

Fellowship applications still taken

Inquiries about the Danforth Graduate Fellowships, to be awarded by the Danforth Foundation of St. Louis, Missouri in April 1978, are invited, according to the local campus representative, John Barnard, history, 460 West Vandenberg Hall.

The Fellowships are open to all qualified persons who have serious interest in teaching careers in colleges and universities, and who plan to study for a Ph.D. in any field of study common to the undergraduate liberal arts curriculum in the United States.

Applicants for the baccalaureate awards must be college seniors and may not have undertaken graduate level programs on study beyond their college-level work. They must be nominated by liaison officers of their undergraduate institutions by November 15, 1977. The Danforth Foundation does not accept direct applications for the baccalaureate fellowships.

Welfare reform conference scheduled

Wilma Ray-Bledsoe, director of Urban Affairs, will introduce the topic, Jacqueline Scherer, OU assistant professor of sociology and anthropology, will present an overview of welfare reform efforts, and Eban Martin, planning associate for United Community Services, will speak on the welfare reform proposals.

Teaching/Learning workshops set
