We will need to focus on the demands of globalization and the evolving academic needs of an increasingly diverse, self-directed and interdisciplinary student body.

Like all colleges and universities, we'll face a growing insistence that we provide students with everything they need to succeed in increasingly demanding job markets.

This will mean expanding student engagement and using data-driven approaches to enhance student success – both of which will improve student retention and graduation rates. We'll also need to find ways to flourish in an intensely competitive market for a declining population of high school graduates. Presently, we have a number of promising strategies at our disposal, but your ideas and participation in strategic planning will be key to ensuring our continued vitality.

Over the coming months, we'll be using the Creating the Future II strategic planning process to welcome valuable insight and advice from 500 of the region's most successful business and community leaders. Their contributions will help us recalibrate our 2020 Vision, broaden our network of supporters and expand our relevance and value in the community.

In summary, the breadth of our achievements inspires great confidence that, together, we can not only overcome the potholes in the road to our future, but pave a new road to even greater success. I encourage and welcome you to actively participate in our current planning process. As I shared Tuesday morning, your involvement is essential to our success.
