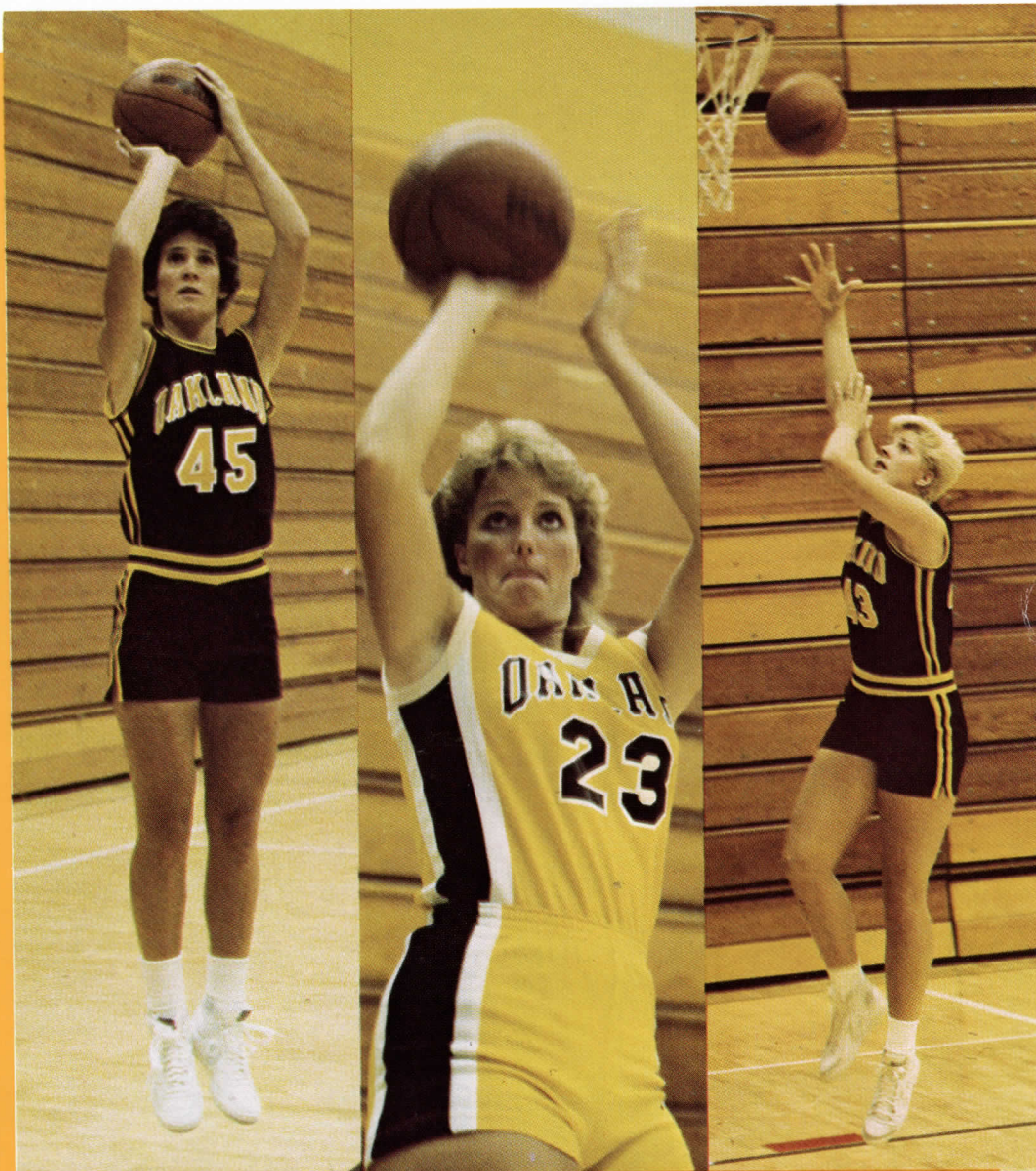

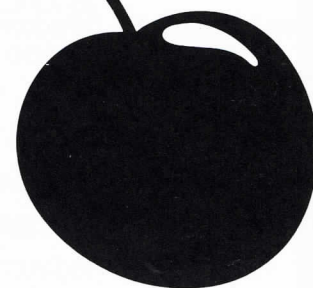

In 1957, the late Alfred G. and Matilda R. Wilson donated \$2 million and their 1,500-acre Meadow Brook Farms estate, 30 miles north of Detroit, to Michigan State University to establish a college in Oakland County. Classes began in 1959 with 570 first-year students. In 1970, Oakland University became an independent public university, and its formal association with Michigan State ended.

Today, with some 27,000 graduates, Oakland University enrolls 12,000 students in its bachelor's, master's and doctoral degree programs. The 24-member charter faculty has grown to more than 400, 90 percent of whom hold earned doctorates.

With distinct instructional programs (College of Arts and Sciences, School of Economics and Management, School of Engineering and Computer Science, School of Human and Educational Services, School of Nursing, Center for Health Sciences), the institution offers a diverse curriculum of general education and specific career fields. Virtually all courses are taught by faculty members, not teaching assistants.

Academic support facilities include such notable entities as the Institute of Biological Sciences (which includes the V. Everett Kinsey Memorial Laboratory, the only major eye research center in the United States not connected with a medical school), the exercise physiology laboratory and the Center for Robotics and Advanced Automation. The Honors College was established to meet the educational needs of highly motivated students.

PAUL HARTMAN

Athletic Director

Paul Hartman is starting his second year as director of athletics for Oakland University. A veteran administrator, Hartman has continued to develop Oakland's tradition of athletic excellence.

The program added personnel, developed additional summer youth camps and offered a new season ticket plan in his first year. He also instituted a Hall of Honor for exceptional Pioneer athletes and introduced the first athletic team banquet.

Hartman, who replaced Corey Van Fleet in June 1983, served the University of Wisconsin-Stevens Point as athletic director for seven years prior to moving to Oakland University. He also served in similar positions at Florida International University in Miami, Florida, and Plymouth State College in New Hampshire.

SUE KRUSZEWSKI *Head Coach*

Sue Kruszewski, Oakland University's second-year head coach, has maintained the Pioneers' winning tradition in women's basketball with a great deal of hard work.

This former University of Detroit basketball coach inherited a team that had graduated four starters, won two consecutive Great Lakes Intercollegiate Athletic Conference (GLIAC) championships and qualified for the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) Division II playoffs twice.

In her first year with the Pioneers, Kruszewski developed a young squad into a potential GLIAC champion. The Pioneers posted a second-place finish in the GLIAC with a 12-4 mark and ended the season with a 15-11 overall record.

Kruszewski's strong recruiting will be a key to the future for the Pioneers. Hampered by a late appointment date, Kruszewski still managed to sign Fenton's Maria Reynolds, who earned All-Conference Honorable Mention as a freshman last year.

Kruszewski continued to work hard and was able to sign



seven outstanding new players, including three All-State players, in the early signing period last November. These newcomers should make Oakland a GLIAC power for the next several years.

A native of Detroit, Kruszewski is considered one of the finest high school and college coaches in the area. Before leaving for the far west, Kruszewski made a lasting impression on women's basketball in Michigan. She built her alma mater, the University of Detroit, into a national basketball powerhouse. She claimed an outstanding 69-15 mark at Detroit and is 135-60 in her collegiate coaching career.

The majority of Kruszewski's coaching experience comes from the high school ranks. She started her coaching career at the age of 17, when she took over the coaching position at Detroit's St. Cyril High School and remained there for five seasons.

Following her St. Cyril experience, she started a 14-year association with Detroit's Dominican High School, an all-girls school, serving as athletic director and head basketball coach. Her teams at Dominican won five city and four regional titles while capturing two class A tournaments. During her tenure in the prep ranks, Kruszewski recorded a 306-63 record.

Kruszewski excelled as a guard at Servite High School in Detroit, earning honors on two all-star tournament teams in two years. She was a team captain as a high school senior, but did not play college basketball since there was not a program at Detroit until she started one in 1977.

KELLY KENNY

Assistant Coach

Kelly Kenny became Oakland's first full-time assistant women's basketball coach after spending one season under current head coach Sue Kruszewski as a student assistant.

Kenny, who ranks among the all-time standouts in Oakland's outstanding women's basketball program, played point guard for four seasons. During the 1979-83 seasons, she put herself among the school's assist and rebounding leaders.

Along with her recruiting and assisting Kruszewski, Kenny also handles the Oakland University Intramural Program.

Kenny earned her Bachelor of Arts degree in education.

After missing a trip to the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) Division II playoffs last year, the Oakland University Pioneers will be looking for its third NCAA playoff berth in four years this season and a possible Great Lakes Intercollegiate Athletic Conference (GLIAC) crown.

Head Coach Sue Kruszewski did an excellent job maintaining the women's basketball tradition in her first season. The Pioneers challenged for the GLIAC championship and finished the 1983-84 campaign with a 15-11 record.

The Pioneers entered the pre-season in 1983-84 with just one holdover starter, forward Brenda McLean in a new position after two years at center and a new coaching system to learn. Kruszewski's unit finished 12-4 and second in the GLIAC.

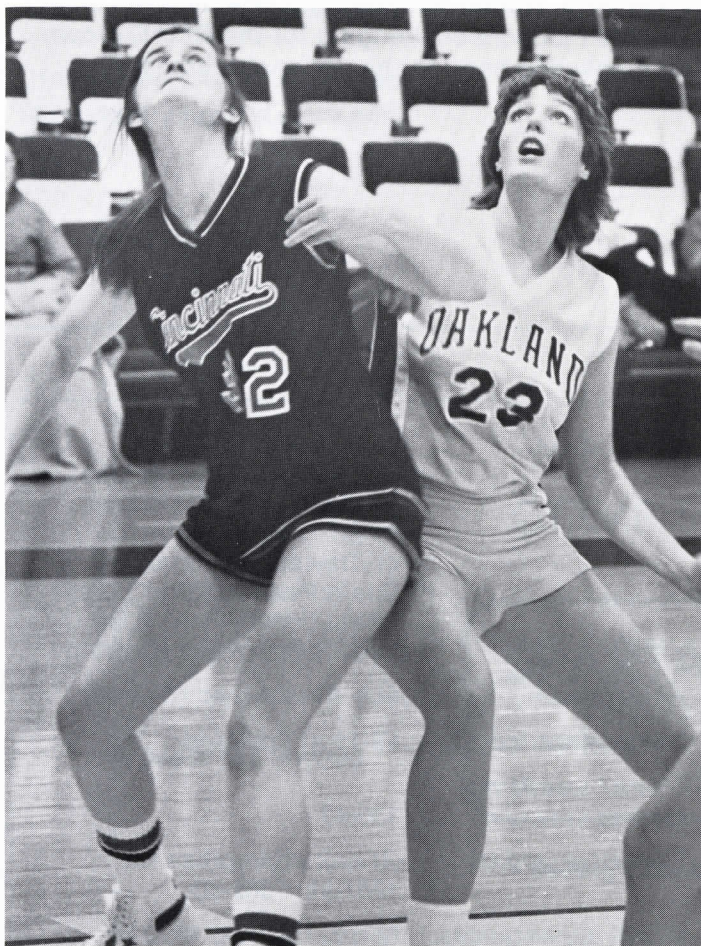
Their strength in the upcoming season rests with McLean, center Kim Nash and guard Maria Reynolds. Kruszewski's fine recruiting class should compete with the returnees for starting berths at small forward and point guard.

McLean, a three-time All-GLIAC player, ranks third on the all-time scoring list among Pioneer players and has an opportunity to become only the fourth player in Oakland history to surpass 1,000 points and rebounds. A gifted shooter, this 6-1 forward topped the Pioneers in almost every category. She was the nation's 17th best free throw shooter and topped the Pioneers in scoring (15.9), rebounding (10.1) and field goal percentage (.520).

A 52 percent career field-goal shooter, McLean is a candidate for this year's All-America team. Her shooting and rebounding skills are among the best to ever play in the GLIAC.

McLean will be teamed with Nash this season. Nash, a 6-3 senior, was second in scoring (10.1) and rebounding (9.1) and first in blocked shots (67). Nash's skills became evident last year as she enjoyed career bests of 28 points and 15 rebounds in a loss against Michigan State University.

Along with Nash and McLean, the Pioneers will

have experience at shooting guard. Reynolds started every game as a freshman and was one of the top rookies in the GLIAC. She topped the Pioneers in scoring twice in the last four games. Sixth-player Toni Gasparovic comes off the bench to provide even more depth at scoring guard or small forward. Kris Brown should see more playing time if Reynolds is moved to point guard.

The Pioneers appear set in three positions, but point guard and small forward remain question marks. Sophomore guard Kim McCartha and small forward Anya Williams will not be returning to the Pioneer squad and Kruszewski must find replacements.

The answers may come from a recruiting class which included four high school All-State players and two junior college standouts.

The point guard position figures to pit returnee Kellie Hill against two freshmen, Margaret Boyle and Cherry Wilks. Both were All-State players last year and give the Pioneers much more speed. Reynolds is also a possibility at point guard, with Boyle playing the off-guard position.

Two junior college transfers from Henry Ford Community College, guard Julie Wilga and guard-

forward Pam Hawkins, are excellent shooters that should push for playing time at guard and forward which complicates those positions even more.

At small forward, Gasparovic and Sarah Knuth, a class "D" All-State performer from Homer, should provide steady scoring for the Pioneers. Knuth scored more than 1,500 points in her career, while Gasparovic was instant offense off the bench last year, averaging 9.1 points per game.

Two other first year players, 6-4 center Kim McDowell and 6-0 forward Sonja Pearson, will challenge for playing time behind McLean, Nash and Lisa Quinn.

There are a lot of combinations Kruszewski can choose from this year and some added depth should make the Pioneers a much better team. Kruszewski may have some tough decisions to make concerning her starting lineup, but the veteran coach enjoys this type of problem.

Kruszewski, who ranks as one of the top 15 coaches in the NCAA Division II in winning percentage, should find the right combination and have the Pioneers challenging for the GLIAC crown and a possible berth in the national tournament.

NCAA: The Voice of College Athletics

The National Collegiate Athletic Association is the organization through which the colleges and universities of the nation speak and act on athletic matters at the national level. It is a voluntary association of more than 970 institutions, conferences and organizations devoted to the sound administration of intercollegiate athletics in all of its phases.

It was the flying wedge, football's major offense of 1905, that spurred the formation of the NCAA. The violent nature of the game, typified by mass formations and gang tackling, influenced President Theodore Roosevelt to summon college athletics leaders to two White House conferences to urge reformation of the game.

That led to a meeting of 13 institutions in early December 1905, called by Chancellor Henry M. McCracken of New York University, to bring about reforms in football playing rules. At a subsequent meeting December 28 in New York City, the Intercollegiate Athletic Association of the United States (IAAUS) was founded by 62 institutions. The Association officially was constituted March 31, 1906, and took its present name in 1910.

For several years, the Association existed as a discussion group and rules-making body. In 1921, the first NCAA national championship was sponsored—the National Collegiate Track and Field Championships. Gradually, more rules committees were formed and championships were added.

Administration and rules interpretations occupied early efforts of the organization. Shortly after World War II, the NCAA adopted legislative and executive powers, changing its function into one dealing with virtually all issues concerned with intercollegiate athletics.

The final authority and governing body of the Association is the annual Convention held during the first half of January. Each active and qualified member is entitled to one vote on all issues before the Convention.

A 46-member Council is responsible for establishing and directing the general policy of the Association between Conventions. Included on the Council are the NCAA president and secretary-treasurer, 22 Division I representatives and 11 representatives each from Divisions II and III. All are elected by

the annual Convention. The Council acts as one body to deal with matters of overall policy and interests involving all three divisions. Council members from each division serve on the Divisions I, II and III Steering Committees, which are Council subcommittees that consider and act upon matters relating only to their divisions. A two-thirds vote of the full Council can overturn an action by any steering committee.

An Executive Committee of 14 members, including the president, secretary-treasurer and three division vice-presidents, transacts Association business and administers its championships. The five officers are elected by the Convention, while the other nine members are elected by the Council.

Committees form the core of the Association. They develop policy by channeling reports and recommendations through the Council, the steering committees and/or the Executive Committee to the annual Convention.

There are 33 general committees, 14 sports committees with rules-making and tournament responsibilities, 23 sports committees with tournament responsibilities only and two separate rules committees.

The NCAA has established 78 national championships in 21 sports, including 31 championships for women. There are nine National Collegiate Championships for which all divisions

are eligible (three for men, four for women, two for both).

The National Collegiate Championship series, which began with a tennis tournament in 1883, has been conducted by the NCAA since 1921. National College Division Championships began in 1957. There are 24 National Collegiate Division I Championships (14 men, 10 women); 23 National Collegiate Division II Championships (14 men, nine women), and 22 National Collegiate Division III Championships (13 men, nine women).

Sports in which men's championships are offered are baseball, basketball, cross country, fencing, football (except in Division I-A), golf, gymnastics, ice hockey, lacrosse, soccer, swimming and diving, tennis, indoor and outdoor track, volleyball, water polo and wrestling.

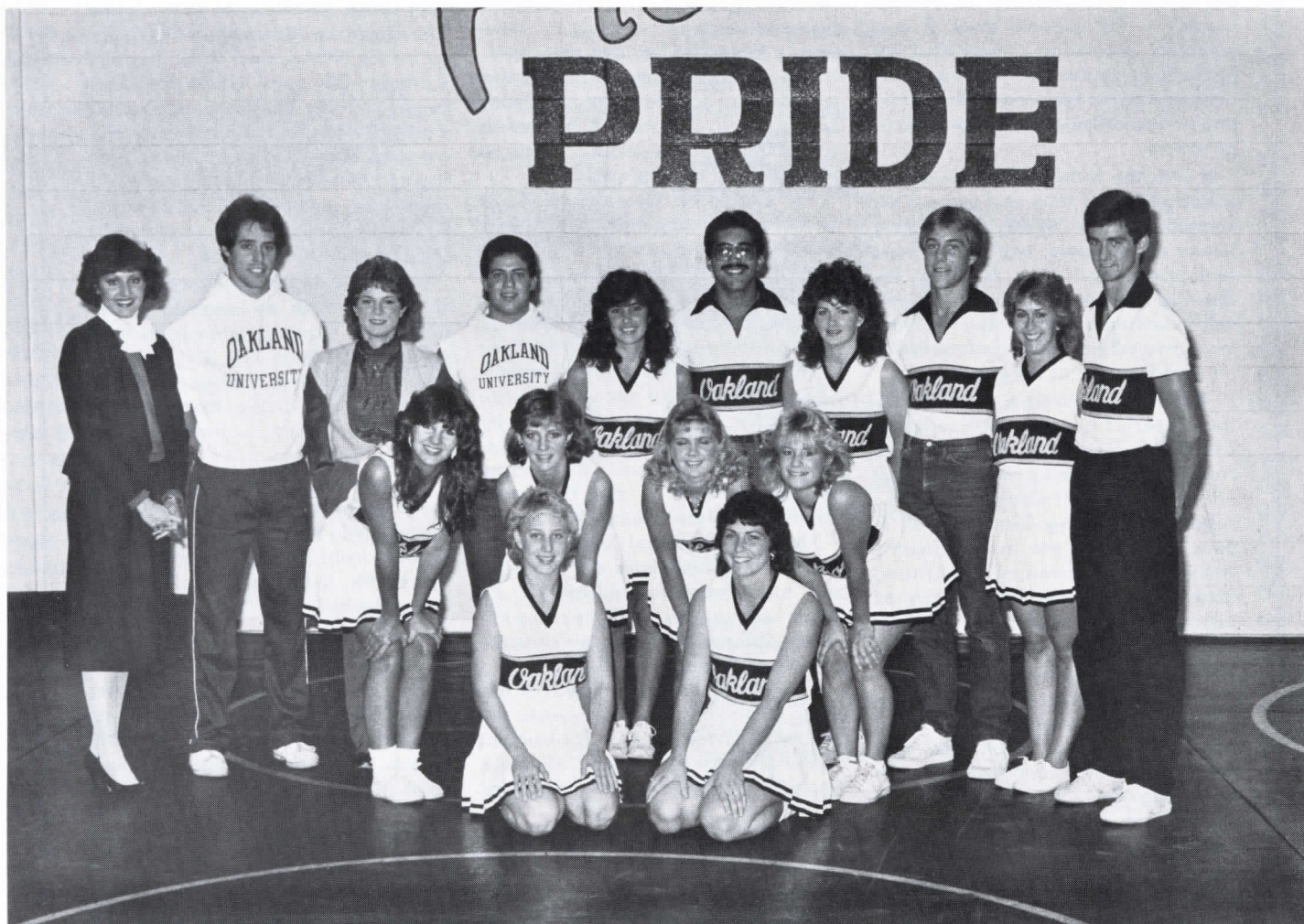
Women's championships are sponsored in basketball, cross country, fencing, field hockey, golf, gymnastics, lacrosse, softball, swimming and diving, tennis, indoor and outdoor track and volleyball.

Men's and women's championships are sponsored in rifle and skiing.

The NCAA maintains approximately 90 full-time staff members at its national headquarters in Mission, Kansas, under the supervision of Executive Director Walter Byers.

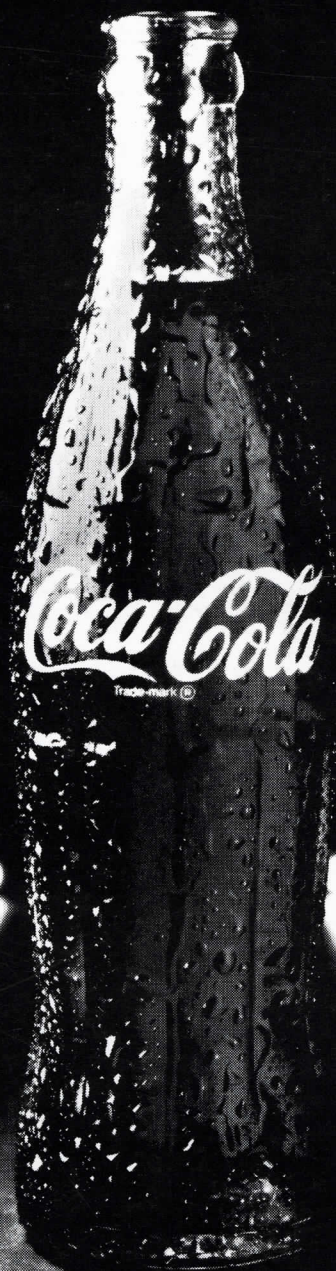
