

New engineering dean starts in January

Oakland University has selected an internationally known faculty member from Wayne State University to serve as dean of the OU School of Engineering.

The appointment of Mohammed S. Ghausi, 47, was approved by the OU Board of Trustees on October 4. Since 1974, Ghausi has been professor and chairperson of the WSU Department of Electrical Engineering. He begins his new duties January 1, 1978.

Ghausi has had previous teaching experience at the University of California at Berkeley and at New York University. Prior to coming to WSU, he was section head, electrical sciences and analysis, engineering division, National Science Foundation.

He is a member of numerous professional organizations and honorary societies, including Phi Beta Kappa and Sigma Xi, the national honorary research society. In 1973 he won the Fellow Award of the Institute of Electrical and Electronics Engineers, and in 1974 he was chosen the institute's regional outstanding lecturer. In 1973 he was U.S. delegate to the Popov Conference in Russia.

Ghausi is a native of Kabul, Afghanistan. He received the B.S. degree in electrical engineering with highest honors from the University of California at Berkeley, and he went on to receive M.S. and Ph.D. degrees from that institution.

He is an active consultant, guest lecturer, and contributor to professional journals. The Ghausi family resides in Birmingham. He replaces Paul R. Pasley who resigned last September to become dean of engineering, University of Illinois, Chicago Circle Campus.

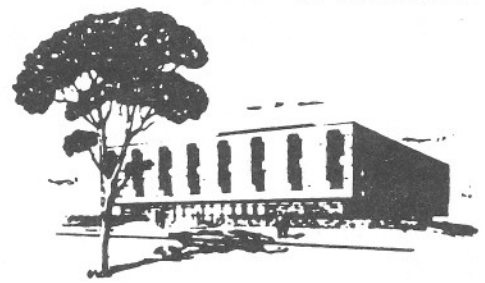
Japanese art exhibit opens at Oakland

Meadow Brook Art Gallery opened its 1977-78 season on October 9 with the exhibit "Through Closed Doors: Western Influence on Japanese Art (1639-1853)."

The exhibition, presented in collaboration with the University of Michigan Museum of Art, will continue through November 13. Eighty art objects, including hanging scrolls, screens, and prints, were divided into two sections to be shown simultaneously at Meadow Brook and U of M. It is the first time the art works are being shown outside Japan.

Gallery hours are 1-5 p.m., Tuesday through Friday; 2-6:30 p.m., Saturday and Sunday; and 7:30-9:30 p.m. the nights of a Meadow Brook Theatre performance. There is no admission charge.

OU Board reelects officers

Alan E. Schwartz of Bloomfield Hills and David B. Lewis of Detroit have been chosen by their colleagues on the Board of Trustees to serve their second one-year terms as officers of the board.

Schwartz and Lewis will serve as chairperson and vice-chairperson, respectively. Schwartz is a partner in the firm of Honigman, Miller, Schwartz and Cohn. Lewis is a partner in the firm of Lewis, White, Clay and Graves.

The selection of Schwartz and Lewis as officers was made at the board meeting October 4. In other action that evening, the board:

Accepted \$1,285,968 in gifts and grants including \$112,400 from the National Science Foundation to David Shantz, psychology; \$49,545 to Michael V. Riley, Institute of Biological Sciences, \$12,597 to Nalin J. Unakar, biology, \$11,990 to Harold Zepelin, psychology, and \$11,340 to V.N. Reddy, Institute of Biological Sciences, from the National Institutes of Health; and \$883,086 from the U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare. Meadow Brook Theatre received a \$25,000 support grant from the National Endowment for the Arts.

Reaffirmed its decision to ask the state for a 147,000 gross square foot addition to the Kresge Library costing \$11.1 million. The state recommended a 123,000 foot addition at a cost of \$9 million.

Films offer a look at aging

Ali: Fear Eats The Soul, a film by German director Rainer Werner Fassbinder which explores the effect of racism and agism on a lonely couple's marriage, will be shown at 7:45 p.m. on November 3 in Varner Hall.

Ali is the second of five films being shown as part of a series entitled "Growing Older: The Movies Look at Aging" co-sponsored by the Continuum Center and the Department of Sociology/Anthropology.

Ali is the story of a young Moroccan man who comes to Germany to earn a living, then meets and falls in love with a German widow 20 years his senior. The two marry and are then confronted with the hostility of friends, neighbors, and relatives. The film was first shown in the United States at the New York Film Festival in 1974.

The other films in the series include: I Never Sang For My Father, October 27; Tell Me Where It Hurts, November 10; Dr. Glas, November 17; and Make Way For Tomorrow, December 1.

OU junior wins scholarship

Sonya Briski, a junior from Grand Blanc, MI, has been awarded a \$600 scholarship from the Meadowbrook Woman's Club.

The award was made from the club's Academy Fund, money raised previously to support the Academy of Dramatic Art at Oakland. The Academy was closed last June.

A total of \$1800 will be awarded to three students during the next three years. Those eligible must be a female with family responsibilities who would not qualify under another grant and who is majoring in the arts. The recipient must also have earned 59 hours of credit, 29 of them at Oakland, and must be an Oakland County resident.

Briski is a communications major and active in the Student Enterprise Theater's Barn Theatre.
