Ronald M. Horwitz, dean of the School of Economics and Management, ran two seminars for the Michigan Association of Certified Public Accountants last month. Topics covered were: (a) the CPA's Role in Hospital Reimbursement and (b) Medicare Cost Report. Dean Horwitz was also an invited participant in the America Institute of Certified Public Accountants Subcommittee meeting on Continuing Professional Education held recently in New York City.

Boaz Kahana, psychology, presented a paper at the recent American Psychological Association meeting in the area of the clinical psychology of aging. The paper is entitled "An Alternative Scoring System for the Bender Gestalt Test as an Index of Perceptual Motor Functioning in Older Persons." The second author is John Jensen, an OU graduate student.

The Oakland University women's volleyball team clinced at least a tie for the Great Lakes Intercollegiate Athletic Conference (GLIAC) volleyball title Oct. 26 by defeating Hillsdale College 15-6, 15-12 and Wayne State University 15-5, 12-15, 15-10, in Detroit. Coach Jan Peters' squad is now 15-6 overall and 8-1 in the GLIAC with one conference tilt remaining. Second-place Wayne State University finished the GLIAC season with an 8-2 mark.

Arbors perform Nov. 2

Globe lecture

C. Walter Hodges, internationally known Shakespearean scholar, theatre historian, and writer and illustrator of award-winning children's books, will give a lecture on the Globe Theatre Nov. 2.

The free slide-lecture program begins at 3 p.m. in the Fireside Lounge of the Oakland Center. A question and answer period will follow.

Hodges is the author of the Globe Restored, Shakespeare's Second Globe: The Missing Monument, and the awardwinning Shakespeare's Theatre.

He will speak about what is known about the Globe, the single most important theatre building in the history of the western world, and about its proposed reconstruction in Detroit.

Hodges is a free lance writer and artist whose permanent home is in London, England. He is now in residence at Wayne State University.

The Arbors, a highly successful singing group named after the City of Ann Arbor, will appear in concert at Oakland University Friday, Nov. 2.

Tickets for the 8 p.m. performance in Varner Recital Hall are available at the door at \$6 general admission and \$4.50 for OU students and senior citizens.

The quartet is well known on the nightclub circuit and for several hit recordings issued in the late 1960s. It is one of the most recorded groups in America in terms of its radio and TV commercials.

The Arbors singles include "A Symphony for Susan" and "Graduation Day." While not identified in the commercials, they are the singing voices for the Schlitz beer ads, the Jolly Green Giant jingles, and the Texaco ads, among others.

Three members of the quartet, identical twins Ed and Fred Farren and Scott Herrick, were members of the University of Michigan Glee Club in the early 1960s. They recruited Herrick's brother Tom to become the fourth member of the quartet.

The Arbors are noted for presenting a "mellow" concert that will mix barbershop harmony, old ballads, and contemporary works in a listenable, easy style. When they are not touring Chicago serves as their current home base.
