IN OTHER Bored action, DeMatthew stuck his gum under the chair. Lewisnothere got mad and sent his pants out to be dry cleaned.

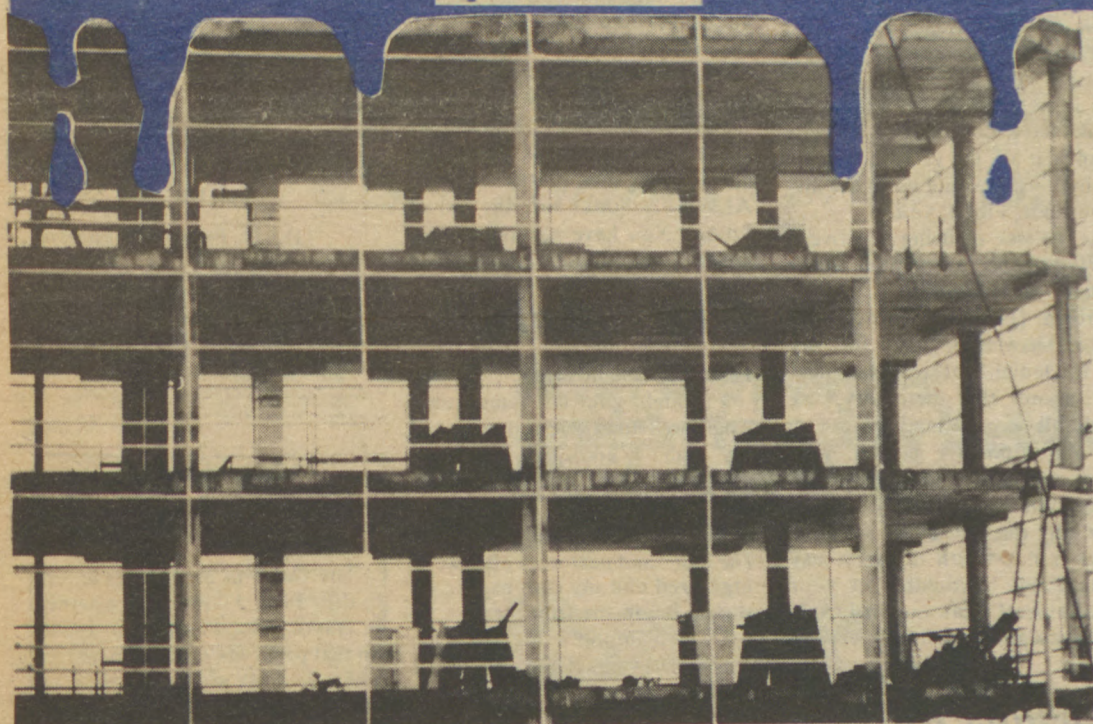
The Bored Trustees also voted an increase in SAGA food prices. Large cokes will now cost \$.46 instead of \$.45.

Storm ruins O'Dowd Hall

A small hailstorm early Thursday morning knocked out all the windows in O'Dowd Hall which is still under construction.

Approximately 1000 windows, valued at \$1,000 each, were broken by pea sized hailstones that trickled to the ground in the wake of an early spring thunderstorm.

Frank L. Wright, chief engineer of the \$.85 million O'Dowd Hall building project, implied that it would be a long time before the damage would be repaired.

Reached in a local bar on Friday night, Wright said dejectedly, "I've worked so hard. My mom was so proud of me and now this. Bartender, give me another beer."

Public Safety was first notified of the storm damage Friday about 10 am by an anonymous student on her way to class. Officer Richard Tracey was dispatched to the scene soon thereafter.

"Glass was everywhere," Tracey said. "O'Dowd Hall looked like a skeleton. All I could do was call maintenance."

While the damage is being repaired, students are asked by construction officials to donate their bed sheets to cover up the holes.

No other damage from the storm was reported, although the sports faculty is considering turning the lawn around O'Dowd Hall into an 18 hole golf course.

Also, no injuries were reported except for a maintenance worker's cut finger.

The storm went unnoticed by anyone until early Friday morning. Pamela Pomeroy, resident assistant, said that it was little wonder that no one heard it. "There isn't anything that could wake these people up on Friday morning," she said.

Even though O'Dowd Hall will still be windowless, officials will still go ahead with the opening of the structure this fall.

Transfer Coordinator Jerry Welcher said that there were too many plans made and too many people hired to just drop or delay the moving of personnel into the new building.

"The hailstorm wasn't on the schedule," Welcher said. "But there won't be an air conditioning problem until winter anyway," he said.

The distributor of the specially insulated windows used in O'Dowd Hall said that OU used the last one he had that was left over from the Renaissance Center. New windows for O'Dowd Hall are being shipped from India and are expected to take at least six months to arrive.

Striking administrators refuse to settle

OU's administrators are still refusing to return to their normal positions during their now six-month old strike.

"We refuse to sit at our desks and shuffle papers until our demands are met," said Propane Torch, chief negotiator and sometimes dean of the College of Arts and Sciences.

Two administrators have suffered brain damage during the strike because of their insistence on standing on their heads during normal business hours. (For most of America, that means 9 to 5, for Academia, it means from 1 to 2 or whatever comes first.)

The extent of the damage is not clear, due to the inability of physicians to attest to their state of mental health before the strike.

Custodians have filed grievances

against the administrators, maintaining that they are causing a safety hazard by lying in front of, on top of and under their desks. "We can't get our work done with 'em lyin' everywhere," said one custodian. "Why can't they just keep lyin' through their teeth, like they used to?"

Demands by the striking administrators involve working conditions. Students, they maintain, are a health hazard, and slow down an otherwise efficient bureaucracy.

"Who needs them," asked one assistant to the assistant of administrator's services to the Administration. "They get in our way, making unreasonable demands on our time, energy and

Parking changes will save time for officers

The parking ticket problem on Oakland University's campus has been solved by changing all legal parking spaces to illegal parking spaces.

This change will save Public Safety time because at 8:15 am, the officers will line up, one officer to a lane, down the length of the parking lot and begin distributing tickets to each car.

In addition all legal parking spaces have been designated as the Public Safety impound lot. This will spare Public Safety the trouble of having to purchase property to tow all the cars to. Anyone parking in the lots on campus will have to pay the \$20 towing fee before removing their car.

LEGAL PARKING area on campus includes all fire lanes, handicapped parking zones and the circle in front of Hamlin Hall.

The money collected from the towing fees will be used to support the new vice squad that is being formed within the Public Safety department. It has been reported that there have been a number of "red light districts" established on campus. When asked about these "districts", Dean for Student Life Crack Wallace responded, "Who me?" Assistant Dean for Student Life, Binky Deadingpound said "I wonder if they have any alcoholic beverages on this campus?"

Deadingpound also added that if any students are involved in this type of activity that they should apply to become a student organization. They would then be eligible for an SAB allocation and could use their activities as fund raisers. There is also the possibility of co-sponsoring with other student organizations.

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Public Safety dons OU blazer

A new uniform has been designed for Chief Dick, director of Public Safety. It is called the OU Blazer.

The Public Safety Department wanted to increase their visibility and felt that by having Chief Dick wear the "Blazer" he would be easier to spot in a crowd.

The "Blazer" made of 100 percent wool, is equipped with red

warning lights and has the Public Safety phone number printed on the back in bright red letters.

The student marshalls will also be wearing these "Blazers" while on duty. A special feature of theirs will be a pad of parking tickets and a pen in each pocket. They will also wear jumper cables around their necks and carry a flask of no-lead gasoline in their breast coat pocket.

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Researchers try to lick Tongue problems at lab

The departments of Biological Sciences, Nursing and Physical Therapy have gotten together and opened up a new research lab—for tongue research.

The head researcher for the new Tongue Research Lab, Professor Lipzen Tong, said it was about time that a lab of this kind was opened at OU.

"I've wanted to do tongue research ever since I was 5 years old when I first discovered my tongue as I was licking clean my pet goldfish," Tong said.

"FROM THAT time on," Tong said, "I've been held spellbound by, no make that in love with my tongue. I guess you could call me a tongue man," he said.

Tong said that as a youngster on Halloween, instead of dressing himself up in a costume, he would make up a costume for his tongue.

"The only Halloween I missed in the 18 years I went trick-or-treating," Tong said, "was when I was 12 years old. Three days before Halloween, I sprained my tongue

playing basketball on a missed lay-up."

Tong is currently on a recruiting campaign for students to enlist in the new research program.

He said that tongue research is a painless, and sometimes pleasant experience.

"We will test the subjects' tongues for sensitivity to hot and cold, for taste bud response to various stimuli, and to see if blindfolding the tongue will confuse it and cause it to become disoriented in the mouth," Tong said.

The aging researcher said that he will conduct a test on several subjects to see if different people have different quality licks.

THIS WILL be done, Tong said, by having the subjects lick suckers and then count the number of licks each subject takes to get to the Tootsie-Roll center.

Research subjects will also be tested to find out the effects of French-kissing on the nervous system. Tong theorizes that prolonged French-kissing is the primary cause of premature

ingrown toenails.

"We want to warn people of the dangers of French-kissing, if there are any, before they find themselves hobbling around with 6 sore toes," Tong said.

When a student signs up for tongue research, Tong said, only the basic information will be required to be given. All subjects remain confidential.

MEASUREMENTS will be taken of the tongue, Tong said. "We want to come up with an average tongue length and use that in the compilation of other data to see the effect of tongue length on the tasting capability."

The federal government has provided research funds totally over \$57 per year to be used to buy suckers and various other research aids.

The only stipulation placed by the government on the research program is that the results must be published within 6 years.

"I'm glad the government realizes the importance of tongue research," Tong said. "And their most lucrative grant proves that."

When the two cars stopped sliding, Railroy was the first to speak. "Hey man," he said. "Like what were you trying to do?"

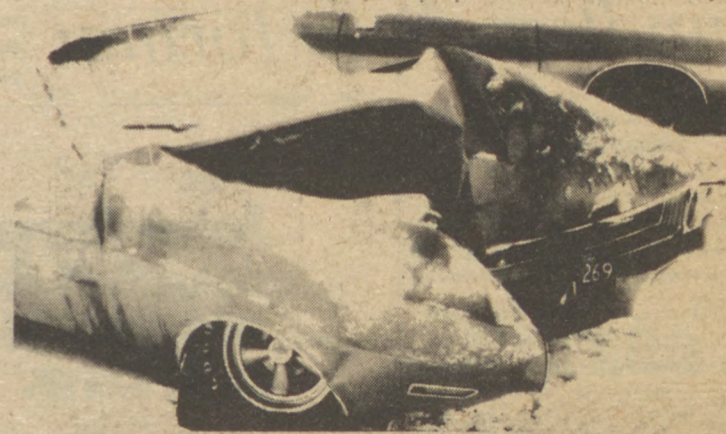
Chief Dick tried to apologize for the accident, but he didn't know what to say. "I told him that I didn't mean to hit him," Dick said.

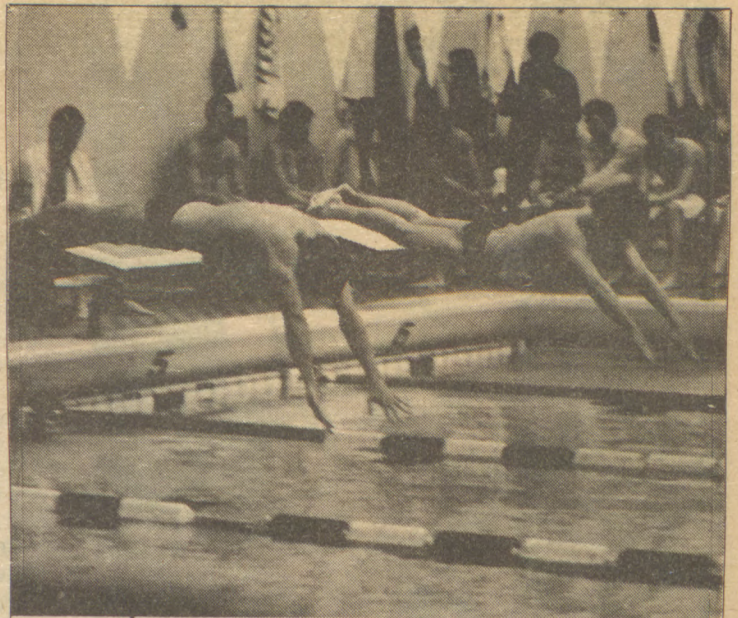
Jack Voit, found on the tennis court with his Wilson racquet, said, "Would you stop asking me stupid questions in the middle of my tennis game?"
