ORCHESTRA WILL PERFORM; VARANI IS FEATURED

OU pianist Flavio Varani will be the featured soloist with the University Orchestra Friday, Oct. 26, at 8:00 p.m. in Varner Recital Hall. The concert is free and sponsored by the OU Department of Music.

Varani will perform Grieg's Piano Concerto and the University Orchestra, conducted by Dr. David Daniels, will devote the rest of its program to two different national styles: the French and German. These styles require totally differing approaches by the performers. An orchestral dance by Debussy will be contrasted with a waltz by Josef Strauss. The first movement of the Beethoven "Pastoral Symphony" will in turn be compared to a pastorella by modern French composer Arthur Honegger.

CALENDAR, COMMITTEE SPECIFICATIONS APPROVED

The university's 1974-75 academic calendar was approved by the University Senate Oct. 15. In other business, the Senate passed motions bringing changes in standing committee charges and membership specifications.

The calendar includes 70 teaching days in both the fall and winter semesters. Classes will begin Sept. 3, 1974 and end Dec. 11, 1975, with final examinations slated for Dec. 12, 13, 16, 17, and 18. The winter term begins Jan. 6 and ends April 15 with examinations scheduled for April 16, 17, 18, 21, and 22. Spring session classes will be held from April 28 through June 19 with examinations June 20-21. The summer term begins June 24 and ends Aug. 13 with finals set for Aug. 14-15.

The Admissions Committee was the only standing committee to have its charge altered. The new portions of the charge are underlined and the deleted word is in parenthesis. Charge - To consider, (and) recommend, and evaluate recruiting policies and standards and requirements for admission to undergraduate programs of the university and to evaluate such individual applications for admission as may be referred to it by the director of admissions.

Two additional faculty members and one student were added to the Academic Policy Committee. One Administrative-Professional position was eliminated from the Spring and Summer Sessions Committee bringing AP representation to two persons, and a motion was passed assuring that at least one graduate student should be included in the three-student membership of that committee.

In another action, the Senate established a 3.60 average cutoff point for cum laude honors among August graduates. Persons nominated to the various standing committees were approved.

Remaining fall Senate meetings are Tuesday, Nov. 13, and Thursday, Dec. 6. Both sessions are at 3:15 p.m. in rooms 128-130. Oakland Center.
