OAKLAND FACES STATE BUDGET CUT

Gov. William Milliken has recommended a \$248,551 reduction in Oakland University's 1975-76 state appropriation.

The figure was included in an executive order given October 29 to the appropriations committees of the Michigan House and Senate. Milliken's proposed cuts include reductions of \$7.5 million in the appropriations for state colleges and universities.

Oakland University had received a \$13,493,100 state appropriation for 1975-76. The proposed cut, if approved, will leave the university with \$13,242,549 in state support for the year.

President Donald D. O'Dowd said the university will wait and see what the outcome of the entire process in Lansing is before announcing specific plans for cutting the university's budget. "We have been trying to conserve our resources all along knowing that we were going to face some kind of reduction," he said.

Any cut will put severe strain on the university, but O'Dowd called Milliken's proposed \$248,551 reduction regrettable but understandable in view of the state's financial status at this time.

OU FALL ENROLLMENT TOPS RECORD

Oakland University's fall enrollment rose 3.4 percent over 1974 for a record 10,565 full- and part-time students. The increase comes despite the fact that OU accepted the same number of freshmen and transfer students this fall as it did in 1974, President Donald D. O'Dowd said.

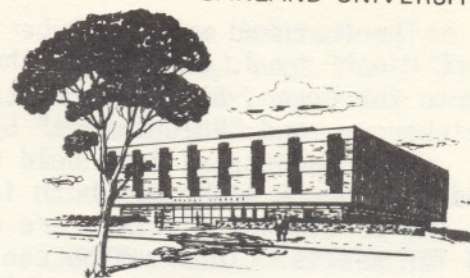
OU accepted 2,440 freshmen and transfer students this fall and in 1974, but larger numbers of students have returned to OU this year than in the past. The 1975 fall term enrollment includes 2,982 graduate students and 7,583 undergraduates enrolled in on- and off-campus courses.

The university was forced to close enrollment in some of its fast growing programs because of the "no growth" budget passed by the legislature, O'Dowd said.

SOCIOLOGIST LIPSET TO TALK ON CURRENT POLITICS

Seymour M. Lipset, internationally known political sociologist, will speak at Oakland University today, November 4 on "American Politics in a Presidential Year." The public is invited to the free program to be held at 8 p.m. in the Gold Room of the Oakland Center.

Lipset is now on the faculty at Stanford University after serving previously as professor of government and sociology at Harvard University. He has also taught at the University of California at Berkeley.

In his OU talk, Lipset will comment on the leading candidates and on how the presidential race shapes up at this point in the post Watergate era. He will discuss the concerns being raised about the weakening of the American political party system.

PITTS AT PARIS CONFERENCE

Jesse R. Pitts, sociology and anthropology, joined American delegates Hannah Arendt and Benjamin Nelson at the International Symposium on "The Terrors of the Year 2000" which was held at the Chateau Jouy-en-Josas outside of Paris on September 27-30.

Pitts delivered his paper entitled "On Some Factors Which Influence the Capacity of Ruling Elites to Use Force, and Possible Consequences for the Future" to the symposium.

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The program will feature the Renaissance style of compositions called "Flemish Music," a collection of light, tuneful songs and dances. As an added highlight, the Renaissance Dance Company will perform dances of the 16th century in costume.

The Collegium Musicum is the formal name of the early music program at Oakland University. Collegium members are devoted to the performance of medieval, Renaissance, and Baroque music performed on authentic copies of antique instruments.

OU is the only institution in Michigan to offer undergraduates the opportunity to major in such areas as lute, recorder, and Renaissance winds. The collegium is directed by Lyle Nordstrom.
