OU takes a look at women in the new millennium

Oakland University will host nationally renowned scholar of African American history and Women's history, Dr. Darlene Clark Hine, professor, Michigan State University, as she discusses, "Women and the New Millennium: Learning from the Past, Looking to the Future," on Tuesday, March 21 from 12 p.m.-1:30 p.m. in the Oakland Room on the university's campus.

Following the lecture, a research seminar titled, "The Culture of Resistance: Black Women's Anti-Lynching Consciousness," will be held at 3 p.m. in the Archives Room of Kresge Library.

The lecture and research seminar are part of OU's celebration of Women's History Month and are hosted by the office of the Vice President for Academic Affairs and Provost, the College of Arts and Sciences, the History Department, Phi Alpha Theta and Women's Studies Department. Both events are free and open to the public.
