AAUP NEGOTIATIONS WILL RESUME AUG. 15 wittees may meet during this interim period. Formal negotiations between Oakland University and its chapter of the American Association of University Professors (AAUP) will resume Aug. 15. There is the possibility that bargaining subcom-

The university reports that it is meeting almost daily with representatives of the Clerical-Technical Association workers (CTA/UAW) in an effort to reach agreement on a new contract with that bargaining unit.

Both the AAUP representing 330 faculty and the CTA/UAW with 240 workers have been working since July I without a contract.

The university's two other bargaining units, the OU Chapter of the American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees and the Police Officers Association are in the last year of a three year agreement that expires on June 30, 1976.

BOARD APPROVES SIX NEW FACULTY APPOINTMENTS

The Oakland University Board of Trustees approved the appointment of six new faculty members during personnel actions taken at the Wednesday, July 23 meeting.

The board also passed a resolution extending its appreciation to Glen Brown, former assistant president for the Division of Campus Development, for his varied services to the university since 1962. Brown has resigned to become a vice president with Robert D. Beard, Inc.

The board also approved reappointments, changes of status, or leaves of absence for 13 other faculty members.

The new faculty are: Nancy S. Barry, assistant professor of economics; Charles Ching-an Cheng, assistant professor of mathematical sciences; Ranald D. Hansen, assistant professor of psychology; Yong-Ha Hyon, instructor in management; David Paul Meyer, assistant professor of education; and Sze-Kai Tsui, assistant professor of mathematical sciences. All of the new appointments take effect on Aug. 15, 1975.

The reappointments include: Mary-Alice Gower, visiting instructor in nursing; Janice Marie Guerriero, visiting instructor in education; Clifford V. Harding, part-time adjunct professor of biological sciences; Richard Lee Rubin, assistant professor of mathematical sciences; Andrew C. Stedry, professor of management with tenure; and Daniel A. Stone, visiting assistant professor of education. In addition, Jerry L. Dahlmann, an Administrative-Professional staff member, has been named an adjunct associate professor in the School of Performing Arts.

University personnel receiving changes of status and their new positions follow: Kenneth H. Coffman, associate professor of psychology and vice president for campus and student affairs; Sylvia M. Csiffary, V. Everett Kinsey, director emeritus, Institute of Biological Sciences, and professor of biological sciences; and Janet A. Krompart, assistant professor in the library and acting associate dean of the library for technical services.

Leaves of absence were approved for Karl D. Gregory, economics and management from Aug. 28, 1975 through April 23, 1976, and for S. Rita Sparks, library, from Sept. 12, 1975 through Dec. 31, 1975.

WHITE NOTES RECENT PUBLICATIONS

William White, speech communication, spoke on journalism at Career Day '75, Brother Rice High School, Birmingham; covered sports car races at Waterford Hills and the Indianapolis 500-

mile race for The Pontiac-Waterford Times; and he has started a regular book review column for The Oakland Press reviewing Barbara Stock's Searching for Gethsamane (parts of which were laid at Oakland University, where she was a student) and Hemingway's Nick Adams Stories.

Professor White had two reviews in Journalism Quarterly, Lloyd Graybar's Albert Shaw of the Review of Reviews and Carl Bode's Highly Irregular; and he edited the Walt Whitman Annual Supplement of The Long-Islander (founded by Whitman in Huntington, New York in 1838), featuring "Women in the Life of Walt Whitman." He also attended a conference of Whitman editors at the New York University Press and had an article on the Kaye collection of detective fiction in Presenting Moonshine (Tacoma, Washington) and another on Hemingway's poetry in Literary Sketches (Williamsburg, Virginia).
