Institute receives research award

The Institute of Biological Sciences at Oakland University has been awarded an Institutional National Research Service Award of \$308,685 for training in ophthalmic physiology and biochemistry from the National Eye Institute of the National Institute of Health.

Oakland is the only institution without a medical school, aside from the California and Massachusetts Institutes of Technology, to receive a training grant in visual sciences.

The award provides two to three years of full-time research training in ophthalmic physiology and biochemistry during the next five years to 10 post-doctoral trainees who hold a Ph.D. in biomedical sciences, or to physicians who have completed their residency program in ophthalmology.

Oakland's Institute, under the leadership of Dr. Everett Kinsey from 1968 to 1975, has already gained international prominence in eye research. Current research programs include studies on cataracts, glaucoma, and basic studies on the physiology and biochemistry of the cornea and retina.

Woman's group offers scholarship

The Meadowbrook Woman's Club is offering schol-arship awards for approximately one-half tuition for one academic year to mature students with family responsibilities who have been interrupted in their attempts to complete a bachelor's degree.

Applicants must have achieved junior standing and be enrolled for at least 12 credits in fall 1977 and 12 credits in winter 1978. They must also have earned 28 credits at Oakland during the 1976-77 academic year.

Deadline for applications, which should be submitted to the financial aid office, is July 1.
