Jennings and Woodward received \$200 cash awards and engraved medallions as the year's outstanding graduates. The annual awards are named in honor of the university's deceased benefactors, Matilda R. and Alfred G. Wilson.

Woodward entered OU after his legs were paralyzed in an off-duty auto accident that ended his law enforcement career with the Oakland County Sheriff's Department. He has worked with the Detroit Rehabilitation Center helping others adjust to their handicaps. He is a sociology major. He resides at 17082 Coventry in Holly.

Jennings is an English major. She has served as a resident assistant and as a member of the residence hall policy committee. She has been a member of the Slavic Folk Ensemble, modern dance workshop, and a tutor-counselor for the Upward Bound Fine Arts Workshop. She resides at 13340 Whitcomb in Detroit.

WEINSTEIN PARTICIPATES IN U.S. MBO PROGRAM

Alan G. Weinstein, School of Economics and Management, was recently invited to participate in a seminar on management by objectives for 45 federal government executives at a conference

held at Carnegie-Mellon University in Pittsburgh.

The conference, designed to prepare federal executives for the implimentation of MBO as a managerial system throughout the federal government, was attended by high level executives from the U.S. Office of Management and Budget, Housing and Urban Development, Social Security, Veterans Administration, Corps of Engineers, Internal Revenue Service, Atomic Energy Commission, and several other agencies. In addition to his formal presentation on MBO as a behaviorally oriented managerial system, Professor Weinstein participated on a panel discussion of problems of implementing MBO within the federal government.

FARMINGTON AAUW OFFERS SCHOLARSHIPS

The Farmington branch of the American Association of University Women is providing seven awards of one-half tuition each for one academic year (fall and winter, 1975-76). Applicants must

be mature students with family responsibilities who have experienced interruptions in their education for the baccalaureate degree.

The applicants must have achieved sophomore standing and be enrolled for a minimum of 12 credits during each of the fall and winter terms.

BOARD EXTENDS PIRGIM AGREEMENT

The OU Board of Trustees has extended a fee collection agreement between the university and the university's branch of PIRGIM (Public Interest Research Group in Michigan) for the 1975 fall

term.

Both PIRGIM and university officials went before the board May 28 with different proposals for a revision in board policy regarding the presentation of PIRGIM's name at each registration for voluntary student support and on the percentage of student support that must be shown.

Under the existing board policy, OU collects fees in support of PIRGIM from students who sign up on a voluntary basis during registration. The policy forbids listing of PIRGIM's name on official registration documents and asks that one third of the student body voluntarily contribute to support PIRGIM for two successive terms (excluding spring and summer sessions). Under changing registration procedures PIRGIM has registered varying levels of student support, but it has been unable to meet the one third quota.

In extending the current agreement first approved by the board in 1972, trustees asked that both sides seek a compromise proposal for presentation at a future board meeting. No disagreement was voiced over the quality of work being done by the consumer-protection-oriented organization.
