Student retention program wins national award

Oakland University's Trustee Academic Success Program recently won the Noel-Levitz Retention Excellence Award for its student retention efforts.

"It is one of the highest honors you can get as an institution," said Glenn McIntosh, director of the Office of Equity and **Advising Resource Center**, which operates the program.

OU's Trustee Academic Success Program has a retention rate of 69 percent to 72 percent, about 30 percent higher than the national average.

Since 1994, the program has helped 203 white, black, Hispanic, Asian, Philippine, Native American and multiracial students.

Success students receive scholarships of \$1,000 to \$3,000 a year if they maintain at least a 2.5 grade point average and meet with a staff member twice a month, said Gloria Sosa, assistant director of the Office of Equity and **Advising Resource Center**.

McIntosh and Sosa will accept the award and present their program at the 15th annual national Conference on Student Retention, July 25-28, in New Orleans, La.The Retention Excellence Awards Program was established in 1989 to honor retention achievements of post-secondary institutions throughout North America. The awards recognize innovative programs and services that impact student retention by promoting student success and satisfaction.

Nominees are judged by a panel of higher education administrators and consultants on identifiable and measurable institutional outcomes, originality and creativity, use of resources, and adaptability to other institutions.
