Inquiry Clouded by Constitutional Issue in Probe

McCarthy, Eisenhower Administration Clash on Data Sources

WASHINGTON (AP)—A head-on constitutional conflict between Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis.) and the Eisenhower administration hung heavily today over the Senate inquiry into the treatment of Army Pvt. G. David Schine.

The Senate's "who lied?" probe into the dispute between McCarthy and Army officials was temporarily submerged in a roaring battle over the Wisconsin senator's declaration that "no power on earth" will stop him from seeking information from government employees about "corruption, graft or treason."

McCarthy took this stand after a statement by Atty. Gen. Brownell yesterday—issued from the White House—that the executive branch of the government has "sole responsibility" for protecting the nation's security.

Brownell with President Eisenhower's approval gave this reply to McCarthy's earlier call on the two million federal workers in the executive department to give the senator secret information despite presidential orders to the contrary.

"The obligations and duties of the executive, judicial, and legislative branches of the government are defined by the Constitution . . .

"That (executive) responsibility can't be usurped by any individual who may seek to set himself above the laws of our land or to override orders of the President of the United States to federal employees of the executive branch of the government."

The constitutional argument speedily found its way into the Senate investigations subcommittee's televised hearings where it developed additional political overtones.

Firing in all directions, McCarthy said: Eisenhower is "an extremely busy man" and is "getting bad advice."

He is not suggesting that Brownell "resign or anything like that," but he hopes to persuade the attorney general "that where he does have the duty to enforce the law, that we have the duty to expose any failure to enforce the law."

He stands on his position that federal employees are "duty bound to give me information even though some little bureaucratic stamped it secret to protect himself."

His Democratic colleagues on the investigations subcommittee, currently waging a fight for full access to subcommittee files, "will not get the names of the loyal group." (Continued on Page 2, Col. 3)

U. S. Bureau Revises Forecast but Expects Cool Holiday

Revising an earlier forecast, the U. S. Weather Bureau today predicted no rain—but cool weather—for the remainder of the Memorial Day weekend.

Scattered showers and thunderstorms skipped the Pontiac area yesterday, but doused areas south of here.

Thunderstorm hit Detroit yesterday afternoon, causing some lightning damage. Other parts of southeastern Michigan reported sizable showers.

Partly cloudy and cool weather is forecast for tonight, Sunday and Monday. The mercury is expected to rise to a high of 60 to 64 degrees Sunday after a 46-50 degree low tonight.

Northeast and northwest lower Michigan and east and west upper Michigan may get scattered showers tonight and Sunday, but no rain is in sight for the southern part of the state.

The thermometer in downtown Pontiac today bobbed up from 63 at 8 a.m. to 71 at 1 p.m.

A temperature range of 55 to 82 degrees was recorded here yesterday.

The 82s yesterday and Monday were the warmest temperatures in Pontiac this year.

Fallen Heroes Honored by Largest Procession in Pontiac History

An army of civilian-soldiers, supported by medium tanks and heavy machine-guns mounted on jeeps, invaded Pontiac this morning and thousands cheered.

Campaign banners fluttered in the stiff wind and drums rattled as the army of marchers moved up Saginaw street in one of the most colorful Memorial Day parades in Pontiac's history.

A crowd, estimated by police at 20,000, watched the mile-long parade of weapons, marching units, bands, reservists and floats.

The procession stopped at Oakland Ave. and Saginaw to salute this country's fallen heroes with a brief prayer given by Hugh P. Ritter, chaplain of Jimmy Dey Post 13, Amvets.

Then it disbanded and veterans and reservists started for Perry Mount Park Cemetery for a more complete Memorial service.

Chief Pontiac Post 377, American Legion, commanded by Merlin J. Best, received an award for having the largest marching veterans group.

Convict Reds in Missouri

Jury Finds 5 Guilty of Conspiring to Urge Forcible Upset of U. S.

ST. LOUIS (AP) — Five Communists were convicted by a U. S. District Court jury here yesterday of conspiring to advocate forcible overthrow of the government.

A jury of 11 men and one woman returned the verdict after deliberating two hours 15 minutes.

Judge Roy W. Harper told the jury: "Your verdict is a just one."

Said James F. Forest, one of the five: "A travesty on justice."

Sentencing was deferred until next Friday. Each faces a possible maximum sentence of five years in prison and a \$10,000 fine.

The convicted:

Forest, 44, Missouri state chairman of the Communist party.

His wife, Dorothy Rose Forest, 39, former organizational secretary of the party's Hollywood, Calif., section.

William Sentner, 47, a Midwest district official of the United Electrical, Radio and Machine Workers, and long an active Communist.

Robert Manewitz, 37, former educational director of the party here, now a resident of Los Angeles.

Marcus A. Murphy, 46, Negro, who ran for lieutenant governor of Missouri on the Communist ticket in 1940.

The five laughed and joked among themselves while waiting for the verdict. They will remain free under bond until they are sentenced. Sentner is at liberty under \$15,000 bail and the others under bonds of \$10,000 each.

The trial began Jan. 25, and with frequent recesses, required 46 days of testimony, a record for federal district court here.

Judge Harper, who will pronounce sentence, said in dismissing the jury: "You can remember to your dying days the fact that you were able to sit and pass judgment and that your verdict is a just one, and among your fellow Americans that will be the 'pay day' that is yours. I congratulate you."

The jury had been instructed by Judge Harper that the Communist defendants had the right to publicly express their views but that the charge, under the Smith Act, was that they engaged in a conspiracy to teach and advocate the overthrow of the government by force and violence.

Fatties Advised to Keep Eating if Health Is Good

CHICAGO (AP) — An insurance company physician says that fat men have "gotten a raw deal," and that they should "eat and be happy."

Dr. Richard Gubner, assistant director of medical research for the Equitable Life Assurance Society of New York, defended the fatties who have been badgered in recent years by doctors demanding that they "take it off."

Gubner told the American College of Cardiology yesterday that if there are no complications in a fat man by the time he is 60 there is no particular reason for him to cut down eating.

"We would be unnecessarily taking away one of the few pleasures left in life," Dr. Gubner said. He explained there is no indication obesity in itself is a cause of heart ailments. But, he added, it can lead to high blood pressure and diabetes, which in turn can lead to cardio-vascular ailments.

He is suffering from head injuries. According to Waterford Township Police, the car driven by Bigelow was struck by one driven by Dr. Maxwell L. Shadley, of 94 Ottawa Dr., who received a cut chin. Dr. Shadley told police Bigelow's car was crosswise on the highway before he had time to stop.
