A winning tradition in collegiate soccer is developing at Oakland University and head coach Gary Parsons is the one moving the Pioneers up the ladder.

Parsons, who has compiled an impressive collegiate record in three years at Oakland, has directed the Pioneers to two consecutive NCAA Division II Soccer Championship final four appearances. The Pioneers lost to Seattle Pacific University in the semi-finals, 1-0.

Parsons' record is 46-11-5, including an all-time high national ranking of second and a Mideast Regional ranking of first in 1983. The Pioneers almost made the playoffs in his first year at Oakland with a 14-4-1 record and a number one ranking in the Mideast Region.

A strong believer in defense, Parsons has used his first head coaching job to continue a winning tradition that he's enjoyed since starting his collegiate career at Eastern Illinois University.

The 31-year-old coach helped guide Eastern Illinois to a 24-9-1 two-year record and two playoff appearances. EIU's 1977 squad, coached by Schellas Hyndman, was eliminated in the midwest finals, and the following year it finished third in the NCAA Division II playoffs.



After completing his master's degree in physical education at Eastern Illinois in 1978, Parsons went to Wisconsin-Milwaukee, a Division I power, and served as an assistant soccer coach under Dan Harris. The UWM defense, coached by Parsons, allowed just 16 goals and posted 13 shutouts to make the NCAA playoffs in 1979. The following year UWM made the playoffs again to give Parsons four straight post season bids.

Participation in the NCAA soccer playoffs is becoming a tradition for Parsons' squads. In six years as an assistant or head coach, Parsons has been to five NCAA Division I or II soccer tournaments. The only season one of his teams failed to qualify was in 1981 when Parsons narrowly missed a playoff bid at Oakland.

Along with his collegiate coaching duties, he also serves as chairman of the ISAA Mideast ranking committee and has a hand in the national rankings for collegiate soccer for every level of NCAA competition.

In addition to his coaching prowess, Parsons enjoyed a noteworthy playing career. He was voted the most valuable defensive player at Plymouth State College as a senior and helped the Panthers make the New England State College Athletic Conference soccer finals in his last two years.

A graduate of Plymouth State College, he holds bachelor's degrees in math (1973) and physical education (1975). Oakland's director of athletics, Paul Hartman, started his administrative career in athletics as Plymouth State's athletic director.

GENERAL OUTLOOK: With six starters not returning from last year's NCAA final four team, the Pioneers will need strong play from the returning players and new recruits. The Pioneers were 18-3 last year, but they will have a hard time duplicating the school record for most wins. Nevertheless, they should challenge for a playoff spot in the Mideast Regional.

1983 WRAP-UP: The Pioneers broke eight school records, captured the Great Lakes Cup for Michigan soccer programs, won their second straight Mideast Regional championship and were beaten 1-0 by national champion Seattle Pacific in the semi-finals of the NCAA Division II tournament. Along with an 18-3 record, the Pioneers were ranked fourth in the nation and first in the Mideast Region.

RETURNEES: Defensively, goalkeeper Paul Larkin (Scarborough, Canada) and back Chan-Ho Allen (Oak Park) return from last year's starting lineup that allowed just 12 goals and posted 12 shutouts. Larkin set a new school record for most career shutouts with 21. On offense, forwards Mark Christian (St. John's, Antigua) and Tag Graham (Bloomfield Hills) combined to score 15 goals and seven assists last year. Midfielder Mike Vigh (Detroit), who scored three goals last year, is the one starter returning in the middle.

REDSHIRTS: Raul Delgado, a transfer from Miami Dade Community College, and Barrie Vince, a midfielder on the 1982 NCAA final four team, should add depth for the Pioneers in the midfield.

KEY LOSSES: Six starters and three reserves were lost from last year's squad, including All-American freshman Munadel Numan. Two All-Mideast selections, midfielder Nick O'Shea and forward Morris Lupenec, were also key players. The non-returnees accounted for 40 of the 72 goals and 30 of 54 assists. The Pioneers' first-, second-, fourth- and sixth-best scorers were lost. Along with the three standouts mentioned above, back Terje Enes, midfielder and captain Dan Fitzgerald and stopper back Mike Lupenec will not be returning.

NEWCOMERS: Six players from outstanding junior college programs and one high school recruit are indications that Head Coach Gary Parsons decided to find instant help for the Pioneers. Solomon Donnie, who could wind up replacing Numan, may hold the key to the defense this season. Two of his running mates from Liberia, forward Meally Freeman and Gray Haizel, also will compete for starting assignments. Two players from Lewis and Clark Community College and one player from Schoolcraft Community College also have excellent chances of helping the Pioneer attack. Back Greg Nasello and midfielder Don Gemmell from Lewis and Clark could be immediate contributors after enjoying fine junior college careers. Nick O'Shea's brother, Dan, also should be in position to challenge for a starting job after one season at nearby Schoolcraft.

POSITION-BY-POSITION BREAKDOWN

FORWARDS: Tag Graham (8 goals, 4 assists) and Mark Christian (7 goals, 3 assists) should retain starting roles for the Pioneers. Newcomer Meally Freeman (17 goals and 12 assists) will compete for the other spot left vacant by Morris Lupenec's departure with Marty Hagen and Bobby Pietrantonio.

SUMMARY—Six forwards should give the Pioneers the ability to use several different combinations. Christian and Freeman should provide good speed for the Pioneers. This unit could be more dangerous than last year's strikers, who scored 72 goals.

MIDFIELDERS: With two of the three midfield starters not returning, Parsons must rebuild at this position around sophomore Mike Vigh, an exceptional offensive player. Delgado, O'Shea, Gemmell and Haizel are short on major college experience, but have played with outstanding junior college programs. The biggest challenge will be molding them into a playing unit. Barrie Vince, a key reserve two years ago, could help offset the instability.

SUMMARY—This is a key area in which Oakland has had experienced players the last several years. Gemmell, Haizel, O'Shea, Delgado and Vince must overcome their lack of experience to complement the play of Vigh.

BACKS: Chan-Ho Allen is the returning back from last year's defense, which yielded only 12 goals. This area is Oakland's major question mark entering the 1984

season. All-American Munadel Numan's sweeperback position may be the hardest to fill this fall. Solomon Donnie will be given the first chance to succeed Numan. Greg Nasello and Alex Petruscha form the rest of the defensive squad.

SUMMARY—With an untested defense, the key to Oakland's season may prove to be how many goals are allowed, not scored. Donnie, Allen and Nasello must turn in strong performances in positions where inexperience can prove costly.

GOALKEEPERS: Paul Larkin and Dave Marttila represent one of the strongest goalkeeping combinations in the country. Larkin could begin to get more national acclaim this year after posting 21 shutouts his first two seasons. Marttila handled the goal in eight games and is also the number one goalkeeper for the Ukrainian Soccer Club that played in the National Amateur Cup finals last summer. He was also unscored on in those games, giving Oakland a combined 0.55 goals-against-average.

SUMMARY—Overall, this is one of the strongest positions on the squad. Larkin and Marttila may be more tested this season because of the lack of experience at the back positions. Most likely the Pioneers will need outstanding goalkeeping while the new players become more familiar with Oakland's system.

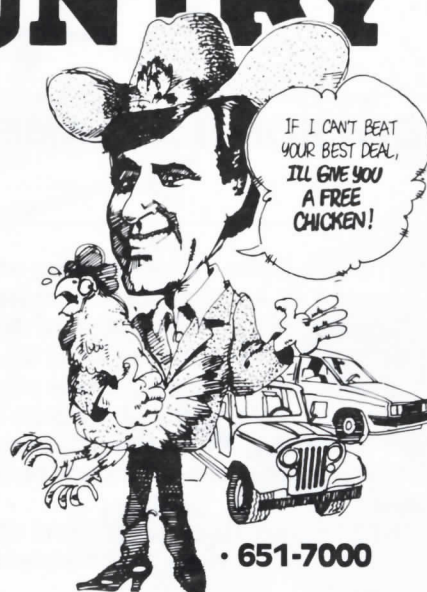

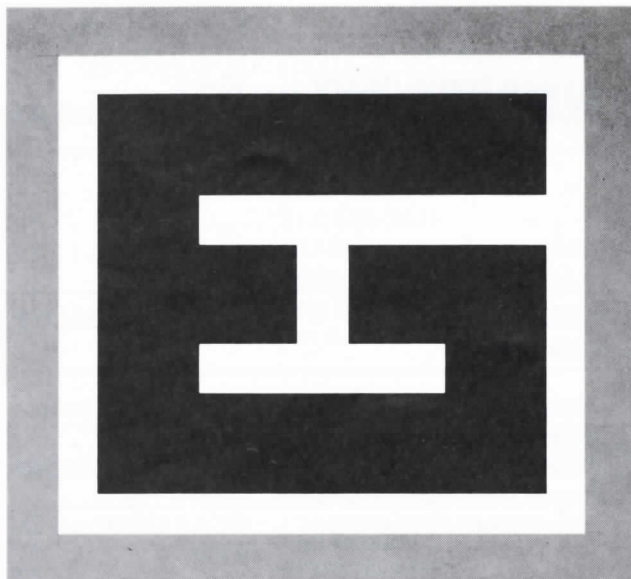
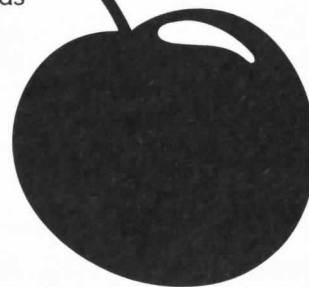

Services

The National Collegiate Athletic Association:

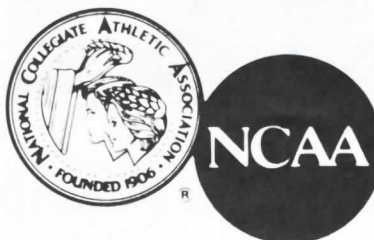
- Maintains a central clearinghouse and counseling agency in the field of college athletic administration.
- Enacts legislation to deal with athletic problems when they spread across regional lines and member institutions conclude that national action is needed. Provides financial and other assistance to various groups interested in the promotion and advancement of intercollegiate activities.
- Represents the colleges in legislative and regulatory matters on the state and Federal levels, covering topics such as Federal taxes affecting college athletics, anti-bribery and gambling laws, television, international competition and Federal aid to education affecting sports and physical education.
- Provides film/television production. The NCAA annually produces special programs for television, conference highlights films and 10 National Collegiate Championship highlights films. The NCAA also produces television coverage of NCAA championships not carried by a national television or cable network and provides a library of films containing more than 100 titles. The NCAA oversees the NCAA Television News Service, which supplies television and cable networks with material to increase NCAA sports and championship exposure.
- Sanctions postseason competition and certifies non-collegiate contests to protect the interests of its members and their student-athletes.
- Compiles and distributes official statistics for intercollegiate football, basketball, baseball and softball.
- Promotes its championship events and all intercollegiate athletics through planned activities of its national office; conducts general public relations in behalf of the Association and its members; publishes The NCAA News and dozens of other publications to advise its members and other interested parties of events and information important to intercollegiate athletics.
- Establishes committees to draw and interpret playing rules in 14 sports.

Serving Higher Education ...

Purposes

The purposes of the National Collegiate Athletic Association include these:

- To uphold the principle of institutional control of, and responsibility for, all intercollegiate athletics in conformity with the Association's constitution and bylaws.
- To serve as an overall national discussion, legislative and administrative body for the universities and colleges of the United States in matters of intercollegiate athletics.
- To legislate upon any subject of general concern to the membership in the administration of intercollegiate athletics.
- To encourage the adoption by its constituent members of eligibility rules in compliance with satisfactory standards of scholarship, amateur standing and good sportsmanship.
- To establish and supervise regional and national collegiate athletic contests under the auspices of the Association and establish rules of eligibility therefor.
- To formulate, copyright and publish rules of play for collegiate sports.
- To preserve collegiate athletic records.
- To cooperate with other amateur athletic organizations in the promotion and conduct of national and international athletic contests.
- To otherwise assist member institutions as requested in the furtherance of their intercollegiate athletic programs.
