## **Pioneer Profile**

#### Suzanne Frankie

Suzanne Frankie, dean of Kresge Library from 1983 until 1998, is definitely an Oakland University Pioneer in every sense of the word. The day she arrived at Oakland in August of 1983, plans were being finalized for the

expansion of the library. The wings on each side of the building added another two-thirds to the area of the existing building. Imagine the confusion and need for organization during and after that kind of construction in a building that had to remain open and continue to be a source of information for the entire faculty and student body during the entire expansion period.

Once that giant task was completed, Suzanne and the library faculty and staff went to work on developing an automated system for the antiquated system that was then in place. The card catalog for a time was still maintained (remember author, title and subject 3x5 index cards?), stacks and stacks of books and bound journals took up most of the floor space, manual searching for information with printed indexes was the norm. "The library is now a different world than when I was active," she admits. "There are so many different kinds of information services now."

Suzanne also worked with the Friends of the Library on the yearly Glyndeborne Picnic to raise additional funds needed to keep the library and its resources current. The picnics were elaborate affairs held in the riding arena on campus and raised approximately \$15,000 yearly for library acquisitions. Sue was sensitive to the needs of the various departments, and library efforts to keep up with their requests for journals and other resources were greatly appreciated by the faculty.

Soon after the library building and automated system were completed, Sue was appointed as the head of the newly formed University Strategic Planning Committee. Committee members were charged with developing a university mission statement, goals and objectives and a working plan for the future development of all university programs and services. They were assisted by a variety of committees and working groups involving several hundred university faculty and staff members. It was a monumental organizational task and Sue considers the successful completion of that major assignment one of her proudest achievements at Oakland.

An active person and concerned citizen, Suzanne added to her work load by volunteering as a reader for Recording for the Blind, and after retirement volunteered in the Pontiac soup kitchen and became very active in the AAUW Birmingham Branch. In AAUW Sue headed the book sale for the AAUW Birmingham Branch and helped raise \$15,000-20,000 yearly for scholarships. One of her favorite charity activities was the AAUW Explorathon, a program designed to interest high school girls in the study of science and math by arranging for female speakers in those fields to speak at Cranbook and Seaholm and other schools. The format provided for 50 professional women to each provide three 45-minute workshops for 500-800 girls in grades 8 through 12.

Many of these activities had to come to a halt in 2005 when her husband, Richard, had a stroke and she became his 24/7 caregiver. They moved to Toledo in October of 2015 to be near some nieces and nephews. She continues to care for Richard at home and they travel some in a handicap-equipped van. "Mostly, though, we volunteer and entertain at home." she admits.

With limited time, Suzanne still finds the energy to continue her community service. She has recently donated a room dedicated to her father to the Toledo Ability Center, a non-profit organization. The center provides aids for handicapped people, including the training of assistance dogs to help with daily living activities. She continues to

participate in fund-raising activities for this, her former high school, and other community organizations from her home.

Asked about her time at Oakland, Suzanne replied, "I treasure my years at Oakland. It was a wonderful job. I loved the people there and I am so proud of the University and the way it has grown." And the University reciprocates by treasuring the work of Pioneer Suzanne Frankie. Just inside the entrance to the library she helped establish is a brand new coffee shop with her name printed large above the door. It stands as a permanent reminder that no matter how large the University grows, those who pioneered its beginnings will always be remembered and honored.

Gerry Palmer Coon served as administrative assistant and adjunct faculty member in the School of Education and Human Services from 1971 to 1991. She retired after eleven years as co-editor of Rochester OPC's (Older Persons' Commission) guarterly publication, Vintage Views, and is a member of the Pioneer Club.
