

Shock of Red Move Passes...for How Long?

If the world could buy a guarantee that no person in Berlin, sane or insane, would do anything foolish in the next 24 hours, it would be a bargain at the rate of a million dollars an hour.

The first shock of searing off East Berlin has passed.

The governments of both East and West Berlin have acted prudently in keeping the rival

crowds back from the barriers, far enough away from each other so that most of the provocative taunts and insults cannot be heard.

The East Berlin government did it by issuing this order at the barriers: "No loitering."

A resident of Communist Berlin knows an order when he hears one and acts accordingly. The West Berlin police did not say anything.

They merely turned a cordon and pushed the West Berlin crowd back a quarter of a mile from the danger spot at the Brandenburg Gate.

The flint has been separated from the steel and the chances appear less now that a spark will be struck that will start a fire that will consume us all. But danger still remains. The rival crowds are out of voice range, but not out of rifle range.

The possibility of an accident or an incident is still frightening.

It could happen on either side of the barriers. Many of the troops the German Communists have called up in this crisis are called "factory fighters."

They are not well trained soldiers and they are not well disciplined.

They simply were told to put down their wrenches and hammers in the factory, pick up a

rifle and march to the barricades.

A gun in the hand usually gives a man an intoxicating sense of power, and every trigger happy "factory fighter" is a threat to world peace.

On the Western side of the barrier it could be somebody like the 19-year-old youth who peered across the barbed wire and barricades into East Berlin Monday night and said bitterly to reporters:

"My mother lives less than a mile away over there and now I suppose I won't ever see her again."

Time is the precious ingredient in this crisis. Every minute that ticks away without an incident in Berlin is a peace dividend for the world.

Obviously, there are only two ways the Berlin crisis can be settled — by negotiation or by war.

Diplomats never move with the speed of soldiers.

It is the West's move in this grim checker game at the Brandenburg Gate, but the West needs time to look over the board and be sure that it is not going to make a move that will win one man but lose three.

The handicap the West faces is that no one man can decide what to do as Nikita Khrushchev does for the other side.

President Kennedy must be sure he is in agreement with London, Paris and Bonn.

Each word, comma and period in the forthcoming Western notes of protest about Berlin must be scanned to be sure it conveys exactly the right shade of meaning.

Until then about all we can do is hope that every "factory fighter" and the boy who misses his mother will keep their heads

20-Year Road Needs to Cost \$681.2 Million in City, County

It will cost an estimated \$681.2 million to meet highway needs in Oakland County during the next 20 years, the State Highway Department said today.

Oakland ranked second only to Wayne County in a study of highway needs \$680,180.

The total highway needs throughout Michigan will require spending some \$11 billion, nearly \$1 billion more than current revenue sources will provide, Highway Commissioner John Markie said.

The figure includes estimated construction, maintenance and engineering costs on state highways, county roads and city streets.

Of Oakland's total, more than \$200 million should be spent on county roads, the Oakland County Road Commission said. That would mean spending \$6 million more per year than it does now.

Pontiac's estimated need for city streets over the same period is \$36,227,000.

This would require an average expense of nearly \$1 million annually, Pontiac now spends about one third of that annually on major and local streets, according to City Engineer James N. Carls.

The city's needs were announced a year ago.

Subtracting city and county needs from the \$681.2 million estimate leaves \$455 million in state highway needs in Oakland County.

Results of the comprehensive three-year study, which cost more than \$300,000 to complete, were presented to a joint legislative highway study committee by the State Highway Department.

It showed that nine of every 10 miles of Michigan's 116,000 miles of highways or streets will need some work during the next 20 years.

State Highway Commissioner John C. Mackie said that the question of how to raise the additional money to cover the program would be covered by another study now in progress and expected to be ready by November.

PAY FOR ITSELF

Possibilities would include higher gas taxes and an expanded bonding program, according to highway experts.

The proposed 20-year program, Mackie said, would pay for itself in terms of lives saved and a lower accident rate. He added:

"Our population is steadily increasing, travel on our roads and streets is increasing even faster, and the state's economy has become increasingly more dependent upon highway transportation."

By 1980, Michigan's population is expected to climb 50 per cent

while travel will almost double, Mackie said.

"No rapidly has motor vehicle traffic increased that even the substantial highway improvements made in the past few years have not entirely caught up with the tremendous backlog of deficiencies, although the gap is closing now," he contended.

The engineering study was described as the most comprehensive analysis of motor vehicular traffic, population and economic

conditions ever developed in the state for highway planning.

It evolved from an evaluation of the ability of every mile of state highway, county road and city street to carry the traffic load of the next 20 years.

The report said that highway construction required to meet the 20-year needs would provide 32,000 new jobs annually for the next 10 years of the program and another 8,000 each year for the next 10-year period.

Police Looking for Clue to Rapist, Abductor of 2

HOUSTON, Tex. (UPI)—Police hoped today to get a better lead on the rapist who Mrs. Clara Bell Roderick says held her and her young son captive on a 19-day terror ride through four Western States.

Police could only get a preliminary statement Monday from the 25-year-old blonde San Mateo, Calif., housewife before she was put under sedation in a hospital after she stumbled hysterically into a motel. She hoped to question her more today.

Her harrowing story started with an innocent advertisement to sell a German shepherd puppy, Mrs. Roderick said. A lean,

lanky man knocked at her door the morning of July 27, inquired about the dog and asked if Mrs. Roderick's husband were at home.

"No, not right now," she replied. "Would you care to see the dog?"

The man entered, smiled at Mrs. Roderick's 4-year-old son Bobby and patted the dog on the head. Then, the housewife told authorities, the man grabbed her and the boy and forced them into her car, which he soon abandoned at a parking lot. The abductor then stole another car, a green Chevrolet sedan with green seat covers.

Military Chiefs See East Sector as an Armed Camp

Bonn Planning Ways of 'Its Own' to Fight Late Commie Push

BERLIN — Communist police opened fire today on three East Germans fleeing to the West.

The Western Allied Commandants in West Berlin protested to the Soviet Berlin command against sealing off the East-West Border Germans.

The United States, British and French commandants said border closing, put into effect early Sunday, was a "flagrant violation of four-power agreements" governing the city.

A joint Allied announcement said West German commanders complained that East German military and semimilitary organizations, formed in violation of four-power agreements and whose very presence in Berlin is illegal, had "turned the Soviet sector into an armed camp."

The Bonn government said it will take its own countermeasures against the Communist East Sector for closing the border.

TO CALL MEETING

A government spokesman refused to specify the measures which he said would be taken apart from any actions mapped out by the United States, Britain and France.

But he said a special cabinet meeting discussed a possible trade embargo with East Germany.

With tempers flaring on both sides of the new Iron Curtain, Mayor Willy Brandt called West Berliners to a mass protest demonstration outside city hall Wednesday.

Goal for 1961 UF Set Same as 1960

A goal of \$872,500 has been set for the 1961 Pontiac Area United Fund campaign, Robert S. Nelson, president of the UF Board of Trustees, announced today.

The figure is identical with the goal set for last year's campaign.

The campaign figure was set by the Board of Trustees at a meeting yesterday at the Waldron Hotel.

In presenting the figure to the board for approval, Nelson pointed out that an increase in the number of people being served by UF-supported agencies makes the goal an absolute minimum for operation of the 54 health, recreational and family-care agencies in 1961.

Using costs and increasing demands for services of UF agencies have dictated an increased goal, Nelson said. "However, economic conditions in the community indicate that a goal at last year's level will have a reasonable chance of success."

TO ANNOUNCE DATES

Thomas F. Wiethorn, campaign chairman, said dates for this year's drive would be announced early next month.

Prior to setting of the campaign goal, basic budget figures had been presented by each agency to eight panels of business people, housewives and professional leaders in the community.

Panel recommendations were then forwarded to the UF Budget Steering Committee, composed of chairmen of the several panels. This committee also heard requests of Michigan United Fund agencies, (Continued on Page 2, Col. 2)

CITES INJUNCTION

Christian F. Powell, Pontiac attorney representing the company, claimed that employees were protected from violence and guaranteed safe entrance and exit to the plant by a Circuit Court injunction.

Won't Renege on Berlin Pledge

Bowles Says U.S. Will Meet Force With Force if Necessary

WASHINGTON (AP)—Undersecretary of State Chester Bowles said today the United States will keep its pledge to maintain the freedom of West Berlin.

"If necessary, we will meet force with force. But we will never close the door to honorable negotiation toward peace in Central Europe or anywhere else," the State Department's No. 2 official said in a speech prepared for a National Press Club luncheon.

Reporting on a 15-nation, 20-day tour in Europe, Africa, the Middle East, and South Asia, Bowles said that wherever he went he was asked about the East-West tension over Germany.

He said that he tried to explain to leaders of the nations he visited that "at no time since World War II has our nation been more directly and dangerously challenged than we are today in regard to our commitments to the people of West Berlin."

In the face of this challenge, Bowles declared, the United States has no alternative: "We must honor our commitments."

Congress' Hold on Loans OK'd

Rusk Not Opposed to Control on Long-Range Development Fund

WASHINGTON (AP) — Secretary of State Dean Rusk gave approval today to a foreign aid bill amendment which would retain congressional control over operations of the long range development loan fund.
With the Senate scheduled to vote later in the day on the proposal, offered by Sen. Bourke B. Hickenlooper, R-Iowa, Rusk made his views known in a letter to Chairman J. William Fulbright, D-Ark., of the Foreign Relations Committee.
Rusk said that the State Department has "no objection" to the Hickenlooper proposal, adding:
"It would have the positive advantage of spelling out that the Congress would retain control over the use of funds obtained under the (Treasury) borrowing authority."
Previously the Senate had approved the principle of financing development loans to fledgling nations by Treasury borrowing instead of the usual yearly appropriations.
In offering his amendment, Hickenlooper said he was not attempting to upset that decision but only to make sure that Congress review annually the proposed five-year program.

BERLIN (AP)—An East Berlin factory militiaman in full uniform, his steel helmet hanging from his belt, fled today from his job.
His family fled several days ago and he was awaiting his chance when the Communists shut the East-West Berlin border Sunday.
Police said he sneaked up to the border behind an advertising sign and then made a quick run for it.
When he reached the West Berlin side, he threw his cap in the air and shouted: "Thank God, now I'm free."

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U.S. Paying \$85,000 in Crash Settlement

Approves \$225,000 Bank Expansion

ROCHESTER — A \$225,000 expansion program planned by the National Bank of Detroit for its branch office here was given tentative approval by the village council last night.

The plans call for construction of a tunnel under the public alley between Walnut and Main Streets from the branch office to property facing Walnut and Fourth streets.

A modern bank drive-in facility would be built on the site with adequate space to be provided for two lanes of traffic by the tunnel in island. Parking space for 45 cars also is planned.

The tunnel would be six feet wide and about 80 feet long. It would be constructed of steel and concrete and be used by bank personnel to go from one facility to the other.

'AMBIT TO VILLAGE'

According to Jack Taylor, NBD vice president, the new drive-in bank "will give downtown Rochester a tremendous boost and be a definite asset to the village."

The council concurred but delayed final approval to allow placement of the plans with the village clerk for a one-week public inspection period.

The overall cost of the project, including the land on which the bank has options to buy, is about \$225,000, Taylor said.

TIME BOMB

Refuses to OK Appointment

Mayor of Southfield Vetoes Eastlick as Assessing Consultant

SOUTHFIELD—Mayor S. James Clarkson last night refused to sign a contract which would establish former city assessor Gerald Eastlick as an assessing consultant.

Clarkson fired Eastlick from his 8-year-old job in June and appointed Myron Greenfield, a realtor, to the post.

The council, however, refused to confirm the appointment and named Eastlick as a consultant.

The mayor then vetoed the appointment.

In a stinging indictment in which the mayor referred to the "abhorrent council," Clarkson said "The hiring of Eastlick as assessing consultant to carry out assessing duties is unlawful."

"Further, one cannot be so naive to the fact that the council in attempting to hire Eastlick is frustrating and circumventing the right of the mayor to appoint a new assessor."

"Good faith would seem to dictate that the council seek out someone of different identity to be the consultant."

The mayor went on to say that "Even more glaringly conspicuous is the absurdity of creating a position of consultant where there is no assessor he could consult or advise."

"No provision having been made in our charter for the establishment of a deputy assessor and none having been provided for by state law such a position can only be created by an existing assessor."

"Therefore I refuse to sanction said contract with my signature," Clarkson said.

Council then agreed that Eastlick's job as consultant would not be a permanent and that he would relinquish it as soon as the mayor appointed a qualified assessor.

Will Revamp Zoning Laws

Public Hearing Slated Sept. 18 at High School in Southfield

SOUTHFIELD—This city's outdated zoning ordinance is slated for revision by the planning commission and the city council.

"The ultimate service of the Farmington pipeline has not been determined," the deputy director explained.

A hearing on the assessment roll will be at 7:30 p.m. Aug. 25.

The contract for road gravel in the city was awarded to low bidder, the Teischack Co. of Farmington. The firm's bid was \$4,350.

SAN LEANDRO, Calif. (AP)—The City Council has done it again!

The council voted Monday night to cut the tax rate—the 14th consecutive year this Northern California city has chopped taxes.

The tax rate was \$1.98 per \$100 assessed valuation in 1949 when San Leandro, then a town of 26,442, started the trend.

The latest cut will be just two cents—from \$1.20 to \$1.18—but San Leandro now has 10,000 residents.

No Cause for Concern if Polaris Missile Used

You can stop right now any worrying you might have done as to the results if our Polaris missile is fired. The fact of the matter is, you'll probably be dead if the need ever arises.

A current story in *Look Magazine* points out that the Polaris is a weapon that will be combat fired only after most of the civilian population has been killed.

Firing this weapon is the job of our atomic submarines. It will only be used after an enemy has launched an all-out nuclear attack. If and when the Polaris is ever used, it will be aimed to wipe out, not military installations, but entire cities and people of the enemy.

This is our one big awesome threat for retaliation in the event that an enemy starts a nuclear war. Remember Hiroshima, well the Polaris has 25 times that much power.

An admiral explains it this way: "The minute we launch Polaris, we've lost the war and they have, too."

In case the Russians are thinking of itchy fingers they should be reminded that nuclear war play is not kid stuff.

According to Vice Adm. WILLIAM F. RABORN, who directed the creation of the Polaris system, two Polaris atomic submarines on station today have more destructive power than all the arms of all the countries from the time man started making weapons until the nuclear age.

Khrushchev Issues Penetrating Declaration

N. KHRUSHCHEV's current manifesto is probably the most far reaching and penetrating analysis of his nation's intent that has yet been issued at one time.

The *New York Times* devotes eight pages to a reproduction of the message and then comments upon it editorially.

The *Times* says in part:

"The importance of this document to the outside world lies not in its profusion of 'ple in the sky' promises to deflect attention from the continued shabbiness and the physical and spiritual hunger of Soviet life, nor in its fantastic picture of a future Utopia where everything shall be free except freedom.

"His overriding importance lies in Premier Khrushchev's renewed proclamation that the Soviets can reach their unalterable goal of complete communism, including the 'withering away' of the state, only when the whole world has become Communist, and that meanwhile they will use the Soviet state as a power apparatus to bring this about.

"In short, this is a new declaration of war against the free world—in its political, economic and propagandistic war. It expands in thousands of words what the Soviet chieftain compressed in four words: 'We shall bury you.'"

"Therefore, under the guise of 'peaceful coexistence,' it continues to stir up revolutions and Communist 'wars of liberation,' to exploit nationalism where it serves its purposes and to denounce it where it does not, to try to wreck all free world defense organizations, to lure the new and still inexperienced states into its net and above all to seek to disarm the free world while keeping its own arms intact.

"The world has been warned again."

The New York editorial points out that Soviet strategy "seeks to avoid a nuclear war that would destroy the Communist motherland, but short of such a war all means must be used to reach the goal."

The world feels intense regret

at the existence Russian slaves had under the czars, and while the Red's material existence has been appreciably improved, what will their ultimate lot be under these ruthless autocrats?

Reds Gambling Now on Status Quo

David Lawrence Thinks:

IN EUROPE—Sealing off, for all practical purposes, the Eastern Sector of Germany from West Berlin is a measure of desperation by Soviet Premier Khrushchev, but it really means that there now is less chance than before of a shooting war between the Soviet Union and the Western democracies.

For the new development marks the beginning of a protracted stalemate and, for the time being anyway, the question of Allied access routes to West Berlin is not likely to become acute.

When the Soviet government does sign a separate peace treaty with East Germany, a vague promise will be given to recognize Allied rights in West Berlin itself.

This is a Soviet device to maintain a kind of status quo, so as to enable Moscow to keep on arguing and negotiating on legal rights indefinitely.

Another party like the one over Laos or disarmament—extending over many months—would not be surprising now.

Khrushchev doesn't want war, but he does want to build up the faltering prestige of the Communists inside East Germany and in the other satellite countries.

BEHIND CURTAIN

To understand what's going on, one has to learn what is being discussed behind the Iron Curtain in some of the Communist-controlled countries other than the Soviet Union.

Diplomats accredited to governments in Western Europe from such countries as Czechoslovakia, Poland, Bulgaria and Rumania talk frankly to their colleagues—in private, of course—about what worries them.

From some of these men, who, though Communists in their ideology, talk honestly to their fellow diploma's—comes the following composite expression:

"The issue is not West Berlin itself. The existence of the Communist state in East Germany is at stake. We are all affected. The German Communists have been unable to consolidate their position in East Germany. Berlin remains the center of Western propaganda, political activity and espionage. The psychological effects of what's going on in this 'Western island' in the midst of a Communist state are growing in importance. Also, East Germany is beginning to suffer from a continuous loss of manpower."

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The same sources point out that neither Poland nor the Soviet Union wants to see Germany reunified. In both countries, there is a genuine fear of a strong Germany.

THEMATIC OF WAR

To some extent, this is an after-

math of World War II, but the Communists are also convinced that fundamentally the West has no sincere desire to see the two parts of Germany consolidated.

Also, it is argued that undue prominence, together with an increase in influence, has been given to East Germany's Communist leaders, who, incidentally, are closer to Khrushchev than are the Polish Marxists.

Because of possible predominance of a United Germany in an economic and political sense in Europe, these Communist diplomats believe that it would be better to keep Germany divided and that the surest way to accomplish this would be by a Western signature to a separate peace treaty.

All this really points, on the other hand, to the need of a firm stand in the West, so as to bring about the reunification of Germany. It's the West's trump card.

For the debate itself on this issue

Any trick specialist or "climber" who wants to make me look ridiculous need only tell his credulous customers how "happy" on calcium as a cure-all. In extension, I plead:

HIS STORY

1. I do not believe that a dose of many doses of calcium would be good treatment for anything other than painful colic.

2. Calcium is a natural or physiological electrolyte, antispasmodic, analgesic and tranquilizer.

3. Most Americans do not get enough calcium in their ultra-refined diet to maintain general functional efficiency.

4. In any case, even if it does no good, it can do no harm to correct calcium deficiency.

5. A high calcium diet or supplementing the ordinary diet with an adequate daily ration of Ca and D — say six calcium capsules every day — costs but a fraction of what people with calcium deficiency spend for sedatives, tranquilizers, analgesics and narcotics — alcohol is a narcotic.

DuPont to Ask Court
for GM Stock Plans

WILMINGTON, Del. (AP) — E. I. Du Pont de Nemours and Co. will seek federal court permission for flexibility in methods of disposing of its 53 million shares of General Motors stock, the firm announced Monday.

A Supreme Court antitrust decision ordered Du Pont to divest itself of all GM holdings within 10 years.

Legislation now before Congress would cut economic losses to the company's more than 300,000 stockholders.

In the absence of legislation, however, Du Pont President Crawford Greenwalt said the firm will file a proposed judgment with the U.S. District Court in Chicago by Sept. 5 permitting flexibility in methods of divesting so as to minimize the economic loss to Du Pont stockholders.

STUDYING METHODS

A combination of methods are under study, said Greenwalt: (1) offers to exchange General Motors shares for Du Pont common and preferred stock, which stock would then be retired; (2) distribution of GM shares in lieu of cash as a portion of Du Pont's common stock dividends; and (3) sales by Du Pont of GM shares.

The total effect of this, said Greenwalt, will be a substan-

tial increase in the market supply of GM stock over a 10-year period.

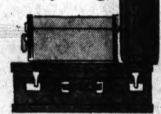
He said financial experts estimate this could depress the market value of GM stock by \$1 billion to \$2 billion.

In addition, he estimated, Du Pont's individual stockholders would have to pay income tax at rates ranging from 16 to 87 percent on the market value of GM stock received—taxes which could exceed \$1 billion—and this would cause heavy selling pressures, meaning Du Pont stock values also would drop.

Thus, to distribute the stock to shareholders under present law would be prohibitive both in tax and market consequences, Greenwalt said in a letter to stockholders.

NEW YORK (AP)—Idlewild Airport showered roses and champagne Monday on a young bride—its 50 millionth passenger.

Mrs. James B. Penson, 21, New York, who was Ruth Rothschild until her wedding Sunday, was leaving with her new husband for a honeymoon in Paris.

Idlewild, opened July 1, 1948, turned loose its figure experts to pick the 50 millionth. They decided the passenger would leave at 10 a.m. and a schedule check showed six simultaneous departures for that time.

Air France's flight won a drawing among the six and the line then decided to honor the first person listed on its reservation list—Mrs. Penson.

Founder of Home
for Refugees
Awarded \$10,000

MANILA (AP) — Gus Borgeest, founder of a haven for refugees from Communist China in Hong Kong, was named Monday as winner of the Ramon Magasaysay Award for Community Leadership.

The award carries a \$10,000 cash prize. It is one of five made annually in memory of the late Philippine president.

A British subject, Borgeest arrived in Hong Kong in 1951 from Shanghai almost penniless. Two years later he established "Sunshine Island," a rocky islet he leased from the Hong Kong government.

A steady stream of refugees flows to the island. They have planted fruit trees and cash crops, and raise pigs.

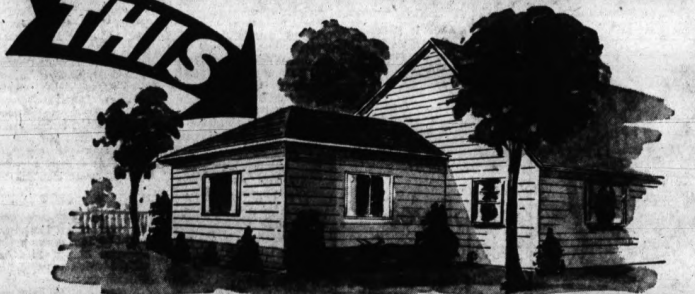

Designer Notes 5 'Cliches'

Warns of Trite Decor

NEW YORK — We need to rid our homes of numerous decorating cliches, says Lawrence Peabody, Boston designer of interiors and home furnishings.

Peabody then listed the five most hackneyed expressions of decor in houses today, beginning with the picture window with a frilly lamp placed dead center.

The other four were: the "big wall" and what to do with it, usually with the homeowner setting for the sofa, two end tables and a lamp on each table; the "line everything up along the walls" approach; the

"center everything" scheme, and the "habili" decor of doing what always has been done before because you're used to seeing it that way.

Peabody, an articulate man in his middle 30s, said none of these showed much imagination on the part of the homeowner.

Windows serve two major purposes, he said, to control the view and to control light. Not as a setting for a "fussy" lamp.

Flow of Traffic Peabody suggested that rooms be planned with the flow of traffic in mind, even if this means hauling a sofa into the middle of things; that the homeowner try to see a room setting in relation to her family's life and exercise some freedom in planning its arrangement; that although it is easier to place a picture in the center of a wall area, asymmetry helps toward interesting decorating.

"Plan walls as a total," said the designer-decorator during an interview. He was in New York on business in connection with his designs of wallpaper, furniture (case goods, juvenile and outdoor) floor coverings, window shades and a line of toys which "do things."

"Squint when you look at a room the same way you're told to squint when you look at art. There is no reason, for instance, that a picture should always be hung at eye level. I've done pictures, all the way from the floor to the ceiling.

"A room should be planned from a sitting position, not standing."

The designer is not an advocate of the "chance" scheme. He will work several colors into one area. But for the unsure, he suggested using one color as the basis of operation.

Then you can do with the neutrals — either the beige or the warm whites. Treat the major surfaces, the big up-hoisted pieces, in the neutrals. Then you can add your yellows and orange accents in winter for warmth; blues and greens in summer for a cooler look."

To Fool The Eye "Decoratively," he continued, "I like to do things with window shades, to help fool the eye if there is a small window, to hide radiators. Draperies and shades unify the room, and often a fabric can be used to keynote a whole room, covering a wall if the room lacks a fireplace or a view, then you're done."

Peabody is a graduate of the Rhode Island School of Design, in Providence, and also studied at the Royal Academy of Fine Arts in Denmark. His wife is Norwegian-born and the couple has three children.

The designer, product of early New England settlers, smiled as he commented, "I am one of those horrible creatures whose ancestors on the Mayflower."

"We can trace our families back to the Norman Conquest (1066)," he said. "My wife tops me. She can trace hers back to the eighth century."

chopped

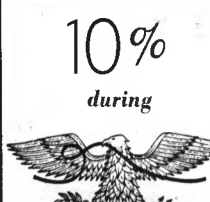

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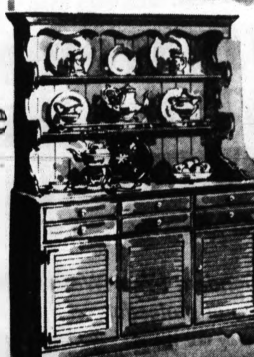

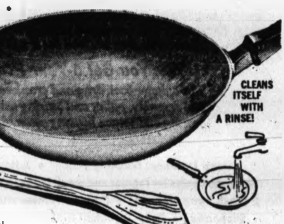

Reuther Favors Contracts Abroad

DETROIT (UPI) — The United Auto Workers Union is trying to conduct its new contract negotiations in the auto industry with one eye on the world labor market.

To bolster its demands for American workers, the union has cited benefits enjoyed by workers in countries like England, Sweden and Australia.

Walter P. Reuther proposed industrial sabbaticals—long leaves of absence with pay—and pointed out that Australian workers already enjoy such a program.

Reuther also urged controls over plant locations and closings and cited England as an example of a country where similar controls are in force.

To back up his proposal for a moving allowance for a worker to travel to a new plant, Reuther singled out Sweden as a country which meets the problem.

MOVING ALLOWANCE

"In Sweden," he said, "if a metal worker is laid off, they don't just throw him on the street." Reuther said a worker there gets a moving allowance for his family and his household, enabling him to travel to a new city for another job.

"In England," he said, "you cannot just close an old factory and build a new one some place else. You have to get a license and you have to build a plant where the workers are."

In Australia, Reuther said, workers are granted industrial sabbaticals—called "long service leaves"—to enable them to have an extended period of vacation.

These programs, however, apparently came about through legislation and not through labor-management discussions at the bargaining table where Reuther has made his proposals.

Reuther, though, acknowledges

that legislation might be required here as well to implement the program. Referring to the moving allowance, he said, "We have got to find an answer to this problem both at the bargaining table and by legislation."

In Australia, legislation covering sabbaticals was passed by the state of Victoria, New South Wales and Queensland. It covers all workers in those states—both hourly and salaried, according to the Australian Consulate in New York.

Freedom Riders' Appeal Trials to Begin Next Week

JACKSON, Miss. (AP)—The appeal trials of nearly 200 convicted "Freedom Riders" will begin next Tuesday in Hinds County Court.

They are expected to continue through January. County Judge Russell Moore today scheduled arraignment for three additional riders after 188 others had pleaded innocent of breach of peace charges.

The riders are appealing City Court convictions after their arrests for refusing to obey police orders to move on while attempting to desegregate transportation terminals in this state capital city of 70,000.

The first riders reached Jackson last May 24. Since then 281 have been arrested. Some remain in jail.

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Records in Spotlight as Yanks Host Chisox

It may read New York vs. Chicago in the American League schedule, but it's really Whitey Ford, Mickey Mantle and Roger Maris vs. the records tonight when the first place Yankees open a three-game home stand against the White Sox.

Ford, the stubby southpaw who is the majors' lone 20-game winner at the moment, is shooting for his 15th consecutive victory. That would be a Yankee record. Whitey tied the club high of 14, set by Jack Chesbro in 1904, when he beat Los Angeles last Thursday for a 20-2 record.

No American League pitcher has won 13 in a row in 24 years—since Johnny Allen did it for Cleveland in 1937.

Mantle and Maris, meanwhile, each need 16 home runs to break Babe Ruth's record of 60 in 1927. Each has clubbed 45, putting them 15 games ahead of Ruth's pace.

Maris could join a tight little cluster of clouters who have hit 46 or more in one season in the AL. Only six have done it: Ruth, Jimmy Fox, Hank Greenberg, Lou Gehrig, Joe DiMaggio—and Mantle.

The Mick, who hit 52 in 1956, could join Ruth (five times), Gehrig (four) and Fox (three) as the only sluggers who have hit 46 or more at least twice in their careers.

Maris also has a shot at the major league record for most home runs hit against one club in one season. Gehrig set the mark with 14 against Cleveland in 1936. Maris already has hit 10 against the White Sox and the Yankees have six games remaining against Chicago.

SEVERAL EX-LIONS
For many of the Steelers it will be like old home week. Names like Tom Tracy, Bobby Layne, Carl Kurlavics and John Henry Johnson really won't need a psychology class to remind them that the Detroit Lions are their foes at Forbes Field Wednesday night.

Coach Buddy Parker wants his game body. Last week he started Rudy Bledsoe and played him the entire game, except for a few minutes when he was placed on the bench.

He has not specifically named his starting quarterback, Pittsburgh writers are certain he will go with Layne.

Wednesday, however, although writers are certain he will go with Layne, after the Detroit victory, Coach Wilson immediately made it known he would start Morrill against the Steelers, not just because of his performance against the Browns but because Morrill knew more of the Pittsburgh team, being a former member.

KNOWS SYSTEM

Broglie, a 143 batman (7-for-8) when he stepped in against Don Drysdale in the second inning, gave up nothing but singles, walked four and struck out seven while gaining his first complete game victory in more than two months for a 3-0 record. This was the second shut out of the season for Broglie, a 21-game winner last year, and his first since he blanked Cincinnati on April 15.

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Crisis Revives Control Possibilities

NEW YORK—With the Berlin crisis coming to a halt, an old package of business and labor news is about to be revived. The chance of government controls again over wages, prices, production and, therefore, profits.

It's the other side of the coin of the build-up in U.S. defense. So far this build-up—which a misstep in Berlin could either speed

up or magnify—has given bounce to the stock market and improved the outlook for many companies whose order books could be fattened.

But if the defense build-up goes further than so far scheduled, controls might again become a political issue. And that prospect worries those who point to past experiences to back their contention that controls hamper more than they help.

The difficulty could arise again if a speedup in defense production runs into industrial bottlenecks. The administration then could ask Congress for controls.

INDUSTRY READY

At first glance industry seems to be in prime shape to take the defense build-up in stride. The basic industries mostly have excess production capacity they can use to meet new government orders. Only in the specialized skills needed by advanced mil-

itary weapons are shortages and delays a problem.

But even in the apparently smooth-running economy the possibility of trouble is with us. A strike in the auto industry, with its many ties to the defense effort, could cause a military bottleneck. And the flareup in Berlin could be an added reason for Washington to intervene to avoid or limit such a strike.

The administration has taken a hand in other labor disputes that it held threatened the health of the general economy. It has moved to curb labor strife that delayed the missile program.

Washington already has the power to set priorities and allocations though neither the American nor the Russian people want war. Any big jump in armament build-ups which might result could lead to bottlenecks and to a demand for better government controls.

COULD INSPIRE PRICE RISE

The second is that the step-up in industrial activity now expected for the fall could gain enough momentum to inspire a marked rise in basic prices and a resultant demand for a big jump in wage scales.

This inflationary threat could lead to a move for that most disliked of government controls: The freeze on prices and wages.

Business circles more and more talk about the chances of it.

War-time Promise Broken

Berlin's Red Curtain Just Another Torn Agreement

The new Iron Curtain across Berlin, erected Sunday by the Communists, is yet another act in destruction of Allied wartime agreements providing that a defeated Germany should be occupied and administered jointly by the victorious powers.

The agreement was reached at foreign minister conferences at Moscow in 1943. The foreign ministers set up a European advisory commission.

In September 1944, after the liberation of France, the European advisory commission decided that Berlin should be the seat for the four-power military administration of Germany and should be set aside for joint occupation. The agreement provided for division of the city into four sectors and separation of the city from the Soviet Zone of Germany which surrounds it.

There was agreement there should be freedom of travel and communications within the city as long as the safety of the four-power forces was not endangered.

The agreement soon began to

break down, however, when Communist deputies in the city parliament rioted against the election of the late Socialist Ernst Reuter as mayor, and West Berlin deputies withdrew from the council chamber in East Berlin. They eventually formed their own West Berlin government.

ALLIED COUNCIL FAILED

The Allied Council, composed of the four commanders in the four zones of Germany, was supposed to be the supreme governing authority in Germany as a whole, but it fell to wrangling and ceased to function entirely in March, 1948. The Kommandatura, the council of four Allied commanders in Berlin, also became ineffective.

In June 1948, the Russians made their first bid to sever the Allied seat of West Berlin. They began the famous blockade by shutting all rail, road and water routes from West Germany to West Berlin. The West continued wartime agreements, provided for their free access to West Berlin across East Germany.

For 10 months, the Western airlift supplied West Berlin and kept its citizens alive. The Russians made no serious attempt to interfere with the airlift.

Then, in 1949, they agreed to remove the blockade. The four-power Council of Foreign Ministers, meeting in Paris, charged occupation authorities with the task of taking all measures "to ensure the normal functioning and utilization of rail, water and road transport" to Berlin.

They also specifically agreed to the free "movement of persons and goods" within Berlin itself.

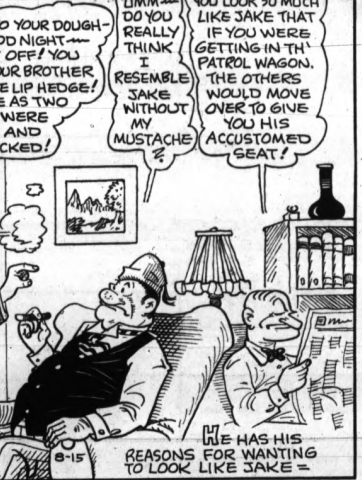

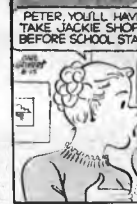

If the world could buy a guarantee that no person in Berlin, same or inmate, would do anything foolish in the next 24 hours, it would be a bargain at the rate of a million dollars an hour.  
The first shock of sealing off East Berlin has passed.  
The governments of both East and West Berlin just acted prudently in keeping the rival crowds back from the barriers.

far enough away from each other so that most of the provocative taunts and insults cannot be heard.  
The East Berlin government did it by issuing this order at the barriers: "No loitering."  
A resident of Communist Berlin knows an order when he hears one and acts accordingly. The West Berlin police did not say anything.  
They merely formed a cordon

and pushed the West Berlin crowd back a quarter of a mile from the danger spot at the Brandenburg Gate.  
The flint has been separated from the steel and the chances appear less now that a spark will be struck than that a spark will be struck at all.  
But danger still remains. The rival crowds are out of voice range, but not out of rifle range.

The possibility of an accident or an incident is still frightening. It could happen on either side of the barriers. Many of the troops the German Communists have called up in this crisis are called "factory fighters."  
They are not well trained soldiers and they are not well disciplined.  
They simply were told to put down their wrenches and hammers in the factory, pick up a rifle and march to the barricades.  
A gun in the hand usually gives a man an intoxicating sense of power, and every trigger happy "factory fighter" is a threat to world peace.  
On the Western side of the barrier it could be somebody like the 19-year-old youth who perched across the barbed wire and barricades into East Berlin Monday night and said bitterly to reporters:  
"My mother lives less than a mile away over there and now I suppose I won't ever see her again."  
Time is the precious ingredient in this crisis. Every minute that ticks away without an incident in Berlin is a peace dividend for the world.  
Obviously, there are only two ways the Berlin crisis can be settled — by negotiation or by force.  
The backdrop the West faces is that no one man can decide what to do as Nikita Khrushchev does for the other side.

## Travel, Trade Ban Studied for E. Germany

Allies Busy Working on Retaliatory Measures; Protests Too Weak

**WASHINGTON (UPI)** — Undersecretary of State Chester Bowles said today the United States has never been "more directly and dangerously challenged" since the end of World War II than it is now in Berlin.

**WASHINGTON (AP)** — The United States, Britain, France and West Germany were reported near agreement today on plan to penalize East Germany for barricading the West-Berlin escape route for refugees from Communist rule.

Officials of the three Western European Allies were to meet with the Soviet Department Monday to discuss the plan. The Allies reportedly reached general agreement that countermeasures should be taken.  
At a similar session at the State Department Monday, participants said, the Allied representatives reached general agreement that countermeasures should be taken.  
Secretary of State Dean Rusk declared in a statement today that the Soviet-supported action by the East German regime to halt the flow of refugees violated East-West agreements providing for free circulation of people and goods in Berlin.  
U.S. officials were reported to be recommending to their governments for action.

## Firm Wins Plea 20-Year Road Needs to Cost \$681.2 Million in City, County

**Court Rules Employees Not Crossing Line Ineligible for Benefits**  
Some 60 workers who refused to cross picket lines during the 1960 strike at Dynamic Manufacturers, Inc. in Troy, were not entitled to unemployment benefits, according to a ruling in Oakland County Circuit Court yesterday.

Circuit Judge William J. Beer reversed a decision of the Michigan Employment Security Commission, thus ending, at least temporarily, a long legal battle.

MESEC spokesmen in Detroit today said they had not decided whether they would appeal Judge Beer's decision to the State Supreme Court.

The MESEC Board of Appeals had previously ruled that employees could claim unemployment benefits on grounds that they should not be required to cross picket lines at the plant gate because they might be injured by pickets.

The commission argued that such a guarantee on paper didn't afford such protection in practice. The judge, found however, that the referee for the commission erred as a matter of law and reversed the commission's ruling.

It will cost an estimated \$681.2 million to meet highway needs in Oakland County during the next 20 years, the State Highway Department estimated today.

Oakland ranked second only to Wayne County in a study of highway needs 1960-1980.

The total highway needs through-out Michigan will require spending some \$11 billion, nearly \$3 billion more than current revenue sources will provide, Highway Commissioner John Mackie said.

The figure includes estimated construction, maintenance and engineering costs on state highways, county roads and city streets.

Of Oakland's total, more than \$300 million should be spent on county roads, the Oakland County Road Commission said. That would mean spending \$6 million more per year than it does now.

Pontiac's estimated need for city streets over the same period is \$36,225,000.

This would require an average expense of nearly \$1 million annually, Pontiac now spends about one-third of that annually on major and local streets, according to City Engineer James N. Carls.

The city's needs were announced yesterday.

Results of the comprehensive three-year study, which cost more than \$500,000 to complete, were presented to a joint legislative highway study committee by the State Highway Department.

It showed that nine of every 10 miles of Michigan's 110,000 miles of highways or streets will need some work during the next 20 years.

State Highway Commissioner John C. Mackie said that the question of how to raise the additional money to cover the program would be covered by another study now in progress and expected to be ready by November.

**PAY FOR ITSELF**  
Possibilities would include higher gas taxes and an expanded bonding program, according to highway experts.

The proposed 20-year program, Mackie said, would pay for itself in terms of lives saved and a lower accident rate. He added:  
"Our population is steadily in-

creasing, travel on our roads and streets is increasing even faster, and the state's economy has become increasingly more dependent upon highway transportation."

By 1980, Michigan's population is expected to climb 30 per cent, while travel will almost double, Mackie said.

"We rapidly have motor vehicle traffic increased that even the substantial highway improvements made in the past few years have not entirely caught up with the tremendous backlog of deficiencies, although the gap is closing now," he continued.

The engineering study was described as the most comprehensive analysis of motor vehicle traffic, population and economic conditions ever developed in the state for highway planning.

It evolved from an evaluation of the ability of every mile of state highway, county road and city street to carry the traffic load of the next 20 years.

The report said that highway construction required to meet the 20-year needs would provide 32,000 new jobs annually for the first 10 years of the program and another 8,000 each year for the next 10 years.

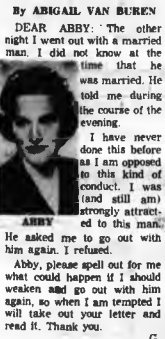

# Designer Notes 5 'Cliches'

# Warns of Trite Decor

NEW YORK — We need to rid our homes of numerous decorating cliches, says Lawrence Peabody, Boston designer of interiors and home furnishings.  
Peabody then listed the five most hackneyed expressions of decor in houses today, beginning with the picture window with a frilly lamp placed dead center.

The other four were: the "big wall" and what to do with it, usually with the homemaker settling for the sofa, two end tables and a lamp on each table; the "line everything up along the walls" approach; the

"center everything" scheme, and the "habili" decor of doing what always has been done before because you're used to seeing it that way.

Peabody suggested that rooms be planned with the flow of traffic in mind, even if this means hauling a sofa into the middle of things; that the homemaker try to see a room setting in relation to her family's life and exercise some freedom in planning its arrangement; that although it is easier to place a picture in the center of a wall area, asymmetry helps toward interesting decorating.

"Plan walls as a total," said the designer-decorator during an interview. He was in New York on business in connection with his designs of wallpaper, furniture (case goods, juvenile and outdoor) floor coverings, window shades and a line of toys which "do things."

"Squint when you look at a room the same way you're told to squint when you look at art. There is no reason, for instance, that a picture should always be hung at eye level. I've done pictures all the way from the floor to the ceiling.

# Albright Art Director to Judge Area Efforts

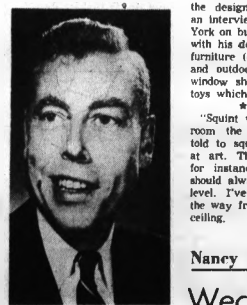
Gordon Mackintosh Smith, director of the Albright Art Gallery, Buffalo, N.Y., has been selected as a one-man Michigan Art Exhibition.

Draperies and shades unify the room, and often a fabric can be used to keynote a whole room, covering a wall if the radiator is a trouble or view to lend excitement."

Peabody is a graduate of the Rhode Island School of Design, in Providence, and also studied at the Royal Academy of Fine Arts in Denmark. His wife is Norwegian-born and the couple has three children.

"Their product of early New England settlers, smiled as he commented, "I am one of those horrible creatures whose ancestors on both sides came over on the Mayflower."

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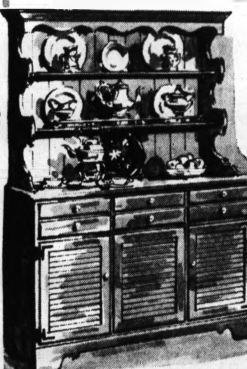

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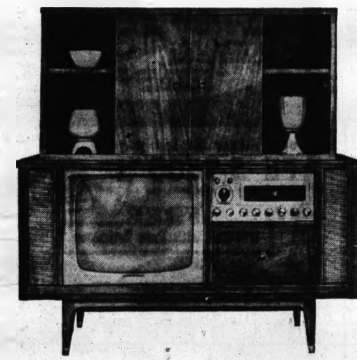
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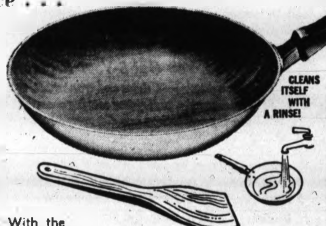
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
