DELAY TUITION INCREASE CONSIDERATION

The Board of Trustees will delay consideration of a tuition increase until the extent of a new cut in

the 1975-76 state appropriation is known.

Gov. William Milliken has indicated that he will recommend further reductions in the budgets of almost all state agencies and colleges and universities, President Donald D. O'Dowd told the board at its October 22 meeting.

He asked that a proposed tuition schedule before the board be held until the amount of the latest cut is determined in Lansing. At that time, the university will call a special meeting of the board to consider a revised budget and adopt a tuition level neces-

sary to support OU programs, O'Dowd said.

The proposal before the board on October 22 would have raised tuition \$1.50 and \$2 per credit hour for resident undergraduates and graduates. Out-of-state tuition would have been raised \$4 a credit hour. The university will attempt to cut its budget wherever possible, but an even higher tuition increase may be necessary, O'Dowd warned.
