#### FUNDING RECOMMENDATION NO GROWTH IN

Governor William Milliken has recommended a 1976-77 state appropriation for OU that contains no real dollar growth or allowances for inflation.

Milliken is recommending an appropriation of \$13,493,100.

OU had asked for \$15,943,500.

OU received an identical \$13,493,100 appropriation for 1975-76, but on December 9, 1975, the state reduced that sum by \$250,000 in an effort to balance the state budget.

The net effect of the governor's current recommendation, if approved by the legislature, will be to move OU's 1976-77 funding up to the level originally approved for the current fiscal year.

#### UTILITY COSTS SOAR AT 00 DESPITE USAGE DROP

Although energy consumption has dropped steadily at Oakland University over the past five years through diligent conservation efforts, costs for both electrical and gas power have escalated more than \$100,000 each according to Michael Crupko, coordinator of architectural services at the university. The most dramatic rise in costs has been over the past twelve-

month period.

In 1971 an energy-conscious Division of Campus Development studied the trend toward climbing energy consumption and implemented guidelines to reverse the trend. In 1972 energy use leveled off, and in 1973 the level of use began to decline. The university used significantly less gas and electrical power in 1975 than it did in 1971, despite the addition of a new extension to the Oakland Center and the opening of a new Public Safety and Services Building last fall.

Inflationary costs of energy, however, have escalated the cost of utilities sharply. Costs of gas power have risen from \$180,750 in 1971 to \$290,750 in 1975; electrical costs have risen \$130,000 since 1971, from \$230,000 to \$360,000

in 1975.

#### UNIVERSITY ORCHESTRA IN FRIDAY CONCERT

Beethoven and Verdi arias and two-tone poems, Mussorgski's "Nights on Bald Mountain" and Smetana's "The Moldau," will be performed this Friday, February 20, in a free public concert at Oakland University.

### OU LIBRARY TO LINK WITH OHIO COLLEGE

In early 1976 the Technical Services Division of the OU Library will link with the Ohio College Library Center (OCLC), an on-line shared cataloging data base in Columbus, Ohio which includes both Library of Congress and OCLC member-libraries' bibliographic records. This linkage is being accomplished through Oakland University library's membership in the Michigan Library Consortium, which includes among its member libraries all four-year state-supported institutions in Michigan.

This new source for bibliographic information and catalog cards will increase the productivity of the division, decrease the rate costs, and provide fast access to more bibliographic information than is now available in conventional sources. As of August 15, 1975, the data base contained 1,555,000 biblio-

graphic records.

#### JEWELL WIBBY ATHLETIC FUND FOUNDED

A women's athletic scholarship fund has been established in tribute to Jewell Wibby, an OU graduate who died January 13. Wibby, the mother of two OU graduates, Craig and Sue Wibby, was from 1963 to 1975 a member of the Friends of the Kresge Library and the Friends of Oakland, two groups dedicated to fund raising in behalf of the library and student scholarships. The fund will help provide scholarships for undergraduate Oakland women who are participating in intercollegiate athletics.
