ELECTRIC CAR ON VIEW A battery-powered Chevelle, which a crew of OU engineering students have entered in a cross-country "Clean Air Auto Race" at the end of August, will be unveiled to the campus community at 10 a.m. Friday in front of Dodge Hall. Five undergraduates and two graduate students have been working much of the summer on the project. It will be driven in the electric-power section of the competition, sponsored by MIT and Cal Tech. Some three dozen cars will compete over a 3,000-mile course laid out between those campuses.
