

Oakland University: In the National Spotlight



It was another banner year for women's and men's swimmers. The women's team won its fifth consecutive NCAA Division II national title, and the men captured their first since 1980. Pete Hovland was named national Coach of the Year for guiding his men's team to victory.

Oakland University continues to receive national attention for the quality of its academic and athletic programs.

The university is rated one of the 10 "best values" among the top 124 accredited Midwestern colleges and universities for 1994 by U.S. News & World Report. The magazine ranked Oakland in the top 10 for "sticker price" (tuition plus room and board) and for "discounted price" (tuition plus room and board, fees, books and estimated personal expenses less the average of needbased grants-in-aid) measured against the academic quality of the institution.

One of the factors that sets Oakland University apart is its prime location in suburban northeast Oakland County. The university offers a comprehensive selection of courses, including 73 undergraduate majors, 27 master's degrees and four doctoral programs. The programs are rooted in the university's traditional liberal arts focus and offered through six academic units:


- The College of Arts and Sciences
- The School of Business Administration
- The School of Engineering and Computer Science

- The School of Education and Human Services
- The School of Health Sciences
- · The School of Nursing

This year has been one of change and preparation for the future at Oakland. The university began construction of a \$39 million science and engineering complex that will include two new buildings and the renovation of the existing Hannah Hall of Science. The new classroom and laboratory space will directly benefit students studying in the sciences and engineering.

In turn, the new complex will aid in the university's collaborative research efforts with business and industry. Oakland is involved with Chrysler, Ford and General Motors and their suppliers, conducting research to help bring innovative advances to cars and trucks. For example, the School of Engineering and Computer Science and the School of Engineering and Computer Science faculty works with Chrysler Corporation to develop a real-time signal processor that detects engine misfires at any speed. The detectors are expected to begin appearing on 1995 models sold in California and on 1997 models nationwide. Also, the faculty works with Eaton Corporation to test engine valve materials and their resistance to wear, with the goal of developing a millionmile diesel engine.

Oakland was selected by Governor John Engler to house the Michigan Quality Council for the next three years. Members of the council, representing businesses, industry, government and education, will present prestigious Michigan Quality Leadership





Awards annually to organizations that exhibit a commitment to total quality.

Oakland has also made its mark in NCAA Division II athletics. The women's swimming and diving team won its fifth consecutive national title in 1994 and the men's team captured its first national crown since 1980. The women's basketball team ended the season with a 23-5 record after earning a berth in the NCAA postseason tournament. The women claimed a first-place league finish and the league tournament championship. Meanwhile, the men's basketball team made its first-ever appearance in the NCAA tournament, finishing at 21-10, which included a record-setting

189-107 win over Madonna University early in the season. The men's team set or broke 28 school records this season. The men's soccer team made its eighth consecutive appearance in the NCAA tournament; the team has the longest active Division II tournament-appearance streak in the country. The soccer squad has been to the tournament in 11 of the past 12 seasons. The women's volleyball team made it to the NCAA tournament for the first time ever, after a season that began with a school-record win streak of 14 matches.

The university continues to maintain its close ties with the community through public service programs. A study that evaluated

the links between moderate exercise and prevention of cardiovascular disease in older African-Americans in Pontiac and Detroit was cited by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services as a "model community health program."

In addition, the university offers numerous cultural offerings, from student and faculty music, theatre and dance programs, to the professional Meadow Brook Theatre productions. The university's Meadow Brook Music Festival, Meadow Brook Art Gallery and historic Meadow Brook Hall round out enrichment programming.

Meadow Brook Health Enhancement Institute provides exercise and disease-prevention programs to the community, and Katke-Cousins Golf Course is acclaimed as one of the state's best.

Oakland University continues to flourish, thanks to the vision of its founders, Matilda R. and Alfred G. Wilson, who in 1957 donated \$2 million and their 1,500-acre estate for a new educational institution. The Wilsons demanded excellence in the new university, seeking outstanding young educators from around the world. That spirit continues today as the university evolves to meet the challenges of the coming century.


