Tickets at \$20 per person include golf and buffet dinner.

Friends Swim Meet Sets Record

The Eighth Annual Friends of Oakland Swim Meet raised \$1,476 to top the previous high of \$832 set in the 1972 meet. The funds support various university functions including the athletic program.

The Amateur Athletic Union (A.A.U.) sanctioned age group swimming meet was originally sponsored by the Friends of Oakland, a group of supporters aiding the university before a large alumni body was available. While the meet is now sponsored by the Alumni Association in cooperation with the physical education faculty, it retains its original title.

Alumni volunteers operate the concession stand and donate cupcakes to be sold. A luncheon for swimming meet officials is donated and prepared by the alumni volunteers. Chairperson for the 1973 officials luncheon was Beverly Miller, class of 1963, and the coordinator of the swimming meet was Leon Mellen, class of 1967.

Funds Allocated From 1973 Fund Drive

Allocation of funds in the successful 1973 Alumni Association Fund Drive was made by the Association's Board of Directors at the March meeting.

The division follows: Kresge Library, \$5,000; Alumni Undergraduate Research Fund, \$800[•] Alumni Athletic Fund, \$205; Alumni Short-Term Student Loan Fund, \$180; Isaac Jones Memorial Scholarship Fund, \$80; Upperclassman Grant Fund, \$80; and Students for the Village Fund, \$60. Split tickets at \$10 each are available for those wishing to participate in either one but not both of the above events. Charge for a foursome is \$75. Reservations may be obtained by calling 377-2158.



The Pioneer Club consists of OU Alumni who contribute \$50 or more annually to the Alumni Fund. There are currently forty-seven members, twenty-eight of them new members.



ALUMNI FUND GOAL IS \$10,000

OU Alumni Association Annual Fund Drive chairpersons, Don and Judy Moran of '63, have announced a 1974 Fund Drive goal of \$10,000. The drive opens May 1. "We're concentrating on raising the participation level this year, hoping for a 50% increase over last years total," Don commented. He adds, "Five percent of Oakland alumni participated in the '73 drive. With the national average at 17%, OU alums have a challenge I feel they can meet." The '74 Fund Drive is especially concerned with providing support in the following areas:

Kresge Library. The '73 alumni gift of \$5,000 to Kresge Library, which is being matched by the Friends of Kresge Library, made a sizable impact upon the library budget. However, the library's needs are ever-present and growing. The Alumni Fund will continue to channel support in its direction.

Scholarships. Alumni Memorial Scholarship. A new scholarship fund initiated by a resolution passed at the March 11 Alumni Association Board of Directors meeting. Established to honor deceased alums, purpose of the scholarship will be decided at some future time.

Isaac Jones Memorial Scholarship. Originally begun by alumni after the

death of Oakland University's first Black graduate, this scholarship aids deserving Black students from the Pontiac area.

Special projects. Alumni Athletic Fund. Physical education is becoming more and more important to students with heightened awareness of the necessity of physical fitness and relaxation. The Alumni Athletic Fund was initiated to channel support for this growing part of campus life.

Undergraduate Research Grant Fund. This fund is the only source of support for research at the undergraduate level. Yearly funding at approximately \$1,000 allows five or six grants to be awarded. As 30 to 40 students apply for these grants, it is hoped that this level of funding can be substantially increased in 1974.

The Village Project. Initiated by students, the Village Project proposes to preserve the original beauty of the Meadow Brook Estates by renovating the creamery, the grainery and the barns just south of Dodge and Hannah Halls for use in several areas. Included in the project are a film theatre, stage theatre, open market, student art and craft centers, etc. Students for the Village have been challenged by President O'Dowd to raise \$10,000 for their project. to match funds collected by the students. As of March 25, close to \$7,000 had been raised. As an excitingly different project, The Village is in need of support from all sources. Oakland University Fifteenth Birthday Open House September 29

Swimming Team 7th in NCAA College Division

Oakland University swimmers continued where they left off at the Motor City championships, where the team was first, with 79 points and a seventh place finish in the NCAA Division II (college division) swimming championships last weekend at Long Beach, California.

Freshman Paul Karas of Rochester was outstanding as he won the 500-yard freestyle in 4:44.4, 10 seconds faster than his previous best time.

He also captured fifth in the 1,650-yard freestyle in the 16:48.5 and sixth in the 200-yard freestyle in 1:45.4. All three swims were personal bests and Oakland University records.

Paul also swam on two Oakland relay teams that placed in the top 12 to become an All-American swimmer in five different events.

Rod Mitchell, a freshman from Flint, captured All-American honors five times with an eighth place finish in the 200-yard individual medley in 2:01.5, a fifth place in the 400-yard individual medley in 4:19.3 and as a member of all three of Oakland's All-American relay teams. Rod's leadoff leg of the 400-yard freestyle relay was clocked in 48.57 seconds for a school record in the 100-yard freestyle.

Bob Jenrow, another freshman, placed 12th in the 200-yard breast-stroke in 2:17.3.

Alumni Active in Careers Conference

The OU Career Advising and Placement Office sponsored a day-long student conference Tuesday, March 5. Professionals from many fields discussed their careers.

The program ran from 9:00 a.m. until 4:20 p.m. in a variety of rooms in the Oakland Center and it offered insights into careers in automotive industry, banking, civil service, computer science, education, law, medicine, transportation, and urban analysis.

Five Students Win Alumni Association Research Grants

Five Oakland University students have been awarded undergraduate research grants by the university.

The stipends of up to \$200 each are given on a competitive basis by the University Research Committee and supported by funds from the Alumni Association.

The 1974 winners, their research topics and hometowns are listed below:

Christine Nykyforiak, a biology major, received \$200 to study the enzyme systems of the freshwater snail. Miss Nykyforiak's residence is in Warren.

Irene Ann Gennick, a chemistry major, received \$200 to study synthesis and characterization of substituted carborane. Miss Gennick also resides in Warren.

Terry L. Fraver, 739 Wilwood, Rochester, received \$200 for a study of the relationship between Irish and American radical unionism before World War One. He is a history major.

Rebecca Failor of Sterling Heights received \$180 for her research on electron spin resonance of DNA fragments. Miss Failor is a chemistry major.

Deborah C. Davis, a biology major, received \$200 for studies on regulation of Nitrate reductase. Her home is in Detroit.

GOVERNOR RECOMMENDS \$12,841,000 APPROPRIATION FOR OU

Governor William Milliken has recommended a \$12,841,000 general fund budget appropriation for OU for fiscal 1974-75. The figure is part of an \$18,575,000 gross budget for the institution.

OU's recommendations are part of the governor's overall state budget recommendation now being considered in the Michigan Legislature.

The OU gross budget is composed of the \$12,841,000 appropriation recommendation and \$5,734,000 in institutional revenue. The revenue is derived from tuition and fees and miscellaneous income. The 1974-75 appropriation is \$994,000 higher than the 1973-74 figure and institutional revenue is up \$264,000 over the current fiscal year.

The \$994,000 and \$264,000 increases make the proposed 1974-75 gross budget \$1,258,000 higher than 1973-74.

John Motzer

John Motzer chosen "Mr. Soccer"

John Motzer, soccer coach at Oakland University, has been selected as "Mr. Michigan Soccer--1973," in the first such award made by the Michigan Soccer Association.

Motzer has been active in various levels of soccer in the Detroit area for over 20 years. He is the only person in Michigan to hold a "B" coaching license from the United States Soccer Federation. Motzer guided OU to an 11-2-2 record in 1973.

Motzer was a player with four teams in the Detroit Soccer League. They were the Detroit Bavarians, St. Andrew Scots, Sport Club 24 and the Carpathia Kickers. He was named 30 times to play for the Detroit All-Stars. In addition, he coached the Kickers to league and state championships in 1971 and 1972.

In 1967, Motzer was assigned by the Michigan Soccer Association the task of developing youth soccer which has grown to three youth leagues with over 50 teams now organized.

For his contributions to the development of soccer in the Wolverine state, John Motzer was the "honored guest" of the Michigan Soccer Association at its annual general meeting on Sunday, March 24, 1974 at the German-American Cultural Center.

New O.U. Golf Course

The Board of Trustees has authorized OU to proceed with construction of the first nine holes of a proposed 18-hole golf course and teaching facility.

The resolution stated that, "Resolved, that the proposal to the president to construct an 18-hole golf course and related facilities, the construction of which is to be financed entirely by private contributions, is hereby approved, and the president is authorized to contract for a nine-hole golf course and teaching complex immediately since funds are available and to contract for the second nine-hole course as private funds for this purpose become available.

The first nine holes and teaching complex will cost \$204,000, a sum already in hand from an anonymous donor. Construction should be completed by mid-1975.
