BOARD OF TRUSTEES WILL MEET MARCH 26 The Oakland University Board of Trustees will hold a public meeting Wednesday, March 26 at 8 p.m. in Lounge II of the Oakland Center.

OU SENDS 16 SWIMMERS TO NCAA CHAMPIONSHIPS

Oakland has qualified 16 men for the NCAA Division II National Swimming Champion-ships to be held in Cleveland, Ohio on March 20, 21, and 22.

Coach Corey Van Fleet will have at least one swimmer in each individual race and three full relay teams.

Oakland senior qualifiers are: Tim Brooks, 100 and 200 yard breaststroke; Mike Gooch, 400 yard individual medley and the 200 yard butterfly; and Byron Gibbs, 50 and 100 yard freestyle.

Junior Jim Terebus qualified in one and three meter diving.

Sophomore qualifiers are: Paul Karas, 200, 500, and I,650 yard freestyles; Rod Mitchell, 200 and 400 yard individual medley and the 100 yard freestyle; Bob Jenrow, 100 and 200 yard breaststroke; Lary Christiansen, 100 and 200 yard butterfly; Gary Lauinger, 100 and 200 yard backstroke; Kevin Mixer, I,650 yard freestyle; and Kevin Kirchner, 800 yard freestyle relay.

Freshmen qualifiers are: Tom Boyd, 200 and 400 yard individual medley and the 200 yard butterfly; Jim Hanson, 100 and 200 yard butterfly; Dale Kelley, 100 yard backstroke; Dale Swezene, 50 and 100 yard freestyle; and Scott Teeters, 400 yard individual medley.

Last year Oakland gathered 79 points from nine qualifiers for a seventh place finish at the championships.

SELO ENSEMBLE PERFORMS MARCH 22-23

Oakland University's student "Selo Ensemble" will perform the songs and dances of the Slavic countries in three campus performances March 22-23 in Varner Recital Hall.

Performances will be at 8 p.m. on Saturday, March 22 and at 2 and 8 p.m. on Sunday, March 23. Admission is \$2 for adults and \$1 for students. Tickets will be sold in the Oakland Center and at the door prior to each performance.

The ensemble is named "Selo" after the Slavic word for village. The programs feature the songs and dances of Bulgaria, Croatia, Poland, Romania, Russia, Serbia, and the Ukraine.

ATTORNEY TO SPEAK ON PRIVACY RIGHTS

The man who successfully prosecuted former White House official John Ehrlichman and others on charges arising from the "Pentagon Papers" incident will speak at Oakland University Thursday, March 20.

Detroit attorney William H. Merrill will lecture on "American's Rights of Privacy" at I p.m. in the Gold Room of the Oakland Center. His free talk is sponsored by OU's Commuter Council.

Merrill was assistant special prosecutor in Washington, D. C., between June, 1973 and Sept., 1974. During that period he was in charge of prosecuting Ehrlichman and others on charges arising from the 1971 break-in of the office of Daniel Ellsberg's psychiatrist.

Ellsburg is the former employee of the Rand Corporation who admitted obtaining the then secret Pentagon Papers and giving the information to the media. The papers were a detailed Pentagon study of U. S. intervention in Viet Nam.

Merrill is now in private practice in Detroit. He is a 1950 graduate of the Yale University Law School, and he had served from 1961-66 as chief assistant U.S. attorney.

LIBOFF SPEAKS AT SCIENCE SYMPOSIUM

Abraham R. Liboff, physics, delivered addresses Feb. 21-22 before the 11th Annual Southeastern Michigan Junior Science and Humanities Symposium held at Wayne State University. The theme of the symposium was "The Social and Moral Consequences of Science." Liboff's talks were on "Physics and Public Policy."

The Administrative Policies and Procedures Manual states that all campus conference programs, no matter what the origin of sponsorship, must be coordinated through the Conference Department of the Division of Continuing Education.

William White, speech communication, whose biographical sketch appears in Who's Who in America, 1974-1975, has had a new book dedicated to him: William F. Nolan's Hemingway: Last Days of the Lion.

In addition, White is the author of numerous published articles. They are: "Mary Davis at 328 Mickle Street,"

Walt Whitman Review, and "Errors in Leaves of Grass, Comprehensive Reader's Edition," The Papers of the Bibliographical Society of America. His reviews are: Henry Beetle Hough, Country Editor, and Robert G. Hays,

Country Editor: Influence of a Weekly Newspaper, both in The Quill; "Goldwyn / Bergen / Longstreet," Canyon Crier, February 10; reviews of F. Scott Fitzgerald, The Basil and Josephine Stories, and Ronald Gottesman and Charles L. P. Silet, The Literary Manuscripts of Upton Sinclair, both in American Book Collector; and "Ernest Bramah in Periodicals, 1890-1972," in the Bulletin of Bibliography.

FINANCIAL AID OFFERED ONLY FOR FALL, WINTER Thomas H. Atkinson, director of Administrative Services, has reaffirmed the position taken earlier this year that financial aid funds for 1974-75 are available for the regular school year only.

Last year there were financial aid funds available for spring session because loan repayments exceeded expectations. These lean funds were supplemented by limited university grant funds.

This year loan repayments are lagging drastically behind. Thus no loan funds could be made available for spring session, Atkinson said.

Also because of severe budgetary cutbacks throughout the university, there are no extra dollars that could be used to match the nonexistent loan funds. The university has used all of its budgeted financial aid funds during the regular school year in order to maximize support for the largest number of students, a policy that it has followed for over ten years, Atkinson said.

APPLICATIONS OPEN FOR UYA INTERNSHIPS The University Year for ACTION Program (UYA) at OU is accepting applications now through April I. Information can be obtained at the Urban Affairs Center, room 374 of South Foundation Hall.

The UYA program is sponsored by ACTION, the federal agency that coordinates all civilian volunteer programs including VISTA and the Peace Corps. OU is the only college or university in Michigan to receive a UYA grant.

Since May of 1973 more than 100 UYA interns have been placed in area social service and educational agencies. Interns receive a yearly stipend of \$3,000 plus insurance benefits. Each student intern is expected to serve for one year. The third year of UYA funding will begin May I. Interns will be placed in approximately 20 area agencies. Applicants must be OU students by May I, 1975.

STUDENT SLANT

STUDENT LEADERSHIP PROGRAM ESTABLISHED

The Department for Student Organizations and Activities and Community House will be sponsoring a variety of leadership experiences during the 1975-76 academic year. Openings are now available for all OU students interested in developing better

leadership skills through a two-semester program.

The program will offer varied experiences including research national leadership training methods, workshops, human potential seminars, and specialized readings. A "Leadership House" program is also available with the cooperation of the Department of Residence Halls for those students interested in a live-in leadership experience.

From two to six credits (per semester) may possibly be offered through human resource development, management, or political science. Applications may be picked up at Community House, Charlie Browns, Commuter Services, or the Department for Student Organizations and Activities office. POPULATION RESEARCH INTERNSHIPS OFFERED.

Internships at a stipend of \$600 are available to Oakland University graduate and undergraduate students from the Population Institute, Washington, D. C.

The Population Institute invites students, faculty, state legislators, government, and community leaders to participate in its intern program in population and environment. The program allows students to do something about problems caused by population growth and distribution while they are involved in their normal academic

The interns assist state and local leaders in defining state population/environment problems and preparing legislative and administrative responses to the problems. Since 1972 the program has sponsored more than 100 students in almost 30 states.

Intern research is intended to be action-oriented. It is designed to produce results by focusing on new activities in government and on full implementation of laws and policies that already exist. The interns serve not as partisans or advocates, but as fact finders, researchers, and organizers. They provide a clearinghouse to bring clarity, thoroughness, and perspective to the governmental process.

Each year, a limited number of highly qualified students are selected to internships which generally last from September until June. The Population Institute staff, in consultation with state and local leaders, identify project subjects on the basis of legislative and administrative priorities and match them with the interests and expertise of the applicants.

Subjects of research are unlimited and include population, birth control, sex education, and equal rights. For further details, contact Michael Riley, chairperson of the Greater Oakland Chapter of Zero Population Growth, at 377-2394.

CONGRESS EXPANDS STUDENT SERVICES

The 1975-76 University Congress has formed a number of congressional committees to expand the area of student services. This action has been taken for a number of reasons, one of which is the introduction of a bylaw amendment by congressmembers Mike Jay, Marilyn Palliaer, and Jim Bier.

Bylaws are adopted each term of office as the specific operating procedures of the congress for that term. The amendment to the existing bylaw which established a Steering Committee places the responsibility of filling student vacancies in senate committees upon the Steering Committee. If the amendment is adopted, congress will spend less time filling vacancies and more time serving students.

Toward this end, University Congress has established or reestablished three committees to directly aid OU students. The Student Unionization Study Committee was formed due to growing concerns among OU's student employees. The lack of job security in student employment will be the area of this committee's research.

A Book Co-op Study Committee was formed March 6 to research the institution of a one-stop used text book resale station. By students listing their used text books for sale in one area, bargain hunters would have an alternative to buying new books each semester.

The Recycling Program Study Committee was formed March 6 to research the need for a recycling program in the OU area. The committee will look into the feasibility and profitability of such a program as well as the environmental aspects before recommending the spending of congressional funds.

Student services are also being expanded by the adoption of the position of ombudsperson. As is his/her role, the ombudsperson will aid in any way possible in their dealings with the university.
