OU's popular *History Comes Alive* lecture series, now in its 15th year, kicked off in September with a special presentation on "How Meadow Brook Farms Became Oakland University" by Dominique Daniel, an associate professor with OU's Kresge Library. She also serves as humanities librarian for history and modern languages, as well as coordinator of the library's archives and special collections. ENCOUNTERING THE RARE BOOK

Earlier this fall, OU Art Gallery and Kresge Library's Special Collections collaborated to create a unique exhibit, *Encountering The Rare Book*, which showcased a selection of the University's 3,000 unusual and obscure books.

Curated by Andrea Eis, professor of cinema studies, the exhibition centered around the participation of university faculty who chose books from the Special Collections that spoke to them uniquely – ones that generated an unexpected realization, or delighted with an unconventional narrative, or fascinated with a lush materiality.

Among the works chosen for the exhibit: a first edition of Dickens' *A Christmas Carol* with hand-colored illustrations; intelligent, sometimes raucous women's writings from the 1600s and 1700s; a mammoth book from 1605 and a tiny one from 1607. A lecture series accompanied the exhibit with talks by Rebecca Baumann, Emily Spunaugle, and Andrea Eis. To read an article about the exhibit that appeared in *The Oakland Press*, <u>click here</u>.

Amanda Nichols Hess

American Libraries, the magazine of the American Library Association, recently selected the work of OU School of Education and Human Services alumna and Kresge Library associate professor Amanda Nichols Hess, Ph.D., as one of eight dissertations nationally to hold the greatest potential to advance library best practices.

In "From Information Experts to Expert Educators? Academic Librarians' Experiences with Perspective Transformation and Their Teaching Identities," Dr. Nichols Hess explores the ways in which academic librarians see teaching as a part of their professional identity and create opportunities for professional growth – not only for themselves but also for fellow librarians.

In her day-to-day job at Kresge Library, Dr. Nichols Hess is the liaison to the School of Education and Human Services, supporting students and faculty with instructional resources, research support, and much more.

In his 38 years at Kresge Library, Professor Gaylor served in a variety of roles. He has been instrumental in fundraising activities through the Friends of the Kresge Library organization. He is well-known on campus for the Gaylor Collection, housed in Kresge's Special Collections, which covers a wide range of fiction and non-fiction works of historical significance to the LGBTQIA community.

Professor Gaylor remains active with OU. He is a board member of the newly-formed Kresge Library Advisory Board and co-chair of the Pioneer Club Planning Committee. He is also extremely active with many charitable organizations in the Metro Detroit area.
