FALL APPLICATIONS ARE UP 22 PERCENT

Admissions applications for fall of 1974 are running 22.3 percent ahead of last year, Jerry Rose, director of admissions and scholarships, reports.

The figures comparing June 5, 1974, with June 5, 1973, show 3,217 applications currently compared with 2,629 last year. There are 2,390 applications from first time in college freshmen (FTIAC's) now compared with 2,082 last year. There are 814 transfer applications while there were 547 on this date in 1973. Thirteen new students are in a miscellaneous category.

In addition, residence hall applications are up. There are 965 FTIAC students and 172 transfers requesting residence hall accommodations. The respective figures for 1973 were 900 and 120.

Final figures for fall of 1973 showed 1,248 FTIAC students and 978 transfers in a total student body of 9,638.

EIGHTY STUDENTS RECEIVE ACHIEVEMENT SCHOLARSHIPS

Eighty Oakland University students have won prestigious Upperclass Achievement Scholarships for 1974-75, Gladys Rapoport, director of financial aid, has announced.

The tuition awards are based solely on academic achievement and made without regard to financial need, Mrs. Rapoport said. The recipients have the equivalent of B plus to A averages.

"Each year we are pleased to recognize outstanding student scholars with these Upperclass Achievement Awards," OU President Donald D. O'Dowd said. The funds are derived from income from endowment funds given to the university specifically for scholarship support, he said.

The major sources of the achievement scholarship funds are: Mrs. C. Allen Harlan Scholarship; Matilda Wilson Scholarship Trust; Mr. and Mrs. Benjamin Anibal Scholarship; George H. Gardiner Scholarship; Mary Fogarty Anibal and Eleanor Anibal Burgum Memorial Scholarship; the O. E. Hunt Scholarship; Campbell-Ewald Scholarship; Ruth E. Wagner Scholarship; A. Glenn Wilson Scholarship; and the Thomas E. Wilson Scholarship.

WRIGHT, JOHNSON WIN WILSON AWARDS

Augustine Wright, assistant director of the Oakland Center, and Don Johnson, founder of the campus chapter of PIRGIM (Public Interest Research Group In Michigan) were honored Sunday, June 2, as winners of the Matilda R. and Alfred G. Wilson awards for

1973-74. The awards go each year to the outstanding female and male graduates who have combined scholarship, leadership and a sense of social consciousness.

SCHUCART EXPRESSES GRATITUDE FOR HELP OF OU'S FACULTY

Harry Schucart, OU's oldest graduate, has written thanking the university and the professors with whom he studied for assisting him.

In a letter to President Donald D. O'Dowd, Schucart spoke of the standing ovation he received June 2. He said, in part, "I prefer to regard this ovation as more of a tribute to the fifteen professors who guided me through the various studies; and I was fortunate enough to have fifteen guides in my intellectual adventure, whereas Dante had only one, Virgil."

"There is no way for me to thank the entire faculty, except through you, and I trust that at some faculty meeting when you are present, you will express my deep gratitude for what must remain the high-spot in my life. My grandson told me later, 'I will keep this picture in my mind till the end of my days.'"

A number of OU faculty members will also be in attendance.

URBAN AFFAIRS CO-SPONSORS LAND USE CONFERENCE

The OU Urban Affairs Center co-sponsored with the Detroit Metropolitan Area League of Women Voters a conference on Expanding Metropolitan Housing Opportunities. The program was held June 13-14 at the Detroit Hilton Hotel. Center director, Wilma Bledsoe, moderated the panel, "Land Use Policies as They Affect Housing Opportunities." Dr. Fred Chandler, assistant professor of education, HRD, assisted the participants in building strategies to accomplish conference objectives.

NATURE OF ENERGY COURSE SET FOR SUMMER

The world energy problem, a major concern but a problem little understood by the layman, will be the topic of a special Oakland University summer course in Bloomfield Hills.

Designed for the non-scientist, "The Nature of Energy" course will be given Monday and Wednesday evenings from June 24 through Aug. 14, from 7:00 to 10:00 p.m. in the Museum Lecture Hall of the Cranbrook Academy of Art. Instructor will be Norman Tepley of OU's Department of Physics.

"The course should be of real interest to the layman who finds energy concerns occupying an increasing amount of his attention and who may be unfamiliar with the underlying principals of energy," Tepley said.

Topics include the physics principals of energy production, the physics of fossil fuel, nuclear fission power plants, solar power and other new sources of energy, the instructor said. The political and biological implications for each will be evaluated. Information may be obtained by calling Professor Tepley at 377-3420.
