Dear Dr. Piskulich:

As past Chair of the Academic Conduct Committee, I enclosed the 2015-2016 report of the Committee's activities which I received today. There were 111 cases involving 145 students submitted this past academic year compared to 91 cases involving 117 students for the 2014-2015 school year.

Of the 111 cases submitted for 2015-2016, 14 student cases were withdrawn after fact finding, 117 students were found responsible, 21 students were found not responsible, and no cases remain pending. There were two appeals from the Committee sanction recommendations for this period. We continue to see an increase in the number of students who admit responsibility and are processed through administrative hearings rather than deny responsibility and choose full Conduct Committee hearings. In connection with the sanctions mentioned in the report, you will note that 28 students were referred the Writing Center's Cite Right Program which is designed as a remedial effort for those charged with plagiarism.

Of the 111 cases, 117 students were found responsible and 21 were found not responsible. After fact-findings, cases were withdrawn for 14 students. There were 80 Academic Administrative Hearings and 24 full Academic Conduct Committee Hearings.

There were 2 appeals for this reporting period. Appeal considerations are based on two criteria: significant procedural error or new evidence not available at the time of the hearing.
