LECTURE-CONCERT SERIES: Dr. Wright, of the University of Minnesota English faculty, is the first guest of the 1961-1962 lecture-concert series. He is a Fulbright Fellow and has won several other prizes and study grants in recognition of his work in literature. Among these is the Robert Frost Poetry Prize. He is the author of two poetry colloctions, "The Green Wall", published in 1956 in the Yale Series of Younger Poets; and a new book, "Saint Judas". His lecture will be augmented by readings from his works.

COLLATERAL PROGRAM: Dr. Hoopes will lecture on the tradition of "courtly love" that grew up in the late middle ages, and has profoundly influenced both literature and life in the West.
