OU GETS \$12.7 MILLION; CONTINGENCY MONEY APPROVED

A Joint Conference Committee of the Legislature has recommended a \$12.7 million legislative appropriation for OU for fiscal 1974-75. The recommendation is included in the state budget now under consideration by Governor William Milliken.

Oakland University in 1973-74 received a legislative appropriation of \$11.4 million and in addition, under Senate Bill 1343 (as amended), it received an additional \$744,200 in contingency money. OU had been funded for 7,320 fiscal year equated students (FYES) in the base appropriation and received the additional \$744,200 contingency appropriation award for achieving an enrollment growth of 806 FYES to a total enrollment of 8,126 FYES for 1973-74.

For 1974-75, OU's appropriation contains funded support for 7,903 FYES. There has been no contingency fund established to support additional growth.

\$80,000 APPROPRIATED FOR PUBLIC SAFETY STRUCTURE

The Joint Capital Outlay Committee of the Legislature has appropriated the final \$80,000 necessary for OU's new Public Safety and Services Building to complete the funding for the facility. The university is now advertising for sealed bids on the project which is expected to cost \$920,000. The university hopes to begin construction in August.

ANDREAS, LIVINGSTON AND RAPOPORT WIN ELECTION

Rosalind Andreas, commuter services, Mitchel Livingston, residence halls, and Gladys Rapoport, financial aid, have been elected to serve for two years as members-at-large on the executive committee of the Administrative-Professional Assembly.

The results were announced following a July 11 election.

OU AND AAUP ENTER ARBITRATION SEPT. 9

Oakland University and the OU chapter of the American Association of University Professors will submit to binding arbitration on unsettled issues of a 1974-75 contract. Arbitrator Charles Rehmus of the University of Michigan has been accepted by both

parties and will hear their final best offers Sept. 9-10-11. Rehmus will recommend either the AAUP or the university final offers taking no compromise position on the issues. Rehmus was arbitrator in the 1973-74 contract talks. The AAUP has 305 members in the bargaining unit. Talks between OU and the AAUP began April 24.

In other contract actions, talks continued daily last week between OU and the Clerical-Technical Association which has 250 members. No meetings have been set at this time for renewed negotiations between the university and the 12-member Police Officers Association.

The university's fourth bargaining unit, Local 1418 of the American Federation of State Municipal Employees, is in the second year of a three-year contract. AFSME has 160 members.

The university's 180 administrative professionals are not represented by a bargaining unit.

ATLAS HAS ARTICLE IN GUIDANCE JOURNAL

John W. Atlas, School of Education, has had an article entitled "Career Education and the Guidance Program" accepted for the forthcoming (spring issue) of the Michigan Personnel and Guidance Journal.

This article discusses the definitions and concepts of career education, the roles and functions of students, parents, teachers, administrators, counselors, business and industry and others. It supports the contention that the school counselor should have the major responsibility for coordinating and collaborating with all significant others. It sets forth priorities that the counselor may employ in meeting this task.

RUSSIAN CONDUCTOR DEBUTS AT MEADOW BROOK

Yuri Ahronovitch, formerly Chief Conductor of the U.S.S.R. Radio and Television Symphony Orchestra, will make his Meadow Brook Festival conducting debut Thursday, July 25, and Saturday, July 27.

Other highlights of the fifth festival week are guest artists Jerome Lowenthal and Michel Beroff, pianists; plus a Nostalgic Night of Glenn Miller Music, and a Sunday pops concert entitled "John Green - On State, U.S.A."

Lowenthal will be guest artist on Thursday evening, July 25. He will perform Mozart's F major Concerto No. 19. On Saturday evening, July 27, French pianist Michel Beroff, "Prix d' excellence" winner in Nancy (France) will play Prokofiev's Concerto 1.

Ray McKinley, Ray Eberle, and the Modernaires with Paula Kelly will present, by popular demand, "A Nostalgic Night of Glenn Miller Music," on Friday, July 26.

PAK NAMED CONSULTANT AT OAKLAND MEDICAL CENTER

Moon J. Pak, biological sciences, has been appointed a consultant on Postgraduate Medical Education and Research at Oakland Medical Center. In addition, Pak said OU has an exclusive commitment to use the O.M.C. for a clinical training site for the university's health science students.

Oakland Medical Center is a comprehensive medical and surgical hospital being built on the campus of Clinton Valley Center (formerly Pontiac State Hospital), under sponsorship of the State Department of Mental Health. Patient clientele will be primarily medical, surgical, obstetric-gynecological cases of residents of all the state mental institutions and penal institutions.

Pak has also been elected a member of the Board of Directors of the Hypertension Coordinating and Planning Council of Southeast Michigan and he was elected chairman of the body's Finance and Budget Committee. The organization is dedicated to the control of hypertension in Southeastern Michigan. One of its utmost concerns is the establishment of a comprehensive educational program to train and produce allied health professionals who will function as hypertension specialists, Pak said. There are 23 million hypertensive individuals in this country and currently less than 3,000,000 are under any kind of treatment, he said.

ROTEN GALLERIES PRESENTS EXHIBIT/SALE

The Ferdinand Roten Galleries will present an exhibit and sale of original prints Thursday, Aug. 1, in the Art Exhibit Lounge of the Oakland Center.

Works spanning six centuries will be featured in the show which includes prints by Rouault, Goya, Picasso and others. In addition, there will be a collection of Western and Oriental manuscript pages, some dating to the 13th Century.
