#### Applications being accepted for grants

#### Alumni telefund grows

More than \$14,500 has been raised by the Alumni Association in the first two weeks of its 1977 telefund. Approximately 160 volunteers have obtained pledges from 1,200 donors in the first six nights of calling.

The success of the telefund assures that the 1977 fund drive will exceed last year's record-breaking totals by several thousand dollars. The total raised by the alumni association in 1971 was \$31,000.

Effective November 1, 1977 the reimbursement rate for the use of privately owned automobiles while on authorized university business will be increased from 14¢ to 17¢ per mile. Faculty traveling under terms of the AAUP contract will continue to be reimbursed at the contractually prescribed rate of 15¢.

Also, the Motor Pool mileage charge for automobiles will be increased from  $14\c$  to  $16\c$ .

These increases are being made to keep our rates more in line with increased costs of owning and operating automobiles. The Federal, State and County governments reimburse at the 17c rate.

Frey and Hohauser developed and participated in a February, 1977 conference given by the State of Michigan Office of Services to the Aging. Many of the Frey-Hohauser techniques presented at that conference have already been implemented by local aging programs throughout the state.

The two covered planning volunteer programs, utilization of community resources, recruitment techniques, record keeping, program evaluation, and other topics at the San Diego conference.
