

OU BOARD APPROVES PERSONNEL ACTIONS

The appointment of eight new faculty members was approved by the Oakland University Board of Trustees in personnel actions taken Wednesday, September 24. In addition, the major reappointment approved by the board was that of Laszlo J. Hetenyi as Dean of the School of Education for a five-year term. Hetenyi is now serving his fourth term as dean of the School of Education.

New faculty members appointed effective August 15 of this year are: August J. Durelli, John F. Dodge Professor of Engineering; Raymond M. Guydosh, visiting assistant professor of management; Edward J. Kujawa, visiting assistant professor of education; Barukh Nevo, visiting assistant professor of psychology; Barnett R. Parker, instructor in management; Antoinette Renaud, instructor in nursing; Bradley Roy Sands, assistant professor in mathematical sciences; and George Tzoannos, visiting instructor in economics.

The reappointments include: Thomas A. Aston, adjunct assistant professor of speech communication; Alexander Norval Gray, special instructor in acting; Valerie Jane Gray, special instructor in period technique and acting; William J. Jorns, adjunct assistant professor of education; Margaret B. Pigott, assistant professor of learning skills; Sallyann Poinsett, visiting assistant professor of education; and James Roy Tompkins, special instructor in movement.

Faculty who received changes of status and their new positions follow: Louis R. Bragg, to professor of mathematical sciences and chairperson of the department of mathematical sciences; Yong-na Hyon, to assistant professor of management; William H. Jones, to assistant professor of education; Keith R. Kleckner, to professor of engineering and associate provost; and Richard B. Stamps, to assistant professor of anthropology.

LABOR PACTS APPROVED BY BOARD

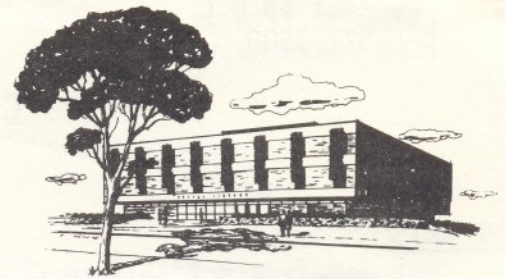
The Oakland University Board of Trustees has approved one-year labor pacts between the university and two bargaining units.

Contracts were approved September 24 with the university's chapter of the American Association of University Professors (AAUP) and with the UAW Local 1925. The local represents the OU clerical-technical employees.

The UAW unit has ratified the contract 138-3. No ratification vote date has been set by the AAUP.

In addition, the university is implementing a new budget which includes a salary and fringe benefit package for the university's 175 administrative-professional employees. Individual salaries are being determined,

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but the package includes up to five percent in pay increases and the university's contribution to the retirement program will be increased from 10 to 12 percent for each participating employee. The employee must contribute a minimum of three percent. Total cost of the seven percent package is \$340,026.

The AAUP contract covers 330 faculty. The terms include a 3.22 percent salary adjustment and the university's contribution to the retirement program is increased from 10 to 13 percent for each participating employee. The settlement includes improvement in the faculty travel and research funds. Total cost of the 6.52 percent contract agreement is \$373,843.

The 235 clerical-technical employees receive a 5.1 percent pay increase and a 2.5 percent step increase. Fringe benefits including changes in retirement fund payments and hospitalization insurance bring the settlement to 8.55 percent. The cost to the university is \$185,658.

DR. DURELLI NAMED TO DODGE PROFESSORSHIP

An internationally known expert in the field of materials and stress analysis has been appointed to the John F. Dodge Professorship in Engineering at Oakland University.

He is August J. Durelli, former professor in the civil engineering and mechanics department and head of the stress analysis laboratories at Catholic University of America.

The appointment was approved by the OU Board of Trustees on Wednesday, September 24, and it is effective immediately, Paul R. Paslay, dean of the School of Engineering, said.

Durelli received a degree in civil engineering in his native Buenos Aires, then he received doctoral degrees in engineering and in social sciences from the University of Paris (Sorbonne) and the Catholic University of Paris, respectively.

He has been a Guggenheim Fellow and the recipient of two Fulbright awards. In 1965, he was chosen to deliver the important William M. Murray Lecture before the Society of Experimental Stress Analysis. Durelli is the author of more than 200 technical papers for engineering journals and the author of four technical books.

Durelli is a member of the American Society of Mechanical Engineers, Society for Experimental Stress Analysis, the Society of Sigma Xi, and a Fellow of the American Society of Mechanical Engineers.
