

Seven on Primary Ballot for District 2 Nomination

Oakland County Republicans are going to play a game of watching the Democrats go by when it comes to primary race for Pontiac's seat in the State Legislature.

The Republicans have their candidate in Mrs. Paul (Hope) Gorman, unopposed Pontiac housewife who is making her first bid for a political office.

The question that both county Republicans and Democrats wait to be answered is who will be Mrs. Gorman's opposition in the November election. Today there are six candidates for this spot on the Democratic ticket.

- They are:
- (1) Mitchell L. Bacow, Pontiac attorney and unsuccessful candidate for municipal judge in 1954.
 - (2) Linwood L. Flack Jr., former president of the Pontiac National Association for the Advancement of Colored People and presently a metal finisher at General Motors Truck & Coach.
 - (3) Harold A. Grant, president of Fisher Body Local 596, UAW, for five years and unsuccessful candidate for the District 2 post two years ago.
 - (4) Arthur J. Law, three-times mayor of Pontiac and 12 years a city commissioner, presently a grocery store operator.
 - (5) L. D. McLaughlin, Pontiac Motor Division worker since 1935 and city leader in Boy Scout and recreation programs.
 - (6) Robert P. Scott, former secretary-treasurer of the Michigan Federation of Labor and presently legislative agent for state barbers.

Noticeably missing from the Democratic lineup is incumbent Leslie H. Hudson, who held Oakland County's largest, population-wise, district seat in the House of Representatives for four years.

Hudson is a candidate this year for the county's 18th District seat in Congress.

County Democrats promise a fight, whoever their nominee might be Aug. 6, to retain a hold on District 2, one of the two Oakland County legislative posts they occupy.

Meanwhile, County Republicans are pinning big hopes on Mrs. Gorman, 55-year-old mother of four, to wrestle control of the seat from the Democrats for the first time since 1948.

The race for the Democratic nomination attracted the largest turnout of candidates from either party for all 14 county positions being voted on in the Aug. 5 primary.

Democratic candidate Bacow, 42, of 34 Cherokee Rd. chaired a committee of the Oakland County Bar Association to try and create a jury commission several years ago.

Bacow is also an avid amateur radio operator.

He is presently president of the Pontiac chapter of B'nai B'rith, and past commander of Amvets Post 16 here.

Flack is not a newcomer to Democratic circles in the county.

He has served twice as vice chairman at state conventions for county delegates.

1955 president of the NAACP here has been a precinct delegate for 10 years.

The father of four sons, Flack resides at 392 Dittmar Ave.

Grant missed by more than 1,600 votes for the Democratic nomination in 1956.

He did not seek re-election as president of the Fisher local this year in order that he could devote full time to the campaign.

The 41-year-old factory worker has been an employee of the Fisher plant here since 1936. He lives at 481 N. East Blvd.

Since 1948 Law has maintained his own grocery located at 200 Earlmoor Blvd.

Four years later he tried but failed as a Democratic candidate for Congress.

The 58-year-old father of four makes his home at 27 Miami Rd. From 1942 until 1954 Law represented District 4 on the City Commission.

McLaughlin, 40, of 715 Melrose St. is making his first bid for a political office.

The 1936 graduate of Pontiac High School was for four years an officer of a local PTA.

He is presently a member of the City Council PTA on juvenile protection.

Car Runs Amok; Man 90, 5 Others Hurt Slightly

Ninety-year-old Arthur J. Middleton of 183 Greene St. got more than he bargained for yesterday, when he asked for a ride home from church.

Sitting in the front seat of a car outside the First Methodist Church at S. Saginaw and Judson Streets, Middleton was asked to move over to let another passenger in.

As he slid over, he nudged the gear shift, and the car took off. A non-driver, Middleton tried to stop this startling development by putting his foot down — on the brake.

Yup. He hit the gas pedal. He smashed into one passing car, sending it careening into a parked car.

Continuing north on Saginaw Middleton's accelerating auto squeaked between two other cars, and side-swiped a parked taxi, picked up speed, and careened into another parked car and kept going.

The runaway rammed its final victim twice, once in the rear, and then in the front as it flipped around to a stop. Middleton and five others were hospitalized, all with minor injuries.

Nikita Planning New Maneuvers on Summit Talk?

See DeGaulle Proposal for Geneva Parley as Weapon for Reds

LONDON (UPI)—Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev may seize upon Gen. Charles deGaulle's reluctance toward a summit meeting in New York to return to his original proposal for a five-power conference in Geneva, diplomatic sources said today.

The sources pointed to yesterday's charges in the official Soviet Press of American "procrastination" on the projected summit talks and suggested that deGaulle's position gave the Soviet's the opportunity to bounce back with further maneuvers.

It was generally believed in western circles that the arguments set forth in the Soviet press foreshadowed Khrushchev's expected reply to Eisenhower's letter of July 25 in which the President proposed that a meeting on the Middle East crisis be set up by the United Nations Security Council in New York.

Diplomatic sources in Washington expressed doubt that the Soviet press charges meant that Khrushchev would reject Eisenhower's latest conditions for a summit meeting. They recalled that similar Russian attacks were made on early proposals for top-level talks shortly after the current Middle East trouble began.

But western observers in London and Moscow believed that the Soviet Premier might now pounce on de Gaulle's proposal in his letter to Khrushchev Saturday that the meeting be held in Geneva and be limited to Russia, France, Britain, the United States and India.

DeGaulle's reply to Khrushchev accentuated his split with Britain and the United States and further complicated the picture. In addition, the French Premier yesterday started a surprise round of exchanges with France's allies in Continental Europe and North Africa in an apparent bid to act as

Balloonists Tell of Space Travel

Navy Space Explorers Back From a Record Balloon Trip

MINNEAPOLIS (AP)—Space explorers Malcolm Ross and M. Lee Lewis survived a 2,000-foot bounce when they came back to earth yesterday from a record-breaking balloon flight.

The 3 1/2-hour trip was man's longest flight into the stratosphere. The balloonists reached 22,000 feet. The fliers had their toughest decision after a release mechanism failed to detach the massive balloon from the gondola as they were landing.

The 17-story gas bag banged the round aluminum capsule onto a pasture in east-central North Dakota, then carried Ross and Lewis aloft again when a firing device failed to release the gondola.

Ross, a Navy commander, suffered a slight cut about his left eye, but he and Lewis began figuring how to get on the ground and stay there.

"Parachuting out of the gondola was one of the alternatives we discussed," Ross said. "But we're balloon men, not parachute men."

They tried the descent again, and this time were able to release the balloon. The gondola was dragged about six feet over the hilly pasture, then tipped over on its side.

Ross and Lewis climbed out of the oxygen-rich capsule and lit their first cigarettes in nearly a day and a half.

Working constantly on some 50 experiments, Ross and Lewis enjoyed a comfort never before accorded to high-altitude fliers. They never had to wear oxygen masks.

Their gondola was pressurized with the same air pressure they breathed before the balloon soared out of a deep open pit in the earth early Saturday.

It was the first time an airship, propelled or free flying, was equipped with a "full atmosphere," the Navy said. During much of the flight, they moved about without their space helmets.

They ate candy bars and sandwiches, drank water and slept only about an hour during the flight.

They carried a small television camera aloft and sent America's first stratosphere TV pictures back to the ground.

Their flight was designed primarily as a test for an ascension this November when an astronomer

Dulles Aligns U. S. With Allies in Baghdad Pact

British Prime Minister Says Security Alliance Will Continue

LONDON (AP)—John Foster Dulles assured the Baghdad Pact nations today the United States would act, even at great risk, to safeguard their independence and integrity against any threats.

The American secretary of state, in the role of observer, was addressing the fifth session of the Baghdad Pact Council which opened in Lancaster House with one member missing—Iraq.

Dulles' statement was made during a survey of the Middle East scene, in the course of which he set forth the significance of the American military landings in Lebanon.

British Prime Minister Harold Macmillan pledged today that the Baghdad Pact alliance ringing Russia's southern frontier would continue as "a means of collective security."

"We intend to maintain the aims of our alliance and to consider how to do this in the light of our present situation," Macmillan said in a speech opening the fifth session of the pact's council.

By "present situation" he referred apparently to the recent revolution in Iraq, an original member of the alliance. The new Iraqi government has not yet left the pact, but is expected to do so.

Authoritative sources said Dulles also informed the pact members that the United States eventually will have to recognize the revolutionary regime in Iraq.

Macmillan met in the opening public session with the prime ministers of Turkey, Iran and Pakistan.

"Our purpose," Macmillan said, "is to reaffirm the intentions expressed in that instrument (the Baghdad Pact) as a means for our collective security."

Macmillan noted "we meet today under the shadow of the revolution" (Continued on Page 2, Col. 6)

BEIRUT, Lebanon (UPI) — A U.S. Marine killed yesterday was accidentally shot by one of his own buddies while on an unauthorized visit to a small village, a Marine spokesman said today. It had been reported he was killed by a rebel sniper.

The Marine, a private first class, who was not identified, was killed by a single bullet through the head around noon yesterday. He was in front of his company position south of the Beirut International Airport. His body was brought back from an olive grove by other Marines.

The Marines were reported "fighting mad" when news circulated that the shooting was done by rebel snipers in the hills.

Continue Search for Lake Victim

Kentucky Youth, 18, Drowns in Maceday Swimming to Raft

Waterford Township Police and Oakland County Sheriff's Deputies are continuing a search begun last night in Maceday Lake for the body of an 18-year-old Kentucky youth.

Shelby D. Grissom, who was here from Kentucky visiting his uncle, Harry J. Pedigo, of 7722 Austere St., Waterford Township, drowned while swimming in the lake last night.

Police said the youth had been swimming with two friends Sally Ann Morgan, 15, and her sister, Susan, 12, both of 3913 Nefley Rd., Waterford Township.

The three had decided to swim to a raft about 50 yards off the west shore. The girls said Grissom went down in about 35 feet of water only about 10 feet from the raft.

They told police they tried to hold him up but the youth was too much for them. The Independence Township Fire Department stood by with portable floodlights aiding eight sheriff's department divers until 2 a.m.

They were nabbed by agents from the Detroit Narcotics Bureau, State Police and the United States Customs who patrolled four main highways leading into Detroit for 36 hours.

Detective Inspector Russell J. McCarty said the vigil began after his bureau learned that a huge dope shipment was due in Detroit during the weekend. He said 23 agents in seven unmarked cars patrolled U.S. 12, U.S. 112 and the Willow Run Expressway.

The inspector said the only information on the men was that they were in a black four-door sedan with Texas license plates.

The auto was spotted at noon yesterday about two miles outside Detroit. According to McCarty, enough marijuana was found in the car to make more than 679,000 cigarettes.

"These men are merely couriers," he said. "They work for a ring or a big boss, probably in Mexico."

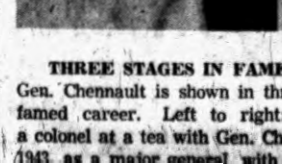

Explorer IV on Five-Year Space Trip

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) — The world's newest satellite is off to a spectacular start on a five-year journey through space. Scientists keeping a critical eye on Explorer IV announced that the heaviest and most vital of the three U.S. moons in orbit performed smoothly during its first 36 hours.

The launching by the amazingly reliable Jupiter-C rocket last Saturday was so successful, in fact, that Explorer IV probably will be the most durable Army satellite yet.

Officials at first expressed concern that the latest Army venture might be short lived.

As it looped through an elliptical orbit every 110 minutes, the satellite beeped out loud and clear signals on an intense field of radiation 600 miles in outer space.

Latest estimates placed Explorer IV as close to earth as 163 miles and as high as 1,373 miles as it swings around the globe an average of 13 times a day. The orbital path, a new one for U.S. satellites, carries Explorer IV over the more densely populated areas of the northern latitudes. It already has circled twice over the heart of the Soviet Union.

25 State Deaths Set 1958 Record

By United Press International — A 1958 record 25 persons died on Michigan's lakes and highways during the weekend with 12 of the deaths coming in water accidents — another record.

The toll surpassed by 2 the previous regular weekend high of 11 traffic, 9 drowning and 3 fire victims who died June 27-29. It was only 5 short of the 30 persons who met violent, accidental death during the long three-day Fourth of July holiday.

All but the last two highway victims died in single fatality mishaps.

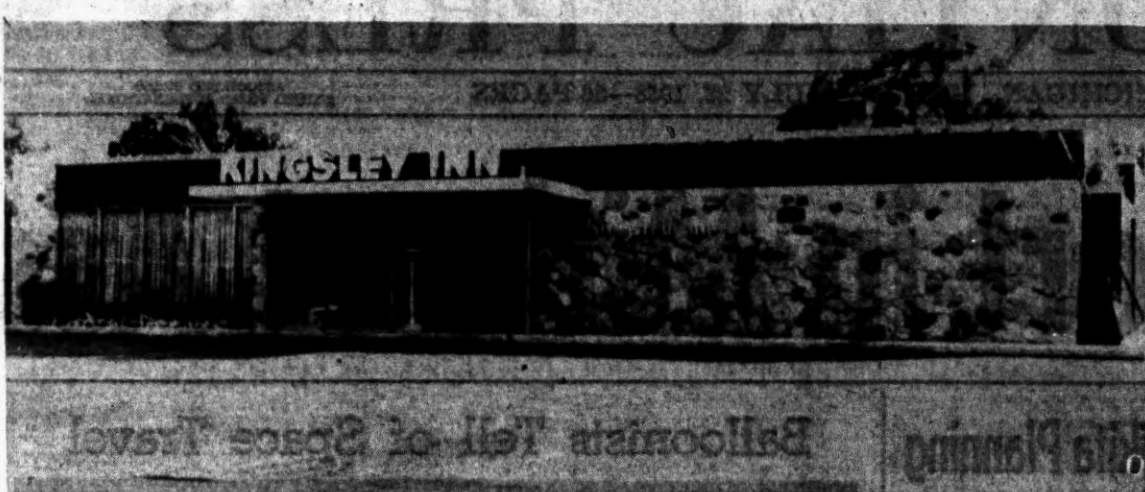

Oakland Police Net Snares Fugitive Jackson Desperado

Captured fugitive Robert D. Kelley, who led police in a manhunt from Jackson to Flint Saturday, failed to pierce a tight Oakland County police net designed to ensnare him late Saturday.

Kelley, 29, was taken into custody by troopers Maurice Larsen and Gary Powell of the Pontiac State Police Post.

The escapee had picked up a cab at the Holly Greyhound Bus Station. The cab driver, Ronald Tomlinson, 23, of 306 E. Union St., Fenton, said,

"I had an idea who he was after he'd been in the cab for a while. All I thought about was figuring up a way to get rid of him."

Tomlinson said that Kelley talked only about the weather during the 20 to 30 minute ride.

"At first he wanted to go to Pontiac, then he changed his mind and wanted the edge of Detroit," said Tomlinson.

Holding Suspect in Fatal Beating

Police at Kalamazoo Release Five Juveniles Arrested With Him

KALAMAZOO (AP) — A man identified by Kalamazoo police as Lynford Neal, 33, of Fennville, was being held today for investigation in the death beating of Ervin Schoenaker, 45, of Pullman.

Five juveniles who were taken into custody with Neal were released after questioning.

Neal and the juveniles were taken into custody today by Kalamazoo County Deputy Sheriff William Swim who said he found the group sitting in Schoenaker's car which was parked on a Kalamazoo street.

The group was turned over to Kalamazoo city police who said they were satisfied the juveniles were not connected with Schoenaker's death. They said they planned to hold Neal for further questioning.

Officers said Neal told them he rented the car from Schoenaker in a bar at Grand Junction Saturday night. Schoenaker's body was found dumped near a deserted road 15 miles west of Allegan yesterday.

They said Neal told them he drove the car to Eaton Rapids after renting it and picked up the juveniles yesterday while returning to Fennville.

The Day in Birmingham To Urge Same Tax Rate for Twelve Town Drain

Clark Hagstrom tonight will recommend to the Birmingham City Commission that it continue the present 1.25 millage tax rate for 1958 Twelve Town Drain assessments. This will amount to \$79,358.85 in tax money, he said.

Since Birmingham made its first payment in 1953, millage has gone up from .25 to the current rate, he said. Presently the city has \$200,000 in its Twelve Town Drain fund.

Hagstrom said it now appears that a 2.25 to 2.50 millage rate will be required in the future to cover each year's payment based on a 30-year bond issue.

A hearing will be held on a special assessment role for the Randall street surfacing in the Quanton Lake subdivision.

City Engineer Grover Sorenson will present a list of more than 350 sections of needed sidewalk repairs, the majority of which are on city-owned properties.

Private property owners will have 30 days from the date of notification to replace or repair sidewalks themselves.

A fire yesterday morning caused an estimated \$4,000 in damages at the home of Charles Houtart, 780 Wagner St., Bloomfield Township. The Township Volunteer Fire Department, which battled the blaze for two hours, said the fire was caused by a pan of grease which ignited on the kitchen stove and spread to the walls.

a "third force" spokesman at the East-West parley.

De Gaulle was believed trying to round up support for his view that a summit meeting in New York within the framework of the 11-nation U.N. Security Council would be thrown out of focus because of publicity and excitement.

Both the Soviet government newspaper Izvestia and the Communist Party Organ Pravda accused the United States of resorting to a new "trick" to avoid a full-dress discussion of the Middle East crisis.

Izvestia charged that U. S. "ruling circles" were "placing all possible procedural gimmicks" in the path of an East-West parley. Pravda accused Americans of being "afraid of responsibility for aggression already committed." It charged the United States with trying to "wriggle out of discussion of this problem by drowning it in a pile of procedural red tape."

Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru of India said yesterday that before going to any summit meeting he would have to know "what conditions, if any," were attached to the invitation. He stressed that so far he has not accepted any invitation—only a "suggestion" by Khrushchev that a top-level Middle East conference is needed.

Sun Outshine in Lab

BEDFORD, Mass. — Brightness 700 times greater than at the sun's surface and temperatures above 400,000 degrees have been achieved with apparatus developed at the Air Force Cambridge Research Center, Bedford.

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. Mike Mansfield (D-Mont) said today it might be a good thing if Congress wound up its session before the start of a United Nations summit conference on the Middle East.

Congress is moving into a stretch drive with some members talking of an Aug. 9 adjournment and others saying it's possible within a week after that, Aug. 11 has been mentioned as a possible starting date if President Eisenhower, Soviet Premier Khrushchev and other heads of state meet in New York.

"I think President Eisenhower probably would feel free to act if Congress were not in session and, as it were, looking over his shoulder at a summit conference," Mansfield said in an interview.

"I would assume the President would keep in close touch with the congressional leaders if we are not in session. In any event he can carry on negotiations with the knowledge he has the united support of the country behind him."

Eisenhower's Middle East policies have come under fire in the Senate and more of this running debate can be expected as long as Congress is in session.

Sen. Wayne Morse (D-Ore), for instance, has told the Senate he will document for it his charge that Eisenhower's decision to send troops to Lebanon was taken "in clear violation of the Constitution."

Mansfield and Senators J. William Fulbright (D-Ark) and Hubert Humphrey (D-Minn), among others, have criticized what they called Eisenhower's reluctant attitude toward meeting Soviet Premier Khrushchev at the summit.

1 cucumber
small onion

1 cup mayonnaise or salad dressing
