OU TOPS \$2 MILLION IN OUTSIDE FUNDING

Oakland University received \$2,111,125 in outside project support during fiscal 1973-74 to top the \$2 million figure for the first time in its history, OU officials report.

The grant money represents the funding of 52 separate proposals, mostly by government agencies, President Donald "This is continuing recognition of the innovative approaches being taken by our faculty and administration," O'Dowd said. He noted that the OU breakthrough comes at a time when federal funding is becoming more and more difficult.

Lewis N. Pino, director of the office of Research and Instructional Services, said the funding does not include individual faculty fellowships, student aid or construction awards.

The university's \$2,111,125 was obtained through \$610,250 in research support, \$1,185,874 in awards for educational proposals, and \$315,001 in support for development proposals.

In the research category, the Institute of Biological Sciences led all academic units with four principal investigators receiving grants totaling \$375,492. The School of Engineering had seven principal investigators receive funding for their projects to the extent of \$103,351.

In educational proposals, the Office of Student Affairs received \$399,079 in funding, the School of Education received \$303,893, and 10 general university proposals were funded for \$471,362.

Major sources of support are the National Institutes of Health, National Science Foundation and U.S. Office of Education. New sources of funding include the National Aeronautics and Space Administration and Office of Naval Research.

SEX DISCRIMINATION CHARGE DENIED BY OU

Oakland University has denied a charge of sex discrimination filed against it by the Michigan Department of Civil Rights. The complaint was filed in 1970 by a female employee of Meadow Brook Theatre who claimed she was underpaid because of her sex. The

woman has since resigned.

The brief OU statement said that "Oakland University denies that it has ever been guilty of sex discrimination and will defend this charge before the Department of Civil Rights." OU has 15 days to respond to the charge.

FIVE HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS Five academically gifted black high school students have been awarded four-year, GET BLACK SCHOLARSHIP AWARDS competitive scholarships to Oakland University.

Four of the students are from Detroit and one is from Saginaw. They were chosen on the basis of their academic record, extra-curricular activities, and on the basis of personal interviews. Each scholarship award is for a total of \$2,000.

The Black Scholarship Program was authorized in 1972 by the OU Board of Trustees. The awards are "Granted to academically gifted black students who have demonstrated the interest, maturity, and ability to benefit from and contribute to the programs at OU," the trustees said.

Winners who will enter OU this fall are: Theresa J. Ellis, 4030 Outer Drive, Detroit. Miss Ellis is a graduate of Mumford High School where she was a member of the National Honor Society, Mumford Honors Society, the Medical Careers Club, the Junior Office Training Society, and the Office Co-op. She is interested in a career in business management, preferably marketing. She has also earned a Student Life Scholarship at OU. At Mumford she graduated third in a class of 423.

Wanda Fay Gunn, 833 South 11th St., Saginaw. Miss Gunn is a graduate of Saginaw High School where she has been an office worker and a tutor for elementary and junior high school students. Miss Gunn is interested in a career in nursing. She also holds a Student Life Scholarship to the university. She was 11th in a graduating class of 422.
