Dean Suggests New Name for OU

When you mention Oakland University, ever hear —
"How did you like going to school in California?"

Or — "Is that Rochester, *New York*?"

Or even — "Are all those gas lights still burning there?"
(Oakland County Community College)

Well, OU Dean of Student Life Jack Wilson has heard 'em all. And he feels there's so much confusion about Oakland's name that it needs a new one.

"People are confused about who we are," explained Wilson, who has asked President Donald D. O'Dowd to consider renaming the school Meadow Brook University. He'd like the name change this fall, marking the 10th anniversary of founder Matilda Wilson's death and 20th anniversary of the Wilsons' gift of a site.

"I think we should take a good hard look at our name and our identity."

Wilson, who came to Oakland from the University of Northern Colorado in 1971, said his own first experience with the school's name was confusing.

"I'd read a story about Oakland County Community College (OCCC) and when I saw the OU job posted I thought it was a two-year school." He's constantly running into questions about Oakland's location and relationship to the community college.

"Our bookstore shipments regularly get sent to OCCC," he added. "There are just dozens of examples of confusion."

He says many schools have changed their names. "We've been here 20 years and will be here 200 more. We don't have that much invested in our name. And I just don't find any tremendous loyalty to the name Oakland."

Wilson has considered other names — among them Pontiac State University and Southeastern Michigan U. (there's already a Wilson College in Pennsylvania) — but prefers Meadow Brook University.

"We've made a real commitment to the Meadow Brooks. We've fought to keep the Hall and farm open. And I think it's a pretty name and a tribute to the enormous generosity of the Wilsons."

He'd also like to see the university adopt "Waltzing Matilda" as a school song. "It's a fantastic march," he said.

O'Dowd said he plans to test Wilson's idea at a meeting of advisory-type groups. But while he recognizes there are problems with Oakland's name, he feels switching to another would be too complicated and expensive.

"I wish we had a very distinctive name. We tried hard to arrange it," explained O'Dowd, who came to the university in 1960. "Politically the only useful name for a community college is the name of its county. I think it was unwise of us not to anticipate that. But at the time we chose a name the only sentiment was for Oakland."

Two Artists Inspire Grad

Will O'Neill's art work reflects his admiration for two artists — Jackson Pollack and Mother Nature.

With his brush, the Oakland fine arts grad ('72) creates abstract paintings. With his camera, he captures nature in hopes of preserving it.

Pontiac's Address Galleries, 18 W. Huron, recently displayed O'Neill's large acrylic paintings.

He created them with a Zen Buddhist philosophy, he said. All preparation was mental. He approached the unstretched, unprepared canvasses free of mundane, daily worries. Then the painting was "executed extremely rapidly," he said.

This personally frees him, O'Neill said, because he doesn't already have hours of stretching and preparation in a painting before he even starts.

"Galaxy Alpha," a large four-panel modular piece, was created by "throwing the paint on the canvas," he said.

"I let the paint lie as it fell. I let the paint paint the picture. In some areas, I would modify that by brushing the paint around with large, gestural strokes."

One of the show pieces, "Galaxy Alpha" is a "very dynamic and energetic painting," O'Neill said. "Its motion is the motion and the emotion it took to realize it."

His style is more acceptable in New York or Los Angeles than Detroit, though, he said. "It isn't one of the better ways to keep food on your table."

"Logistically, it's a hassle to paint," he said. "Just getting down to brass tacks, it takes time, effort and a lot of money. Paint's not cheap."

So after graduation O'Neill signed on with Parts Packaging Company, Pontiac, where he is now executive vice-president. He also manages a company division, Rapid Print Company, Rochester.

But he still takes commissions for abstract paintings and would like to do another art show this year. "It's something that got into me and it's not going to leave," he explained.

He is also interested in photography, coupled with the environment. He gained photography training at Wayne State University, Detroit, before transferring to Oakland in 1970.

"I'm beginning to feel a greater commitment towards the environment," he explained. "Pollution basically sickens me."

"I intend to use photography to help preserve areas in good shape and hopefully help regenerate those which aren't."

"Environmental protection is one thing I can get behind very strongly," O'Neill added. "It's one of the few things in which I can see myself making a commitment and feeling right about it."

He had planned to take underwater photography classes in California this winter, then aquatic environmental

studies at the University of Michigan or Florida Institute of Technology. But he has postponed these plans indefinitely to concentrate on business.

"I'm very heavily into that right now. It's occupying most of my time."

Karen Sue Hermes, 21, of Armada, is an OU senior majoring in journalism. Editor of the Oakland Sail, she is an in-touch student intern. Her previous internships include the Oakland Press, Pontiac, Mich., and the Rochester Observer-Eccentric.

He said the name Meadow Brook became popular later, through the Music Festival and Theatre. "It's been developed, marketed and gained visibility since. But in 1962 no one even considered the name Meadow Brook."

O'Dowd said changing a university's name would mean a great deal of trouble and cost — probably at least \$100,000.

"We have wide recognition as Oakland University. We'd risk four or five years of genuine confusion," detailed O'Dowd, who said it took about five years to switch from MSU - Oakland to Oakland University.

"Just think of the bookstore. Change


our name and their whole inventory is dead. We went through that before."

The president said talk of a name change comes up every two or three years. Personally, he feels Meadow Brook is just not a university name.


"To me, it's a subdivision name — or a golf course or dairy farm, which it was. I bet there are a thousand subdivisions with that name."

"It has a nonacademic, nonuniversity ring to it. It works well in art, but I don't know that it would be a good university name."

But he said he'd like reaction to Wilson's proposal. "If there's enough intense feeling, it just might happen."



Alumni Gifts Go Way Over Goal

Alumni giving jumped again in 1976, exceeding \$30,000. At \$30,983.70, last year's donations were four times the \$7,277.13 collected in 1973 when OU alumni held their first intense fund drive.

A total of \$16,494.36 was donated in 1974 and \$19,617.22 in 1975. Bigger gifts by individuals and increased volunteer involvement were major reasons for last year's success.

The 1976 trend was away from the \$5 contribution and toward the \$10 gift.

"We have many alumni reaching the five-year mark," explained Alumni Director Elaine Petz ('74).

"And when they've been out five years grads tend to be more supportive. It takes at least that long to get established."

Fund Drive Chairperson Bill Shea ('65) of Birmingham said a record number of volunteers helped with the telefund, mailings and even offered services to the university as guest lecturers.

"We cannot thank enough those who gave so many hours. It was quite a show of support," he said.

He said he is "happy that there's been so much growth in such a short time.

"It means more people are supporting the university and saying thank you for what it's done for them."

Goal for the 1976 fund drive was \$24,000. An eight-day telethon, with 167 volunteers calling nationwide to grads, brought 1,570 pledges and \$14,283. Of these, 862 pledges and \$11,288 have been received.

Many of the volunteers were attracted by the Alumni Association's first Swap Day, which traded passes to Meadow

Brook Festival, Meadow Brook Hall and Katke-Cousins Golf Course for volunteers' services.

Other fund raisers were an art auction, which netted \$1,057.07, and a swim meet, which brought in \$758.47.

Of the donations \$8,513 was designated for specific areas of the university. Another \$14,539.50 in undesignated funds will be distributed by the Alumni Association Board of Directors.

Pioneer Club membership grew from 104 members to 116. Pioneer Club members give \$50 or more to the institution during the fund drive year (May 1 through Jan. 31). Many also contribute \$100 or more and are named to the university's Century Club.

Matching gifts rose from 36 in 1975 to 68 last year. Adding \$2,300 to the fund, the matching companies were American Motors Corporation, Bendix Corporation, Bristol Myers, Coopers & Lybrand, Chrysler Corporation, Clow Corporation, Eaton Corporation, Ex-Cello Corporation, and Firestone Tire & Rubber Corporation.


Oakland grads made headlines:

OUEAA chairperson Fred Phillips ('69, '71) is part of the search committee for a new dean of engineering.

Phillips explained the alumni group believes strongly in "providing feedback to the university." And he sees committee memberships as a "positive way of providing feedback."

"Engineering alumni really seem to care about OU. And now we can officially interject our thoughts."

OUEAA has also completed two surveys. A salary survey, with 120 of 600 engineering grads responding to questions about their jobs, showed their salaries are "about average in this region and a little better than average for the country," Phillips said.

A "mini-resume" was developed as a way of letting members know about job openings in their field. OUEAA is now working out a way to exchange information it received.

Phillips, whose term is up in October, said the group raised more than \$3,000 last year for OUEAA projects. Among these were this spring's second annual paper contest for Oakland undergrads; a scholarship to the engineering student with the highest grade point average; and sponsoring student projects.

Music Majors Form Alumni Group

After a year's planning, the Oakland University Music Alumni Association (OUMAA) is accepting members.

A spring meeting is being scheduled by the group's board of directors, elected Jan. 30 at a general organizational get-together in Meadow Brook Club House.

Working with the group is OU Music Professor Robert Facko. He said OUMAA grew from alumni requests and music department concern over losing track of its graduates.

"Music is a professional field and we need to keep in touch," explained Facko, who would like to see the new organization put together a professional directory of grads.

"There's also talk of alumni giving performances on campus. And I think that's a good possibility," Facko added.

"But the department is not going to tell them what to do. That's not recognizing their abilities."

The group has addresses of 110

music alumni. Other prospective members are being sought.

Membership is open to any music graduate and, in special cases, to any Oakland grad recommended by the board.

Membership is free the first year after graduation. Then OUMAA members must contribute at least \$5 a year to the university alumni association. The money will be earmarked for music alumni projects.


In Memoriam


