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June is Pride Month

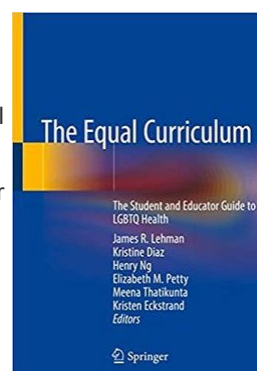

The Medical Library has completed its [Preliminary 2020 Publication Report](#), which includes publications within the 2020 calendar year from faculty, students, and staff. This year's report includes 85 citations from our Foundational Medical Studies Department, as well as 165 citations from our current and former medical students. 2020's report also features 38 articles about the COVID-19 Pandemic.

[The Prevention TaskForce](#) (formerly ePSS) application assists primary care clinicians to identify the screening, counseling, and preventive medication services that are appropriate for their patients. Cost: Free

Resources for Locating Diverse and Inclusive Images

While some major textbooks have been slow to include images from diverse populations, publishers and other groups are addressing this gap through specialized databases, image banks, and monographs. OUWB faculty and students can incorporate images from these resources in their instructional materials as long as they follow copyright and licensing restrictions and cite the works appropriately.

Best Bet

[VisualDx](#) - Image-based diagnostic support database with point-of-care information covering visually identifiable diseases including dermatologic, infectious, genetic, metabolic, and drug induced conditions, as well as occupational injuries. More than 28% of the images are of skin types IV, V, and VI. A useful "Skin of Color" filter allows you to quickly find images from diverse population groups.
