Listed below are some recommended resources for upcoming M1 students that also serve as a refresher for M2s coming back to study.

- M1 Textbooks & M2 Textbooks Visit our textbook webpages for a list of all the course textbooks, including required and recommended titles, with links to full content available electronically. Note that these lists are updated on a rolling basis.
- M1/M2 Guides These webpages provide a one-stop shop for resources related to a specific course including links to textbooks, reference resources, and review resources.
- Review & Board Prep Resources A list of resources to help students study for courses and prepare for the board exams.

 <u>Self-Directed Learning</u> in e-Space (requires OU login) - An online information mastery curriculum designed to help students gain important information skills for lifelong and selfdirected learning as future physicians.

## **Campus Re-Opening - Hours**

The biggest change coming to Kresge, and to the University, in September is that anyone on campus, faculty, student, or staff, must have their first vaccination shot by September 3rd. This is in addition to the current mask mandate.

Restrictions on gathering and social distancing have been lifted for our study spaces; students can once again gather in our collaborative space for group study.

Starting in September, Kresge Library will have updated hours. Library users are no longer required to swipe their identification cards at the door, but wearing a mask is required in the library and in all library spaces. The new hours will be:

- The Intersection of Voting and Health In honor of Women's History Month, the Honorable Donna M. Christensen, MD, presenter, and Megan Srinivas, MD, MPH, moderator, explored the connection between voting and health—and its influence on population health, socioeconomic influences and health policy.
- Women Physicians Leading During Crisis The annual AMA Women in Medicine Month
  celebrates women physicians, residents and students. This webinar focuses on the
  convergence of the COVID-19 pandemic, systemic discrimination and gender inequity and
  the ramifications for women in medicine.
- <u>Unique Challenges Facing Women Physicians During COVID-19</u> This webinar, cosponsored by the WPS, the Organized Medical Staff Section and the American Medical Women's Association, addresses the various professional challenges that women physicians have dealt with since the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic.



## **ClinicalKey Update**

ClincalKey, one of our most popular databases and an indispensible resource for anyone in the medical field, has recently released a set of new enhancements. According to ClinicalKey, "these changes will help clinicians and students find current, credible, evidence-based information as quickly as possible and apply the information they need to inform decisions or develop treatment plans." A few highlights of the changes are listed here:

- A new search bar has been installed with improved auto-suggest delivering more relevant results.
- New homepage layout adds card to make finding summary and reference content more intuitive
- New search results will elevate summary content and make functional icons persistent, while color-coded shortcuts will reduce clicks to find answers faster.
- A toggle view option allows users to switch between classic and new search interface.
