The thousand-volume medieval LIBRARY ACQUISITIONS: history collection of the late Dr. Sidney Painter, History Department head at Johns Hopkins University, is now in crates in the basement. This collection provided much of the material for several standard works on medieval France and England. It was acquired through a chance visit by Mr. Matthews to an old friend, John A. Berthel, Johns Hopkins librarian, while on an Eastern trip. Mr. Berthel mentioned the historian's recent death and availability of his collection. *** The Cambridge (Mass.) Public Library has donated a nearly complete run--38 volumes -- of the scholarly journal, Musical Quarterly. This gift was arranged by Mr. Holmes, late of Boston University, who learned of the library's willingness to part with the collection.
