WASHINGTON (AP) — The United States is insisting upon assurances of Communist war de-escalation as the price for any halt to bombing of North Vietnam.

## Romney Asks Dem Help on Fiscal Reform

Sees Such a Program, Including Income Tax, Being Passed in '67

LANSING (AP) — Gov. George Romney, warning that Michigan faces financial troubles ahead, yesterday asked legislative Democrats to help pass a fiscal reform program — including a state income tax — before next April 1.

After a 2½-hour meeting with House and Senate Democratic leaders, Romney said he thought a fiscal reform program would pass this year.

Some Democrats agreed, others didn't.

Romney has predicted a budget adding no new programs for the fiscal year beginning July 1 would erase an anticipated \$73 million treasury surplus and leave Michigan \$89 million in the red by the middle of 1968.

If some 39,000 state employees receive a \$21.5 million pay-fringe benefit increase already approved by the Civil Service Commission, the deficit would be larger.

### IMPRESSION

"I got the impression they (Democrats) were not fully aware of the magnitude of the figures required to supply existing programs in the coming two years," Romney said, adding, "at least some Democrats recognize the need for tax reform."

The governor said he presented the legislators four tax plans—not as recommendations, but just as topics for discussion.

Three of the examples, it was learned, involved income taxes.

The fourth, one Democrat said, "was apparently just an example he threw in to show that we need an income tax."

The three examples involved income taxes ranging from 4 to 4½ per cent on corporations, 8 to 8½ per cent on financial institutions, and 2 to 3 per cent on individuals.

## Hanger Will Attend FBI Training Program

Pontiac Police Chief William K. Hanger will spend 12 weeks this spring at the national academy of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, it was announced today.

Selection of Hanger as one of 200 men from across the country to attend the school was made public jointly by City Manager Joseph A. Warren and Paul H. Stoddard, head of the FBI's Detroit office.

Warren said Hanger's attendance at the school would be made possible through a fully paid leave of absence from March 20 to June 7.

The city's only expense for the high-prestige training program will be payment of room and board at the academy.

The city manager said he has yet named an acting chief during Hanger's absence. Notification from federal authorities that Hanger had been accepted for the school came about a month ago. Agent Philip Mercado, head (Continued on Page 2, Col. 4)

## 2 Vehicles Fall Into Gorge; 115 Feared Dead

Ravine Strwn With Bodies of Pilgrims; 15 Survivors So Far

MANILA (AP) — More than 115 persons were believed killed today when two buses loaded with Roman Catholic pilgrims hurtled into a ravine on a mountain road south of Manila, rescue experts said.

Military rescue experts who took a helicopter to the crash site said there appeared to be only 15 survivors out of more than 130 passengers thought to have been aboard the buses.

Eyewitnesses told of mangled bodies scattered round

the bottom of the gorge where one of the buses, crushed and overturned, pinned at least 17 persons.

The second bus was halted in its plunge down the 300-foot outcrop of rock.

The casualty toll, which may not be confirmed until Saturday, indicated one of the worst road tragedies in history.

The buses were part of a 57-vehicle convoy taking pilgrims to a festival of the Epiphany.

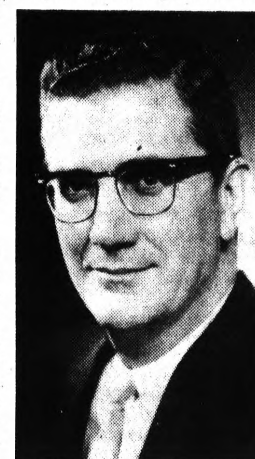
## Big '67 Seen for GM Truck

Truck sales in 1967 could come close to the record level of last year with the right economic climate, predicted Martin J. Caserio, a General Motors vice president and general manager of GMC Truck and Coach Division.

"The year ending has been a very good year for the truck industry and for GMC Truck and Coach Division, with industry deliveries at a record level of about 1.6 million commercial vehicles," Caserio said.

"Truck sales are closely geared to the level of general economic activity including capital investment. Currently the economy continues to demonstrate strength and there are no present indications of a major letdown. Also, we expect capital expenditures to continue to increase although at a somewhat reduced rate," he continued.

"Therefore, in a favorable economic climate, 1967 could well be another good truck sales year, in the area of the 1966 volume," Caserio added.

## Sources Claim Soapy Eyed for High U. S. Post

WASHINGTON (UPI) — G. Mennen Williams, former assistant secretary of state for African affairs and onetime Michigan governor, is being considered for another foreign affairs assignment, informed sources said today.

One job that has been discussed is the No. 2 post with the U.S. mission to the United Nations, replacing Dr. James M. Nabrit who resigned recently to return to the presidency of Howard University here.

Williams declined to comment on his future, but he did discount reports he was considering becoming an Episcopal priest. "I once casually thought of it," he said. He is a lay reader in the church.

## Former State Official Dies

DETROIT (AP) — Frederick M. Alger Jr., former Michigan secretary of state and scion of one of Michigan's pioneer lumbering families, died last night at his suburban Grosse Pointe home following a short illness. He was 59.

Alger was the son of the late Col. Frederick M. Alger and the grandson of Gen. Russell A. Alger, secretary of war under President McKinley and a former U.S. senator and governor of Michigan.

The family's wealth and prominence dates back to the lumbering boom of the 1890s in Canada and Michigan's Upper Peninsula.

One of the first Michigan Republicans to support the candidacy of former President Dwight D. Eisenhower in 1951, Alger lost a bid to unseat former Michigan Gov. G. Mennen Williams in 1952.

President Eisenhower appointed him ambassador to Belgium where he served until 1956.

### VICTORY MARGIN

Williams' victory margin over Alger in 1952 was by 8,618 votes, the narrowest of any Williams' victories in his six terms as governor.

Alger helped launch Williams' political career by suggesting the young lawyer's name to the late Gov. Kim Sigler in 1947 for appointment to the Michigan Liquor Control Commission.

Williams was elected to his first term the following year, having used his post to tour the state in drumming up political support.

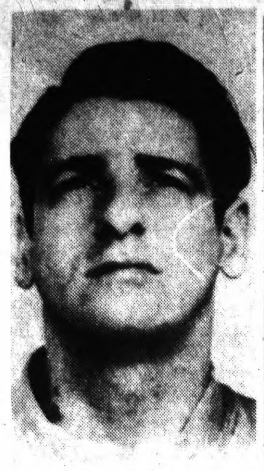
TOMORROW — Snow diminishing to snow flurries by afternoon. Windy and turning colder.

# Trial in East for Confessed Strangler Set

CAMBRIDGE, Mass. (AP) — A mental patient who claims to be the Boston strangler is scheduled for trial next week on a variety of charges not related to the stranglings.

Defense Atty. F. Lee Bailey says his client, Albert DeSalvo, is the man who strangled 11 women in eastern Massachusetts between June 1962 and January 1964.

The Associated Press has learned that the defense plans to identify DeSalvo as the strangler in next week's trial in Middlesex County Superior Court.

A grand jury indicted the 34-year-old house painter-handyman in 1965 on 16 counts of robbery, assault, burglary and sex offenses.

DeSalvo has been confined to the Massachusetts State Hospital at Bridgewater since shortly after his arrest in 1964. After his indictment DeSalvo was adjudged mentally unfit to stand trial.

Last June, DeSalvo testified at a Superior Court hearing that he believed himself competent to stand trial. Psychiatric testimony was divided, but a judge ordered the trial to proceed.

# Trial Date Is Set in JFK Book Battle

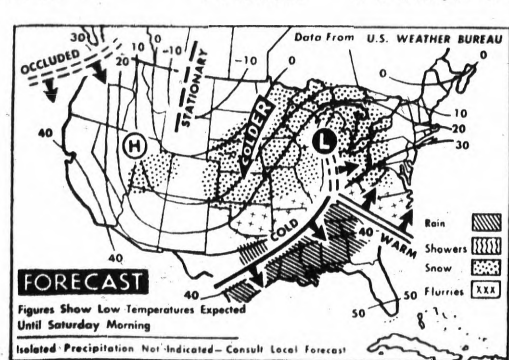

State Supreme Court Justice Saul S. Streit set the date Thursday after author William Manchester and Harper & Row filed separate but similar answers to Mrs. Kennedy's suit.

# 2 More Red MIGs Downed by Yanks;

SAIGON, South Vietnam (AP) — U.S. Air Force pilots downed two more Communist MIG21s over North Vietnam today, running their score of MIG kills for the week to nine, the Air Force announced.

The week's effort wiped out about half of North Vietnam's estimated fleet of 15 to 20 of the late-model MIG21s, the fastest Communist plane in Asia, which can travel 1,500 miles an hour.

U.S. officials said no American planes were lost in the duels with MIGs, but they said one Air Force Phantom jet went down today 100 miles west of Hanoi for "unknown causes." Both fliers aboard the reconnaissance Phantom were rescued within nine minutes of each other, a U.S. spokesman said.

# N-Talks Likely to Be Resumed

U. S., Soviets Apart Over Treaty Wording

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The United States and Russia are expected to resume diplomatic talks sometime this month on a proposed treaty to prevent the spread of nuclear weapons, U.S. officials said today.

But there was little hope here that these discussions, probably to be held in Washington, would lead to any early agreement about the wording of the treaty.

Officials, puzzled at persistent reports in Europe that the non-proliferation pact was imminent, said there were still major differences on the wording of the most important sections.

There has been some progress, however, on the less vital parts, they said.

The differences between Moscow and Washington still center principally on the first article of the proposed pact, dealing with the obligation of nuclear powers not to transfer weapons to non-nuclear powers.

ORIGINAL DRAFT  
The original U.S. draft would have permitted establishment of a Multilateral Nuclear Force (MLF) among NATO members — provided that one of the members of such a force would have agreed to put all of its national nuclear weapons into such a joint pool.

The Russians roundly rejected the proposal because, in the Soviet view, it would have given West Germany access to the NATO nuclear arsenal.

# SEVEN ON MONDAY

The two MIGs were brought down 30 miles northwest of Hanoi, the same area where Air Force pilots downed seven MIG21s last Monday and an area which U.S. spokesman called "MIG Valley."

The U.S. spokesman at first reported that both MIG21s were shot down but later he said one of the Soviet-designed planes was maneuvered into crashing.

Without divulging details, the spokesman said Air Force Phantom pilots by maneuver tactics forced one of the MIGs into an uncontrollable spin. The other MIG was shot down with an air-to-air missile from a Phantom, the spokesman said.

The ground war in South Vietnam continued at a slow pace, as it has since the start of the year.

# MINOR SKIRMISHES

The U.S. military command reported only minor skirmishes. South Vietnamese military headquarters reported a company of regional force troops (80 to 100 men) took heavy casualties from a mortar and ground attack by an estimated battalion of Vietcong (500 men) 26 miles northwest of Saigon. A spokesman said the militiamen killed 16 Vietcong.

# House GOP Okays Most Caucus Moves

LANSING (AP) — House Republicans agreed Thursday on most 1967 staff and facility arrangements worked out with Democrats. They planned to take another look at a few of the arrangements.

Rep. Robert Waldron of Grosse Pointe said the Republican House caucus "substantially adopted" the agreements worked out by negotiating committees "with the possibility of reviewing a few details."

# Hoffa Reveals Union Strategy

HOLLYWOOD, Fla. (AP) — Teamsters Union president James R. Hoffa says if his union runs into trouble negotiating with 12,000 trucking firms "We would never strike all of them."

Hoffa, who opens negotiations with the nation's trucking industry in Washington Jan. 17, said Thursday the union's strategy in the event of a deadlock in negotiations would be to call selective strikes that would not shut down the entire trucking industry.

Hoffa, who faces going to prison on his eight-year jury tampering sentence, possibly before the trucking negotiations are wrapped up by the March 31 deadline, said his union will work against any new proposals in Congress to limit the right to strike or otherwise limit the power of organized labor.

He said this would be done through lobbying in Congress, urging union members to oppose any legislation adverse to organized labor, and through appeals for support in the nation's press.

of the Pontiac FBI office, said screening of applicants for the academy includes an extensive background check of character, loyalty and ability.

A waiting period of up to four years is not uncommon for applicants Mercado said, because of the large numbers of police personnel desiring to attend the academy.

Training at the school is patterned after the basic instruction given the FBI's own agents, with emphasis on problems peculiar to local agencies.

Courses include ballistics, police records, firearms, investigative procedures, physical training and defense tactics, photography, preservation of evidence and administrative techniques.

VERY PLEASED  
Warren, who recommended Hanger one year ago, in a letter sent to J. Edgar Hoover, national FBI director, said he was "very pleased" with the appointment.

"The fact that Chief Hanger was chosen, after meeting at a very rigorous physical, mental, and background requirements is a significant achievement in itself," the city manager said.

# Phone Classes Set for County

Will Instruct Pupils Confined to Homes

Telephone conference calls will be used in Oakland County next year to create "classrooms" for youngsters confined to their homes, marking the first time the program has been used outside of California.

Purchase of up to three telephone teaching stations at \$8,000 each was authorized yesterday by the Oakland Schools Board of Education.

The system will allow a homebound child as many as three instructional hours a day rather than the present two hours a week.

With it, a teacher will be able to talk to a maximum of 20 youngsters at the same time. In this manner, children in the same grade can be grouped into "classes."

Scheduled to start in September, the program will aid 60 youngsters expected to be homebound for the foreseeable future plus a group of fluctuating size which can double the total in the peak months of March and April.

# ADAPTED IN AUSTRALIA

In use in California for three years, the system has been adapted for radio teaching in Australia.

While authorizing the purchase of the telephone stations, the board also approved a three-year contract with Michigan Bell Telephone Co. Oakland Schools officials estimate toll calls to the Royal Oak area will cost \$1,200 a month.

# Funeral Held; Ruby Called 'Misguided'

CHICAGO (AP) — The rabbi conducting the funeral services today for Jack Ruby says the slayer of Lee Harvey Oswald was a "misguided patriot."

Rabbi David Graubart was selected by Ruby's family to conduct the funeral services at the Original Weinstein & Sons funeral chapel on the Northwest Side.

The services are set for 10 a.m.

Only members of Ruby's family and close friends are attending the private services.

Rabbi Graubart said Thursday Ruby was in a state of "emotional anguish" over the murder of President John F. Kennedy. "I will say that Jack Ruby was a misguided patriot," the rabbi said.

Following the service in the chapel, Ruby, 55, was to be buried beside his parents, in the family plot in Westlawn Cemetery.

The body, attired in a black suit, black tie, white shirt and the Jewish prayer shawl and skullcap, was laid in a bronze casket.

# Short-Term City Solution

Deliberations by the select Pontiac Finance Study Committee — probing the city's fiscal crisis — have not yet produced a consensus.

However, the citizens group last night did weigh various prospects of when, where and how to secure more money for municipal operations.

Debated at the meeting in the commission chambers was a two-part recommendation by the revenue subcommittee, headed by Charles E. Yeager as chairman.

Presenting the unanimous recommendation of 10 subcommittee members, Yeager said the recommended short-term solution to the city's fiscal woes was a property tax hike for two years of two to four mills, which would net the city \$800,000 to \$1.6 million depending on the final millage selected.

Yeager recommended the charter amendment vote — necessary to hike the property tax — for late this spring.

# INCOME TAX

In addition, the revenue subcommittee recommended to the over-all study group that an advisory vote be conducted in early 1968 on a city income tax. The latter tax, if a favorable opinion is secured from voters, would be implemented for Jan.

# Birmingham Area News School Board to Join Council of Governments

BIRMINGHAM — The board of education has agreed to participate in the Southeast Michigan Council of Governments.

The council, proposed by the Committee of One Hundred, which was appointed by Gov. George Romney, provides local governments with an opportunity to participate voluntarily with other governments in South-eastern Michigan to resolve problems, and develop policies and plans that are common and regional in nature.

The board also declared its intent to consider from time to time voluntary participation in financial support of the council.

The Bloomfield Art Association will add four new oxy-acetylene welding torches and 10 acetylene soldering torches to its metal sculpture and jewelry area in time for the opening of the winter term Jan. 16.

Frederick G. Stickel of Frederick G. Stickel Associates, Birmingham architects, has been named president of the Detroit Chapter of the American Institute of Architects for 1967.

The chapter will celebrate its 80th anniversary during Stickel's term of office.

# Signs Mounting That LBJ Won't Ask for Tax Boost

WASHINGTON (AP) — Indications are mounting that President Johnson may not ask for a tax increase, at least for the present, to help finance the Vietnam war.

If this proves the case, however, it's also unlikely the administration would rule out a tax increase completely.

The more logical course in such a situation, officials said, would be to retain the wait-and-see attitude adopted by the administration during 1966 — hold the door open to a tax increase from month to month while watching economic developments and budget figures closely.

But the decision on a tax increase is still President Johnson's and the last word from him was that he hadn't made up his mind.

NOT CONSIDERED  
It was learned yesterday that congressional leaders are drawing up their schedule for the new session on the assumption that no request for a tax boost will come from the President.

Even the informal soundings which usually come from the White House to lay the groundwork for major legislation are missing now.

Congress last year passed a tax adjustment act in only two months but that involved no change in personal income or corporate tax rates, only a change in collection procedures and the reimposition of some excise taxes.

With economic pressure now lessened, the congressional climate may not be as favorable for a presidential tax request as it might have been last year.

# UNCERTAINTIES POINTED UP

On the other hand, last year was an election year and 1967 is not.

# Pope Offers to Talk Peace

VATICAN CITY (AP) — Pope Paul VI said today he wanted to "talk peace" with China's Communist leaders.

Some Vatican sources interpreted this as a virtually an offer for papal mediation over the Vietnamese war. Others said that although the Pope was referring specifically to talks for restoration of religious liberty in Red China, his words had a broader implication.

They said the Pope apparently believed that if China would discuss religious peace with the Church, the door would be open for talks on world peace.

Robert Eldred, chairman of the over-all study committee, set Feb. 2 as the date for next meeting of the citizens group.

# Farmington Study 'Progresses Nicely'

FARMINGTON — Plans are "progressing nicely" on a proposed study of the effects of consolidation on four Farmington area communities, according to the chairman of the study committee.

Chairman Dr. John Richardson said a meeting will be held Jan. 19 with professional community planners to outline the study and its goals.

The four communities involved, Farmington, Farmington Township and the villages of Wood Creek Farms and Quakertown, have all agreed to the study, according to Richardson and will make their records available to the committee.

The purpose of the study, Richardson said, is to gather facts and study possible effects of unification on each community and on the group as a whole.

The study was proposed following an attempt by the city of Farmington to annex a portion of the township. In the Nov. 8 general election, voters approved annexation of 457 acres but turned down a similar proposal for 1,800 acres.

## SECOND ATTEMPT

It was the second annexation attempt and citizens and several members of the board of commerce said they felt a good look should be taken at the situation.

Representatives from the governing bodies of the four communities will act as liaison persons between their groups and the study committee.

They will be asked to furnish information on such matters as finance and population.

# Rochester Likes School Bidding

ROCHESTER — Bids on the first phase of Rochester School District's \$7.3-million building program have been so favorable according to school officials, that they are looking forward to the awarding of bids for the senior high school pool and auditorium by the end of the month.

The latter bids will be advertised next week, Schools Supt. Douglas Lund reported, and opened on Jan. 25.

The first bids — for construction of the new Long Meadow Elementary School at the foot of Alston plus library and activity room additions at Woodward and North Hill Elementary Schools — were some \$37,000 below estimates.

The total package has been

awarded at a cost of \$881,988, Lund reported. Pinkert Construction Co. of Birmingham is general contractor.

James Ludwig, president of the Board of Education; Mrs. Mary Ann Beattie, board secretary; and Lund flew to New York Wednesday to deliver the \$7.3-million in school bonds, voted by the district last June.

## MONEY ON DEPOSIT

Lund reports the money is now on deposit, and the actual start of elementary school construction waits only on final consultation between architects and contractors.

A construction time limit of 300 days has been given the jobs, which means, according to Lund, that the new school and the additions will not be in readiness until the start of the second semester next year.

No schedule has been worked out for the district's third phase of its building program — the construction of a new and second senior high school.

Lund reports negotiations are still being conducted for the purchase of a site.

## Decorator Hired for the City Hall in Walled Lake

WALLED LAKE — Once its new \$75,000 city hall is finished, the City Council wants to make certain it looks nice inside.

To assure a good decorating job the council will hire professional interior designers rather than let the staff do it.

Estimated cost of furnishing the new building, which is to be ready for occupancy in April, is \$20,000.

It is expected to cost about \$3,000 in interior decorator's fees.

"We want this done right," said City Manager Royce Downey. "It's too big a job for us to do alone."

In a second holdup, one man escaped with \$668 from a National Bank of Detroit branch.

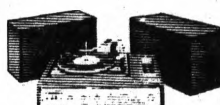

## Tourist Unit Asks Increase of \$500,000

LANSING (AP) — The Michigan Tourist Council has asked for a \$500,000 increase in its budget to launch a program aimed at boosting the state's tourist business by \$500 million. The council asked for a 1967-68 legislative appropriation of \$1.5 million, compared with the \$927,431 appropriation for this year.

William T. McGraw, council director, said in 1966, "we have accomplished our five-year program to bring tourism to a billion dollar industry in the state, second in size only to manufacturing. By promoting our advantages with imagination and efficiency, Michigan can again increase its annual income from tourism by 50 per cent — to at least \$1.5 billion within the next five years."

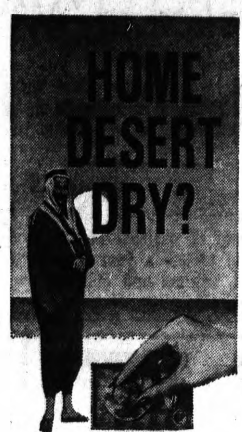

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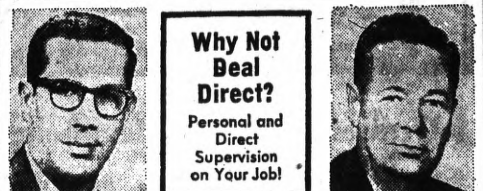
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
