Program prepares students with 'in-demand' skills

Select Oakland University students this fall will enter a unique information technology program that will prepare them with skills that today's businesses need most.

The Applied Technology in Business (ATIB) program is a competitive scholarship opportunity that combines a rigorous education in business administration with hands-on training in information technology.

Selected juniors in accounting, economics, finance, human resources management, management information systems (MIS), and marketing will work as ATIB interns in structured hands-on training assignments on real-world problems posed by sponsoring firms. As seniors, ATIB students will apply their skills to computer problems of the supporting firms in an on-site internship. ATIB is the only program in Michigan in which corporations contribute two-year full-tuition

scholarships to students who work on computer projects supplied by the sponsoring firms.

Nursing plans new undergraduate curriculum

Students entering Oakland University's nursing program this fall will be enrolling in a new curriculum designed to prepare them for professional nursing practice in the next century.

Responding to HEALTHY PEOPLE 2000 challenges, faculty have designed a plan of study that emphasizes health promotion and illness prevention across the life span.

During their freshman year, students will enroll in courses such as chemistry, anatomy and physiology, and sociology, to establish a foundation in the biological and social sciences.
