COMMENCEMENT DETAILS ARE ANNOUNCED

Students who completed degree requirements in December, 1975, or who plan to complete them in April, 1976, have been invited to participate in commencement ceremonies to be held on Saturday, June 5, by the faculties of the College of Arts and Sciences, the School of Economics and Management, the School of Education, and the School of Engineering. Each graduate will be individually recognized, and academic honors earned by December and April graduates will be announced.

The 10 a.m. ceremonies will be held by the School of Education in Baldwin Pavilion and by the School of Engineering in Wilson Hall Auditorium. The 2 p.m. ceremonies will be held by the College of Arts and Sciences in Baldwin Pavilion and by the School of Economics and Management in Wilson Hall Auditorium.

The marshals for these various ceremonies are: William Schwab, arts and sciences; Douglas Gregory, economics and management; William Hamlin, education; and Howard Witt, engineering.

An academic procession will begin forming approximately 30 to 40 minutes before each ceremony. Detailed instructions will be available from the individual marshals.

All those wishing to rent academic regalia should file an order before May 15 with David Bixby in the University Book Center.

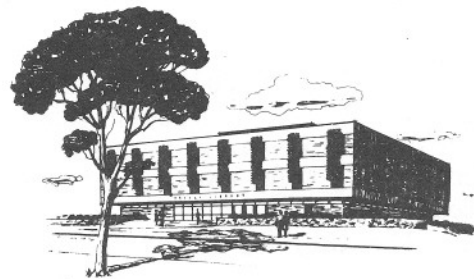
UNDERGRADUATES EARN RESEARCH SUPPORT

The competitive awards were made by the University Research Committee from funds contributed by the Alumni Association.

Johnson, biology, "Regulatory Mechanisms of Urate Oxidase in Drosophila Melanogaster"; Donald R. Kanter, psychology, "Hyperactivity and Reticular Arousal"; and Paul Kemner, music, "The Investigation and Reconstruction of Renaissance Transverse Flutes."

Potvin, chemistry, "Alkylammonium Hydrogen Fluoride Complex Salts"; Shelagh O'Rourke-Vincent, anthropology, "Saut-d'eau Pilgrimage Project"; and Mark S. EVARTS ATTENDS WORKSHOP

Peter Evarts, chairperson, learning skills, will be a presenter at the "Verbal Skills Development Workshop: Teaching Reading and Composition" program. The program is sponsored by the Mid-America Association of Educational Opportunity Program Personnel and the U.S. Office of Education Region V to be held April 22-24 in Rockton, Illinois.

The workshop will focus sharply on the specific problems that reading and composition instructors face in developing the linguistic and cognitive skills of underprepared students.

POLISH TOUR SET FOR SLAVIC DANCERS

The Slavic Folk Ensemble, under the direction of Helen Kovach-Tarakanov, modern languages, will present nine performances in Poland between July 29-August 20. The 27 students will tour various cities of Poland as "Bicentennial Ambassadors."

The tour is sponsored by Friendship Ambassadors, Inc., New York, and the government of Poland. Friendship Ambassadors, Inc. is a nonprofit, tax-exempt foundation furthering international understanding through the performing arts.

Professor Kovach-Tarakanov said, "We wish to acknowledge with sincere gratitude the support which President O'Dowd, Provost Obeare, Professor Ozinga, and other members of the faculty and staff have given us in this undertaking." Members of the ensemble are engaged in projects to help raise additional funds to cover the remaining costs of the trip. Individuals wishing to contribute may do so by making donations in care of OU and earmarked for the Slavic Folk Ensemble trip. GARDEN PLOTS AVAILABLE ON CAMPUS

Garden plots are available for members of the OU community. The land is located on campus near the end of Lonedale Road, east of Squirrel Road. The area has southern exposure, and the ground is in readily workable condition. It has been used by farming classes in recent years.

Plots will be distributed on a first-come, first-serve basis on April 16 between 4 p.m. and 6 p.m. and on April 17 between 11 a.m. and 2 p.m. Participants are asked to bring stakes to make the boundaries of their plots.

There is enough land for 16 very large plots, each 60' by 60', or room for many smaller plots depending upon interest and needs.

Each year at this time the Advising and Counseling Office has begun to prepare materials which are given to new students during Summer orientation. The night section will begin with the 1976 fall semester. Classes will be scheduled two evenings a week, Monday and Thursday, from 6-10:30 p.m.

The new five-year track is designed to permit superior students at OU to complete two degrees in five years. Under the regulations of the program, any student who places in the top 15 percent of the class in his/her major field (in grade point average) may apply for admission to the program during the winter semester of the junior year. Approval is required by the student's major adviser as well as the Master of Science in Management admissions committee. Upon acceptance, 24 credit hours applicable to the management program will be taken in the senior year as "free" undergraduate electives. The student would then have completed his undergraduate degree and will be formally accepted into the Master of Science in Management program where 32 credits of graduate work is required. The schedule for closing OU's accounting records for the period 1975-76 has been established and is presented below. All financial data that is to be included in this year's business must be submitted by the dates specified.

Accounts Payable: Invoices dated on or before June 30, 1976, for goods and/or services received during 1975-76 must be submitted to voucher audit by Thursday, July 8, to be included in 1975-76 business. (Claims for travel reimbursement which are to be charged to 1975-76 cannot include expenses incurred subsequent to June 30, 1976.)

Cash Receipts/Deposits: All monies on hand at June 30 must be deposited with the cashier in the business office no later than 9:30 a.m. on Thursday, July 1, to accept these deposits.

The above data will be included on the June Accounting Ledgers that will be available about July 13. Any adjustments or corrections to these ledgers that you wish made must be communicated to the accounting office no later than July 15 to be considered in the final 1975-76 accounting reports.
