CAMPUS FLINGS OPEN ITS DOORS TO GAELIC DANCERS AND PIPERS

Henry Kennedy, who might qualify for the title University Gael-in-Residence, is our reporter for the following item: "If ye'd like tae jine the whirlin' birlin' an' skirlin' throng, the fiery cross has been lit and the clans will gather on the OU campus this Saturday and Sunday. Traditionally, the relaying of a fiery cross through the highland glens and mountains of Scotland has symbolized a gathering of the clans. For the second year, the U.S. Highland Dance Association will hold its highland gathering here. Dancers and pipers of all ages will compete in a variety of events over the two-day period. On Saturday evening the assembled Scots will celebrate with a Ceildhe (pronounced KAYL-dee and meaning a dancing, singing soiree)."

Alan Scott (Oakland Center) rounds out the report with these details, which Kennedy omitted in a style that seems more Irish than Scottish: Dance and piper competition for all age levels will be held in the Sports and Recreation Building from 9 a.m. to noon Saturday, 10 a.m. to noon Sunday, and from 1:30 until about 6 p.m. on each day. A brief parade is scheduled for each day to take the competitors from the Oakland Center back to the Sports and Recreation Building at 1 p.m. One pipe band, individual pipers, and about 145 dancers will take part in Saturday's parade. On Sunday, four pipe bands will be massed as one big ensemble and about 100 dancers will take part. Trophies will be awarded for various competitive events, and the outstanding individual dancer on Saturday will win a trip to Scotland.
