

Hough on federal study team

An Oakland University professor has been named to one of the study teams that will recommend a comprehensive reorganization of the federal executive branch to President Carter.

Robbin Hough, economics and management, is now in Washington, D.C., on a five-month leave of absence from the university. Official word of his appointment to a presidential study committee was received at OU on November 4.

Hough has been named to the President's Reorganization Project in the area of federal automatic data processing, a massive program that will spend \$4 billion in the fiscal year 1978 alone.

OU President Donald D. O'Dowd called the appointment a great honor for Hough and for the university. He said he hoped the unpaid leave of absence would cause no undue hardship on Professor Hough. The Carter appointment is without pay and the university is unable to use state funds to support a faculty member in this matter, O'Dowd said.

A group of area business executives are preparing a campaign to raise the funds necessary to keep Hough in Washington for the length of his appointment.

Hough holds his Ph.D. in economics from Massachusetts Institute of Technology. He joined the OU faculty in 1962. He has participated in numerous research activities on behalf of area communities.

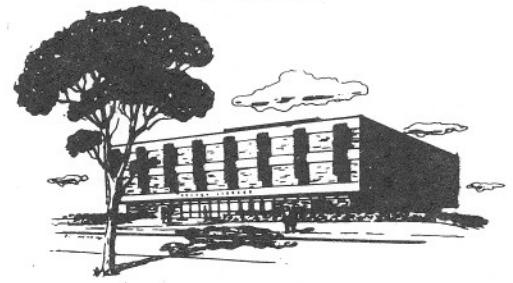
NSF fellowships available

Redoutey chairs group

Stransky speaks at meeting

Fred Stransky, physical education and athletics, spoke to the Great Lakes Chapter of the American Medical Joggers Association at a meeting October 22 in the Pontchartrain Hotel, Detroit. His topic was "Erogogenic Aids Related to Human Performance."

The purpose of the meeting was to stimulate and disseminate information to dental, medical, and allied health personnel on the overall health benefits of endurance training, proper nutrition and lifestyle habits.

Chopp part of medical program

Michael Chopp, assistant professor of physics and health sciences, has played an integral part in the medical physics training and internship program described in last week's (November 8) issue of the OU News.

The program, one of three existing in the United States, is a cooperative effort between Oakland University and Crittenton Hospital in Rochester. It allows OU seniors in medical physics to receive training and internship in a community hospital.

Students are provided with a multi-million dollar laboratory and a professional environment at the hospital, and the hospital receives extensive physics support from the university and its students.

Chopp also serves as a staff physicist at Crittenton. A number of new devices at the hospital were purchased after consultation with Chopp. He provided the consultation that resulted in the purchase of a computerized tomographic X-ray unit and Gray Scale ultrasound equipment.

Chopp is responsible for the undergraduate medical physics program at OU and for development of a new master's degree program in that field. Some 40 students are currently enrolled in the undergraduate major with six seniors now interning.

Chopp has a Ph.D. in physics. He is in his second year on the OU faculty, having served previously as medical physicist for New York City Health and Hospitals Corporation. This is the largest municipal hospital system in America. During the same period he was on the faculty of City University of New York.

Barron and Cafone to present paper

Richard Barron and Harold Cafone have been invited to present a paper at the annual meeting of the National Reading Conference, December 1-4, in New Orleans, LA. The conference serves as a major outlet for scholars actively conducting research in reading. The authors will discuss "Process/Product Confusion Among Disabled Readers."

In addition, Barron will chair a session dealing with reading research at the secondary school level.

He also received a master's degree from Western Michigan and has additional graduate credits from the University of Michigan. He was a graduate assistant for the University Consortium Center in Grand Rapids, which provides graduate and undergraduate programs and courses for Grand Valley State, Michigan State, U of M, and Western Michigan.

As assistant director of the Center at Oakland, Aussicker is coordinating all non-academic functions of the Center, which includes the evening and extension programs, the bachelor of general studies degree, New Charter College and the department of learning skills.

Bixby chairperson of association

Dave Bixby, manager of the university Book Center, is serving as chairperson of the National Association of College Stores Book Committee, which met recently in Cleveland, Ohio. The committee's task is to determine the most efficient methods of merchandising both course books and non-required books, and to create and develop an educational program for presentation at the association's annual meeting.
