### Allport Adds New Courses

Singer Teaches Ethnopsychiatry Class

A new course in Ethnopsychiatry will be offered by the Dept. of Anthropology this winter semester. The 4-credit course is being taught by Phillip Singer, prof. of anthropology and acting chairman of Allport College.

Ethnopsychiatry takes a cultural approach to mental health and mental illness as opposed to the disease or medical approach. It teaches the use of cultural materials in clinical studies and aims at understand-

ing and describing behavior in relation to mental health.

Singer explains that cultural and environmental problems can create medical problems which can be eased with cultural common sense. For example, bad housing and unemployment problems in the S. Bronx, N.Y., were causing hallucinations, which were a defensive reaction to the poor living conditions.

Dr. Pedro Ruiz, director of the Lincoln Hospital Community Mental Health Center in the Bronx, found that medical approaches were not helping the people. Clearing up environmental conditions, however, i.e. helping get ADC checks delivered etc., solved many of the medical problems.

Ethnopsychiatry evolved from 19th century psychology, which utilized a humanistic approach. As the medical field became more specialized, psychiatry (medical approach) and psychology (cultural approach) went their separate ways. Ethnopsychiatry is the newest approach to mental health problems.

The first visiting professor of ethnopsychiatry visited Allport College in 1970. He was a native healer from (British) Guyana. He, too, made a distinction between medical (doctor) work and cultural (Kali) work.

# OU Pioneers Lose To Aussie Cagers, Alumni Win Over JV

Old and new faces showed up on OU's basketball court for the Dec. II scholarship benefit game which ended in a double defeat for the Pioneer's varsity and JV teams.

The main event, the National Championship Team for Australia vs. the OU varsity team, resulted in a 78-71 score. The Aussies sewed the game up, hitting 17 of 25 from the free throw line in the second half. Scoring honors for OU went to Carvin Melson and Walt Johnson with 14 points each. Allport College has had three new courses approved by the Committee on Instruction. They are in the health-medical behavioral sciences and, according to Singer, will hopefully become part of a concentration in that area.

AC 250-251 is Health-Medical Behavioral Science and is required of all students in Allport, but open to any student. It is the study of human behavior, institutions, professions and professionalism as found in the health and medical field.

AC 400 is a Field Practicum in Health in Medical Behavioral Sciences. It is designed for students seeking careers in health-related fields and offers supervised field placement experience with academic content and guided research at various agencies.
