Three Bandits Hold Up Tavern

Trio Cover Heads With Pillowcases; Take Over \$4 Thousand

Three men, armed with single-barrel shotguns and wearing pillowcases over their heads, held up eight persons at the Club Bar, 844 E. 10 Mile Rd., Hazel Park, yesterday and took between \$4,000 and \$5,000 after herding everyone into a storage room.

The owner, Zyg Kalkowski of 6129 Dorothy, Detroit, told Hazel Park Police that the trio entered through the rear door.

One ordered him out of his office saying, "Come on out or I'll blast you," as the other two rounded up six customers and the owner's wife, Sophie, according to Patrolman William Ryan.

Most of the money was in checks taken from the safe, Ryan said. Kalkowski said everyone came out of the storage room and found the three gunmen gone after they heard one bandit say, "Let's go, daddy-o."

Veteran Navy Diver to Head Mackinac Crew

ST. IGNACE (UP)—Galen B. Potts, 56, one of the Navy's top divers during World War II, has been named supervisor of diving activities on construction of the \$100,000,000 Mackinac Bridge.

Potts heads a 10-man diving crew working on construction of the five mile span. He succeeds Frank Pepper, who died of an attack of the bends a month ago, as chief diver of the project.

Potts, a native of Paducah, Ky., began his diving career in 1926 with Merritt-Chapman & Scott following a three-year hitch in the Navy. Recalled to active duty in 1944, Potts worked with underwater demolition teams at Anzio, Leghorn, Salerno, Naples and other hotspots in the Mediterranean theater.

He remained in the Navy after World War II and rose to rank of lieutenant commander before leaving the service in 1953.

During his long diving career, Potts estimates he has trained more than 500 divers.

4 Last Hurricanes Cost Lloyd's Plenty

18 Years in Lung Ends With Death

Fred Snite, 44, Known Throughout World for Fight Against Polio

MIAMI BEACH, Fla. (UP)—Fred B. Snite Jr., 44, the famed "Boiler Kid" whom infantile paralysis doomed to an iron lung more than 18 years ago, is dead.

The plucky young man whose fighting heart made him known throughout the world died in a West Palm Beach hotel yesterday. He had gone to that city from his Miami Beach home the day before to compete in the Florida State Bridge Championships.

He went to sleep after breakfast because, he told attendants, "we want to be able to play a good game of bridge this afternoon." He never awakened.

Doctors believe the "incessant pumping of heart against machine, and machine against heart," caused his death, said the father, a Chicago small loan financier who maintains a winter home here.

"It was apparently heart failure," the father added. "As a result of his long stay in the iron lung, his veins were no bigger than the eye of a needle."

The Snite family had come from Chicago only last Sunday to spend the winter.

"Fred had an ulcer which bothered him all the way down," his father reported. "Nonetheless, he played bridge during practically the whole trip. In fact, he won all our money."

The body was sealed in the iron lung, loaded aboard the special bus and brought to a funeral home here. Service and burial will be in Chicago.

Snite was stricken in China while on a world cruise with his family in 1936. For several months he was near death but his indomitable spirit never gave up and although his body and organs were completely paralyzed, a slight improvement was shown.

In June of the following year he was brought home to Chicago. His father's financial means provided the respirator and all possible comforts and attendants.

He was married in 1939 to Teresa Larkin, of Dayton, Ohio. They had three children, Teresa Marie, now 14; Catherine Bernadette, 12; and Mary, 9.

According to game division experts, hunters should find just about as many deer throughout the state as they did last year.

In some areas the population is down, but in others it's way up and the total is about the same. The area south of M55 is reported to harbor more deer than it did last year.

Statistics figure that gun accidents will come close to last season's 74, which included 13 fatalities.

More than half of the fatalities last year were self-inflicted or inflicted by a member of the victim's own party.

Traffic accidents and heart attacks swell the total of deer hunting casualties and add to the impression that deer hunting is an unusually dangerous field sport.

As a matter of record there were 185 gun accidents with 14 fatalities during the 1953 small game season, and small game hunting is generally regarded as a safe pastime.

Most gun "accidents" are the result of carelessness. Virtually every shooting mishap could be avoided if each hunter remembered the following five words: Be Sure Before You Shoot.

Ike to Ask Fast OK on Treaty

Will Send Paris Pacts to Senate Monday for Action in January

TOLEDO, Ohio (UP)—President Eisenhower will tell the Senate Monday that ratification of the Western European anti-Communist alliance to free and rearm West Germany would be "a very great step" toward world security.

The chief executive's press secretary, James C. Hagerty, told newsmen here today that will be the substance of a special 2,000-word presidential message.

Eisenhower is in Ohio as the guest of Secretary of the Treasury George Humphrey hunting duck off Maumee Bay, 14 miles east of Toledo.

The President planned to return to Washington late today. Tomorrow is Mrs. Eisenhower's 58th birthday.

The nine-power treaty Eisenhower will send to the Senate Monday was signed in Paris last month. It opens the way, upon ratification by all of the signatory nations, for restoring sovereignty to Allied-occupied Western Germany, and for German contribution of 500,000 troops to defense of Western Europe against any Russian aggression.

Hagerty said Eisenhower will ask that the Senate Foreign Relations Committee study the treaty and be prepared to act speedily on it when the new 84th Congress convenes in January.

Weatherman Predicts Rain Again

Waterford Hill Purchased for \$3 Million Development

Historic Waterford Hill in Independence Township has been sold for an undisclosed sum for development as a \$3,000,000 residential project.

Previously purchased by radio station WJR for a TV installation, this project was ruled out due to the proximity of the airport.

White Brothers Realty of Waterford will handle the sale and help plan development of the project which covers over 200 acres and will be divided into parcels of one and a-half acres and more.

An Association will be formed to insure development.

Millard's Ruling Upheld by Judge

UAW to Press for 1955 Total Package Between 40-50 Cents Per Hour More

DETROIT (UP)—The CIO United Auto Workers has disclosed demands the union will press for in new contract negotiations with the auto industry next year.

CIO and UAW president Walter P. Reuther unveiled the union's program for 1955 contracts in his opening address yesterday at a two-day collective bargaining conference attended by 1,100 delegates from UAW locals in the United States and Canada.

While no UAW official put a price tag on the total package sought it was estimated to range between 40 and 50 cents an hour.

The demands formalized at the conference ultimately will involve about one million CIO members in the auto industry and millions more in other industries which usually accept the pattern set by the car companies.

Basically, here's what the UAW is asking:

Waiver Ballot Looms on Pact

Quick Go-Ahead Seen for Dixon-Yates in Vote by Joint Committee

WASHINGTON (UP)—With administration forces clearly in command, the Senate-House Atomic Energy Committee headed into a showdown today on short-cut procedure for the controversial Dixon-Yates power contract.

Outnumbered 10-8, committee Democrats were openly pessimistic about their chances of blocking a speedup recommended by President Eisenhower and the Atomic Energy Commission.

The issue at a closed committee session:

Whether to waive a 30-day period in which the next Congress—a Democratic Congress—could study the contract, signed this week by the AEC and the Dixon-Yates power group.

Republican committee members had the votes to put the waiver through and said they were ready to use them, regardless of Democratic demands that more witnesses be heard.

The \$60-million-dollar contract calls for Dixon-Yates to build a 107-million-dollar generating plant at West Memphis, Ark., to supply the Tennessee Valley Authority with private power to replace TVA energy now used by AEC.

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Stack of Parcels Faces Mrs. Ike on 58th Birthday

WASHINGTON (UP)—Mrs. Dwight D. Eisenhower has a big stack of packages to open tomorrow—her 58th birthday.

Among them is one from her husband, the President, who returns today from duck hunting on Lake Erie.

Mrs. George Moore, Mrs. Eisenhower's sister, and her husband Col. Moore, who live in Washington, and a few close friends have been invited in for Sunday night supper, at which there will be a birthday cake. Mrs. Eisenhower's mother, Mrs. John Sheldon Doud, is staying at the White House.

Dinner to Honor Sen. McCarthy

Solon Hopes for Quick Censure Action as Pals Plan Testimonial

MILWAUKEE (UP)—Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis.), who says he's convinced the Senate will censure him and wishes it would get it over with, will be honored by Wisconsin state admirers at a testimonial dinner tonight.

Sponsors of the dinner at a Milwaukee hotel said the limit of 1,500 tickets at \$5 a plate has been sold.

McCarthy, interviewed last night when he arrived from Washington with his wife, said opponents had enough votes to censure him.

"The speeches won't make any difference," he said. "I'd like to see a vote right away so we can get back to work. As of right now they have enough votes. The Democrats will go down the line. So will the left-wing Republicans—I should say the left-wingers who run under the Republican banner. Only the Taft type of Republicans are for me."

Asked what effect he thought the censure resolution, if passed, would have on his political fortunes, McCarthy replied:

"None at all. I think I would not be up for censure except for the fact that I am exposing Communists."

He declared that once the censure issue is disposed of, he would try to clean up the work of the Senate's Permanent Subcommittee on Investigations, of which he is chairman.

Monday was the day specified by an influential GOP senator who, asking to remain anonymous, said in an interview that unless McCarthy and his friends can agree by then on a compromise resolution "it won't be much use to try any further."

So far, this senator added, McCarthy himself has not agreed to accept even the criticism involved in a proposed watered-down alternative to the direct censure recommendation now before the Senate.

Mackinaw City Traffic Piles Up for 22 Miles

Weary Nimrods Dream of New Bridge During Night in Autos

MACKINAW CITY — At least 22 miles of bumper-to-bumper traffic was reported here early today as thousands of deer hunters wedged through this historic little community of 970 on their way to the Upper Peninsula.

The hunters were waiting to take one of the five ferries that cross the seven mile stretch of Great Lakes water every half hour.

State highway officials said 10,143 hunters crossed the Straits Wednesday, Thursday and Friday, 20 per cent more than during the first three days of travel last year.

The traffic jam at 9 a.m. today was 15 miles long on U.S.27 and seven and a half miles long on U.S.31.

State officials said the U.S.37 line, stretching from Mackinaw City to Cheboygan, was one of the longest since hunter-bearing automobiles began their autumn exodus to the Upper Peninsula.

There was a rash of minor collisions, but no serious ones, in the area.

Mackinaw City is the Lower Peninsula ferry terminus; St. Ignace, the northern one. The Straits divide Michigan's two peninsulas and connect lakes Michigan and Huron.

Traffic headed north was thinner Friday afternoon than state police had anticipated and caused them to believe ferry waits might be shorter than a year ago, when the jamup extended 12 miles.

But the river of automobiles grew and grew during the night and still was growing at 9 a.m. The highway department had (Continued on Page 2, Col. 5)
