Search Continues for Missouri Boys

HANNIBAL, Mo. (AP) — Rescuers worked in the glare of floodlights early today, digging into a cave-riddled bluff in search of three boys missing since Wednesday afternoon and feared trapped by slides or a labyrinth of passages under Mark Twain's Hannibal, Mo.

The disappearance and search for the youths brought to mind Huck Finn and Tom Sawyer, whose adventures in the caves and on the Mississippi River at the foot of Hannibal's main street, were chronicled by Twain.

The missing boys, Edwin Lowell, 14, and Joel Joey Hoag, 13, and Bill Hoag, 11, brothers, were sought by Civil Defense workers, cave rescue teams from

Missouri, Illinois and Washington, D.C. and Missouri National Guardsmen.

The rescuers decided to dig into a bluff to get behind a fresh slide or cave-in in one of the passageways that has kept them from reaching some areas of the cave.

Officials said two police dogs used in the search went to the slide area twice and began scratching the mound of dirt and rock.

The Hoag brothers and the Dowell boy were last seen about 4:30 p.m. Wednesday, carrying a shovel and a flashlight, as they entered a cave recently uncovered by construction workers carving out a bed for a new highway.

NO TRACE FOUND

Individuals and teams of experienced cave explorers spent all Wednesday night and Thursday squirming through narrow passages underlying the area, but found no trace of the boys.

Police dogs were brought in but were unable to work in the narrow confines.

Bob Harrison, commander of the Mark Twain Emergency Squad, said there was a slide in a cave passage about 20 feet to the right of the entrance that blocked rescue teams from entering a section of the cave running along the face of the bluff.

Mayor Harry Musgrave asked for a National Guard company to begin a search at dawn in an area east of the cave.

Reserve Call-Up Near, Dem Says

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Henry M. Jackson said today National Guardsmen and Reservists will have to be ordered to active military duty to meet manpower needs in Vietnam — and the decision will have to come soon.

"I think they're going to have to call up some of the Reserve," the Washington Democrat said in an interview. "I just don't see any way out of it."

"It's a decision that can't be postponed for too long," added Jackson, a Senate champion of President Johnson's Vietnam policies.

Jackson said he does not know whether the Johnson administration is now contemplating that step.

"I don't see any other way to get the men that are needed," he said. Jackson serves on the Senate Armed Services Committee and on occasion has been an administration spokesman on war policy.

Three other senators agreed more men undoubtedly are going to be sent to Vietnam soon.

There are 442,000 troops in the war zone now, with a boost to at least 470,000 due by the end of the year.

Possibility of Frost Is Seen for Tonight

Reds Shell 2 Airfields

SAIGON (AP) — Communist rockets and mortars raked two airfields near Saigon today, killing six Americans, wounding 100 and destroying or damaging 25 planes.

Far to the north, two U.S. Marine positions just below the demilitarized zone, came under enemy barrages. These were at Gio Linh and Con Thien, where Leathernecks and Army artillerymen join to counter enemy threats from across the demilitarized zone.

AP correspondent Peter Arnett reported from the scene that Gio Linh was hit by from 10 to 15 rounds of mortar or artillery fire hourly all through the afternoon.

One explosion set off a fire among a stack of white phosphorus shells. The blaze was brought under control after one hour.

The number of casualties at Con

Thien, seven miles west of Gio Linh, was undetermined. Helicopters made 24 medical evacuation flights from that outpost.

A dispatch from the Marine headquarters at Da Nang said one enemy shell hit a Marine helicopter flying between Gio Linh and Dong Ha, eight miles to the south, and four Marines were injured.

The guerrillas used the biggest weap-

on in their arsenal, their Soviet 140mm rockets, against the big air base at Bien Hoa, 16 miles northeast of Saigon.

U.S. officers speculated that the attacks on the airfields were in reply to the U.S. raids on MIG airfields near Hanoi which began last month.

The two fields hit were Bien Hoa, the largest tactical fighter base in South Vietnam, and an Army airstrip at Phuoc Vinh, 34 miles north of Saigon.

Area Legislator Blasts Board's Delay on DST

The Michigan State Board of Canvassers "overstepped its authority" in delaying action on petitions calling for Daylight Saving Time, Rep. William P. Hampton, the House Republican floor leader, said yesterday.

In a resolution introduced in the House, the legislator from Bloomfield Hills, urged the board to "reconcile as soon as possible" and to act on the petitions, that, if certified, would place the time question on the fall 1968, general election ballot.

The board decided Wednesday to delay a decision until May 24.

Members said they wanted to hear arguments on both sides of the issue. They also said they preferred to wait until a new board member, Nathan Conyers of Detroit, was sworn in.

"This is a matter that needs clarifying immediately," said Hampton. "The board has overstepped its authority in postponing this decision."

"CLEAR MANDATE" Hampton's resolution said the board ignored the advice of Atty. Gen. Frank Kelley and refused to follow the clear mandate of the election code relative to its administrative duties.

Kelley has said the board should pass upon the petitions as speedily as possible despite any litigation pending in the courts.

Savings time opponents have filed suits in the State Court of Appeals and the State Supreme Court in an effort to prevent a public vote on the time issue.

Search for Brothers Pressed

Agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) and police departments nationwide are pressing their search for a pair of bandit brothers from Pontiac who escaped together from Southern Michigan Prison at Jackson. In 1965 where they were serving sentences of 10 to 60 years for armed robbery.

Charles and Gordon Ervin, who reportedly threatened the judge and prosecutor responsible for their incarceration in 1964, were recently added to the FBI's list of 10 Most Wanted Fugitives.

At that trial they made their first bid for freedom by fleeing from a court detention room and engaging police in a gun duel from the roof of an adjacent building.

They were recaptured within minutes, with Gordon wounded in the shoulder by a bullet from a pursuing officer

House OKs Long Holidays

LANSING (AP) — The House yesterday passed bills to guarantee that more three-day weekends show up on the calendar and to try to guarantee that more traffic offenders show up in court. Other measures approved and sent to the Senate would provide penalties for misuse of credit cards, provide single-member districts for Detroit Board of Education members and establish a new probate judge to review Ionia State Hospital inmates.

Passed 72-27 was a bill providing that seven of the state's eight nonreligious holidays would always fall on Mondays.

Rep. Roy Spencer, R-Attica, sponsor of the measure, said the resulting three-day weekends would boost the tourist industry and eliminate the school and job absenteeism that usually occurs on the day between a holiday and a weekend.

Opponents said more three-day weekends would mean more traffic accidents.

The traffic violator bill, patterned after a system used in Illinois, is aimed at the more than 200,000 drivers a year who ignore traffic tickets and fail to appear in court or otherwise settle their cases.

It would provide that the arresting officer in a moving-violation case keep the offender's license, replacing it with a temporary permit expiring on the man's court date.

Senate Stiffens School Eligibility for State Loans

LANSING (AP) — The Senate yesterday passed and sent to the governor for signing a bill setting stiffer eligibility provisions for school districts seeking loans from the state school bond loan fund.

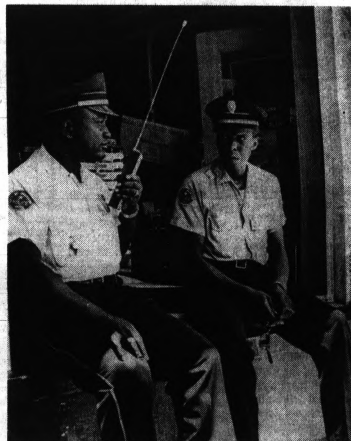
The measure, which has passed the House, carries immediate effect.

At one time, only school districts with a 13-million tax levy could borrow from the fund. This later was changed to make districts with as low as a 7-million levy eligible for loans.

Such state loans to school districts have been on the increase lately while the treasury surplus has been dwindling. State Treasurer Allison Green recently was given authority to borrow \$23 million on the state credit to pump more money into the fund.

The amended bill still allows 7-million districts to seek such loans.

The assessed valuation of the district, however, also would be taken into account by the State Municipal Finance Commission in passing on loans.

Police Blast Kills Negro Man in Mississippi College Riot

JACKSON, Miss. (UPI) — A Negro civil rights worker died today of a shotgun blast fired when rioters stormed police barricades on the violence-racked campus of Jackson State College.

National Guardsmen with bayonets fixed, moving behind armored trucks, cleared the streets of screaming, rock-throwing Negroes last night after police beat-back wild charges with riot gun blasts.

At dawn today, the troops, police and highway patrolmen were pulled out, the barricades dismantled and traffic al-

lowed to flow freely down four-lane Lynch Street, the scene of the bloody uprising, which began Wednesday night and erupted anew yesterday.

The campus, where 2,000 Negroes attend school, appeared nearly normal. A few unarmed guardsmen lounged on the grass outside their headquarters in the auditorium.

But Negro leader Charles Evers got up from a sickbed to rush to the campus, bemoaning the death of Benjamin Brown, 22.

Brown, a truck driver and frequent participant in civil rights demonstrations, and Jackson State sophomore Cleothus Jackson were shot in last night's melee.

Brown, mortally wounded in the legs, hips and back, died early today.

The shooting began when a band of about 75 Negroes, laughing, screaming, and hurling bottles, bricks and anything else they could find, charged the wooden barricades on Lynch Street.

Police fell back, but the rioters continued their charge, and a plainclothes investigator whipped up a riot gun and fired over their heads.

The Negroes fell back, giving city police time to form three lines of officers across the street. Then the frenzied Negroes charged again.

Officers hoisted their riot guns and fired a volley over the attackers' heads, and the Negroes retreated again.

Occasional shotgun bursts continued for several hours during the melee, but police said that it was during the second charge on Lynch Street that Brown was killed.

Well Pumps Life Into Wolverine Lake

WOLVERINE LAKE — Officials here think they may have found the solution to what has been ailing several area lakes in recent years.

Only a few short months ago, this 300-acre lake southwest of Pontiac, was dying from a lack of water.

Today the water is up to its established level and is quite healthy by lake standards.

The answer to the problem has been one 12-inch well which has been pumping, 1,300 gallons of water per minute into the lake.

PAID OFF

Since February the well has increased the lake level by 28 inches and is now resting from its labors until it is needed again.

"It was a gamble, but it paid off," said Mrs. Clara Miller, councilwoman and one of those responsible for having the well installed. "It's been 12 years

since the lake was at this level."

The summer period will be the real test, according to Mrs. Miller. It's when the weather gets warmer that evaporation begins to take place.

"It used to be that you could almost watch the level go down," she said, "and the weeds grew almost overnight."

If the water goes down even four inches, the pump will have to be turned on again. Mrs. Miller said.

STILL STUMPS

"There are still stumps in the

lake and we don't want the water to go down to the point where boats might be damaged or water skiers hurt," she said.

The well has proved to be much more successful than anyone concerned with it dared to hope.

It took only two months of continuous operation of the well to raise the lake level, rather than the three to four months that had been anticipated.

"I have an idea some communities may be watching us, particularly through the summer months, to see if we are successful," said Mrs. Miller.

"Then, too, the underground water is different in different areas, and that's an important factor. The State Conservation Department said the underground water around here is very good."

Officials are pleased, too, with the cost of the project — \$15,000 for everything, a test well and engineering costs included, for eight months of constant well operation.

This comes out to about \$13.50 per day or \$400 a month. The cost had been figured at about \$500 a month.

ASSESSMENT

Property owners are paying

for the operation through a special assessment — 30 cents a running foot for lake frontage property and \$5.50 per \$1,000 of assessed valuation for land off the lake.

With the lake now up to where it should be, the summer months should be more enjoyable for residents who can once again launch their boats, water ski or swim in greater safety and comfort than they have for a long time.

And, according to Mrs. Miller, it will do more for selling property in the area than anything else.

Troy School Board Will Seek a 7-Mill Hike, Rather Than 8

TROY — The school board decided last night to ask voters for an additional seven mills rather than eight at the June 12 election.

The decision came after long hours of debate and hearings in which the board was opposed by a citizens' committee, which the board had formed to assist them on a proposed budget.

The levy, which would be for just one year, is intended to pay off a \$278,000 deficit for this year and an expected similar minus mark in the coming school year.

The administration pointed out the deficit came about as a result of increased teacher salaries which had to be paid retroactively after the Troy Education Association gained a contract last November.

In the contract are included teacher increases and increments for the coming school year and more salary negotiations must take place with additional raises to be expected.

EXPLOSIVE MEETINGS

The citizens' advisory committee opposed the entire added millage levy after it made a study of school finances. Its report was issued April 28 and touched off a series of explosive hearings with meetings almost every day.

However, in a declaration delivered last night by Peter Taucher, committee chairman, the group modified its position.

The declaration, signed by 12 committee members, one abstaining, said, "The committee acknowledges the need for additional millage."

The committee statement did not specifically support the board's seven-mill proposal.

EARLIER REPORT

In its earlier report the committee pointed out the district's total expenditures rose from about \$2.3 million in 1965-66 to \$3.2 million in 1966-67.

This 40 per cent increase in expenditures was accompanied by a 5.8 per cent rise in student population.

The committee challenged the necessity for this and the board responded with increased cost figures.

The 1967-68 total is expected to include a 10 per cent raise in general expenses, plus the cost of staffing three new schools, plus paying off deficits.

ENORMOUS RATE

Troy's property evaluation is rising at an enormous rate, up \$18 million last year, and this growth is expected to bring required revenue in line in later years, the administration has countered.

However, about two years lapses before new buildings are constructed and taxes are paid on them, which places the district in the position of having additional students to train without apparent revenue, officials explained.

Supervisor Dr. Rex Smith said today the seven mills sought in the election will not cover complete costs, but that it will enable the district to pay off its deficit over a two-year period.

Trustee Richard Snodad will head the district's election drive.

The seven-mill levy would cost voters \$7 per thousand valuation, or about \$50 to the average home owner, according to school officials.

Ford Recalls Bumper Jacks

Also Asks Return of 16,000 in Truck Line

DEARBORN (UPI) — Ford Motor Co. yesterday entered a new stage in the auto safety campaign. It called back 28,000 bumper jacks.

Ford said the jacks, provided with Ford and Mercury Comet cars produced by the company's Los Angeles assembly plant, might have defective ratchet assemblies.

It was the first mass call-back of an "accessory" since the auto companies began reporting their recall campaigns to the new National Traffic Safety Bureau in Washington.

Ford also announced it was calling back 16,000 Econoline trucks because of possibly defective attaching nuts in suspension components and front brake plates.

It asked the truck owners to return the vehicles to their dealerships for replacements. It said the owners of the bumper jacks were asked to do the same thing. They will all be given new ones.

ROUTINE TEST

Ford said a "routine test" made on the jacks, which were supplied by another company to the Los Angeles plant, revealed that the devices might fail after they were used a few times.

any age. They have been exceptionally skillful in preparing 15 of these children for later adoption by other families."

Police Crackdown at McConnell Vowed

Parents from McConnell Elementary School, "satisfied" with Pontiac police commitments to curb youthful vandalism, last night signaled their intentions of seeking action on the problem from the City Commission and Oakland County Juvenile Court.

Expressions of concern over recent break-ins and malicious destruction at the school at 245 S. Paddock came at the monthly meeting of the Parent-Teacher Association.

Acting Pontiac Police Chief Harry Nye and three other officers spoke to the group at the request of Fred Carter, community school director.

Carter had indicated McConnell parents were satisfied with promises made Tuesday by Nye that police would patrol the school area and crack down on youthful curfew violators.

Suggestions that further steps be taken seemed to receive strong support from an estimated 150 persons at the meeting.

DETENTION OF YOUTHS

Parents proposed to "get some answers" from officials of Juvenile Court regarding detention of youths, particularly repeat offenders, who are arrested by police.

In addition, it was urged that the City Commission be asked to revise for a stricter curfew ordinance. The present statute requires youths up to 11 years old to be off the streets by 10 p.m., and those from 12 to 17 to be inside by midnight.

Area Slaying Suspect Asks Sanity Test

A Farmington Township man accused of killing his estranged wife while she was working in a beauty shop has requested psychiatric testing to determine his sanity and competency to stand trial.

A hearing on the request from John Merlo, 25, is scheduled for Monday before Circuit Judge Robert L. Templin.

Merlo is charged with first-degree murder in the Jan. 6 shooting of his wife, Sharon, 18, as she was working on a customer's hair in the Crest Beauty Salon, 2742 Eight Mile Road.

He was arrested two weeks later in Philadelphia when he attempted to close out a bank account with a stolen bank book. If Templin grants Merlo's request, he will be interviewed by three psychiatrists at a state hospital selected by the state. Merlo is scheduled to stand trial on the murder charge May 31.
