TWENTY-FIVE SUMMER DAYTIME & EVENING COURSE AREAS OFFERED

Twenty-five areas of study in undergraduate and graduate work are being offered in Oakland University's summer session which opens for registration June 14. Classes begin Tuesday, June 26 and end Friday, Aug. 17.

Courses are available in the above areas in regular daytime work or in the on-campus credit evening programs, according to Billie DeMont, dean of the summer session. Regular daytime enrollment information may be obtained by calling 377-3450. Students interested in the credit evening program should call 377-4010 for information.

Special workshops and institutes offered during the summer include: individualized instruction in a summer reading conference; a variety of courses taught in Spanish or English in Guadalajara, Mexico; a campus jazz and rock institute; a Shakespeare institute featuring two guided trips to the Shakespeare Theatre, Stratford, Ontario; a workshop in metropolitan communications; an environmental education program at Higgins Lake; and a lecture-demonstration course on the creative and cultural arts of Black Americans.

Course areas include anthropology, area studies, art history, chemistry, computer science, economics, education, engineering, English, environmental studies, history, learning skills, linguistics, management, mathematics, music, philosophy, physical education, political science, psychology, science, sociology, speech communication, and interdisciplinary internships.

SHAKESPEARE INSTITUTE INCLUDES STRATFORD TRIPS

A special four-credit Shakespeare Institute designed primarily for current and prospective secondary school teachers will be held at Oakland University June 25-July 25.

The Institute will supplement classroom work with two guided trips to the Shakespeare Festival, Stratford, Ontario.

Professor John Cutts, Department of English, said the students this summer would view "The Taming of the Shrew," and "Othello."

The on-campus portion of the Shakespeare Institute will include preparatory lectures and discussions on each of the plays, formal lectures on all aspects of the theater in Shakespeare's time, and on modern and traditional criticism. Workshops will be held on Shakespeare songs and music, recordings and films, and the use of the above materials in preparation of lesson plans.
